On January 18, 1982, while driving home from Orange County after working late into the evening, I exited the freeway at Firestone Blvd. in Norwalk, California. I traveled slowly through town among very light traffic due to the late hour-around 10:00 p.m. I soon stopped at a marked crosswalk to wait for a pedestrian who was crossing Firestone to the north side of the street.

Suddenly, seemingly out of nowhere, came a speeding vehicle behind me. Helplessly I saw the car coming closer and closer through my rearview mirror. To warn the oncoming driver of my presence, I made quick taps to my brake to activate the brake lights while maintaining caution for the pedestrian's safety.

The driver never reduced his speed and, upon impact, my car and I careened through the intersection. I do not know how I escaped hitting the pedestrian and was sure he was under my car. The pedestrian was nowhere in sight and had simply vanished! I surmised that he had entered a nearby hamburger stand immediately after the crash.

exit my car through the driver's side and had to do so through the passenger's side. The young man who had caused the accident immediately came to my assistance. Surprisingly, I had no injuries, but my car was severely damaged. The driver and I needed to locate a telephone to report the accident, and

I also wanted to call my family in Downey. (I did not own a cell phone at the time.) We entered the lobby of a nearby motel and asked the man on duty if we could use his telephone.

Before answering, the man asked, "What room are you in?" We told him we were not staying there but had a car accident right outside the motel. We were still denied access to his telephone.

across Firestone. During our block-long walk, I asked the young man how he could have suddenly appeared because there was no one behind me when I stopped for the pedestrian. He admitted to me—and later to the police officer why he was distracted and the accident occurred.

He said he entered Firestone off a nearby cross street while looking downward. He added that he was attempting to wiggle into his tennis shoes that had not been unlaced since the last time he wore them.

My Dad actually arrived at the scene before the police officer did. I had my car towed to a nearby repair shop that a boss of mine had utilized. I found, just as my boss had said, that their work was superb. My car was as good as new!

I did have to return for a trunk leak which was satisfactorily repaired. I remember one of the workers saying they check for leaks by having someone get in the trunk. I asked him who would volunteer to do that, and he replied their boss always gets that job!

I had the good fortune that the driver carried adequate insurance, even though he was driving a borrowed car. My insurance deductible was also waived with no increase in my policy premium.

This frightening experience will remain in my memory forever. Ex-Assemblyman Tom Calderon sentenced to one year in prison for bribery payments

to one year and one day of incarceration after he pleaded guilty to money laundering for allowing bribe money to be funneled through his firm.

Tom Calderon was sentenced by United States District Judge Christina A. Snyder, who ordered that the sentence be served half in federal prison and half in home detention. In addition to the period of incarceration, Judge Snyder ordered Calderon to serve 100 hours of community service.

Calderon, Montebello, pleaded guilty on June 6 to one count of money laundering and admitted that he agreed to conceal bribe payments coming from two undercover FBI agents by having the money go through his political consulting company, the Calderon Group.

The bribes were made to Tom Calderon's brother, Ronald S. Calderon, who at the time was a California State Senator. Ron Calderon pleaded guilty on June 21 and admitted accepting bribes from the undercover agents and a businessman in exchange for performing official acts as a legislator. Ron Calderon, 59, also of Montebello, is scheduled to be sentenced by Judge Snyder on Monday, although he has asked to continue his sentencing date.

When he pleaded guilty, Tom Calderon specifically admitted

became a political consultant, Calderon Group's bank account was sentenced Monday afternoon and then wrote a \$9,000 check to Ron Calderon's daughter.

> "Tom Calderon was all too aware of the bribe payments to his brother and that his brother had agreed to a quid pro quo with the undercover agents," said United States Attorney Eileen M. Decker. "Tom Calderon facilitated these bribe payments by helping to conceal his brother's corrupt activities from the public."



"Today's sentencing sends a message to those interested in using access to public office in order to reap personal benefits that they will be held responsible for their actions," said Deirdre Fike, the Assistant Director in Charge of the FBI's Los Angeles Field Office. "Mr. Calderon used his family ties to benefit personally

Tom Calderon and his brother ere both indicted by a federal grand jury in 2014. Tom Calderon was charged with conspiring with his brother to commit money laundering and seven substantive counts of money laundering. The money laundering charge that Tom Calderon pleaded guilty to was count 22 in the indictment.

"IRS Criminal Investigation tirelessly untangled the web of illicit transactions that lead to Thomas Calderon being held accountable for his role in this scheme," stated IRS Criminal Investigation's Acting Special Agent in Charge, Anthony J. Orlando. "IRS CI remains committed to investigating those who engage in political corruption and tarnish our democratic system."

The investigation into the Calderons was conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and IRS Criminal Investigation. This case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Mack E. Jenkins of the Public Corruption and Civil Rights Section.

Ian Calderon (D-Whittier), the nephew of Ron and Tom Calderon, is currently the Democratic majority leader in the California state Assembly representing the cities of Norwalk, Santa Fe Springs, Whittier, South El Monte, La Mirada, La Habra Heights, and the city of Industry.



Filmmaker seeks funding for documentary on Downey High's 1956 CIF football championship

DOWNEY – A Southern California filmmaker and local Downey Athletics Alumni are seeking donations for a possible sports documentary centered on the 1956 CIF Championship football game. The 1956 championship game that will be the core of the film was played between the Anaheim Colonists and the Downey Vikings - both teams undefeated, and backed by a star player of extraordinary talent.

"Anaheim and Downey – still considered small towns in the 1950's – were truly represented by these teams, with businesses often closing early to attend games," says film maker Paul Molina via his funding page. "And as these two 12-0 teams were about to clash in the L.A. Memorial Coliseum, the tension was palpable."

Ultimately, the historic game ended in a 13 - 13 tie. The documentary, titled "A Last Hurrah," will examine "the social and cultural transformation of an entire region, when all eyes of the nation were on California..." according to the film's Go Fund Me page. Film maker Paul Molina is currently seeking \$24,000 in initial funding to go towards filming interviews with members of both championship caliber teams. Molina's goal is to edit a work-in-progress by November in order to obtain finishing funds from foundations and organizations dedicated to historical and cultural

Families flock to Bellflower Unified's dual language immersion preschool program

BELLFLOWER - More than 240 families have signed up for Bellflower Unified's redesigned preschool program, which this year has added afternoon immersion, sessions, dual capacity for more children, expanded family eligibility and customized curriculum to align with TK/K-12 instruction.

The changes were made possible when Bellflower Unified switched operations from the federal Head Start program to the State Preschool Program, which offers districts more flexibility in designing programs.

Some 200 students have enrolled in the general preschool program, which is free to eligible families, and 40-plus have enrolled in the District's ground-breaking dual-language immersion preschool program.

"We are pleased and excited by the response from the community to our preschool program adjustments, which are designed to give our local children as much preparation as possible for entering transitional

Bellflower had long provided high-quality preschool programing under the federal Head Start program through a partnership with the Los Angeles County Office of Education, Jacobs said. But the District decided to shift to the state

preschool program because it offered a chance for greater local control.

The new system allowed the District, which had provided morning sessions at six schools, to add afternoon sessions at each campus and expand capacity from 216 students to more than 240. The District also more than doubled the maximum-allowed family income for cost-free services to about \$53,000 for a family of four.

The changes allowed Bellflower Unified to shape services, such as nutrition and mental health counseling, to meet the specific needs of its students, rather than following a one-sizefits-all model.

Already, the program is running near capacity as applications flood in for the few remaining slots.

The final component of this year's preschool changes is the addition of a dual-language immersion preschool, which starts children on a pathway to biliteracy in English and Spanish. The program complements an elementary school dualimmersion program launched by the District several years ago.

Preschool immersion students can transition directly into the elementary program, which spans kindergarten to grade three and adds a grade level

"Our new preschool program offers parents an extraordinary opportunity to establish a firm educational foundation for their children in a secure, nurturing environment," Board of Education President Dr. Paul Helzer said.






I-5 / ROSECRANS OFF-RAMP CLOSURE

Richardson: Greater than the sum of our parks

It's the 100th anniversary of our national parks and in 2016, to date, maintain one street light for their use. I've visited Death Valley, Bryce Canyon, Zion, Yosemite, King's Canyon, the Grand Tetons, and Yellowstone.

The price tag for admission? \$80.

That's the cost of an annual pass to all of America's national parks. And it admits everyone in your vehicle when you visit, not just one person.

To put that in context, that's less than it costs one person to visit Disneyworld's Magic Kingdom for just one day.

Driving away from Yellowstone after five days of watching moose, elk, bison, a black bear, and even wolves, I turned the radio to NPR and listened to a segment on the anniversary of the parks. They were broadcasting from Yellowstone.

"Are our parks being loved to death?" they asked.

Some people think that record crowds are bad for our national parks. News stories report on park visitors behaving badly, often endangering their own lives, or harming the wildlife. And there was that one incident when tourists put a baby bison in their car.

Others simply believe that their overall experience is marred by the crowds, and that maybe parks should charge more for entry to keep people rich and poor alike, then we should fund them properly with tax dollars. at bay.

Disneyworld, a private business, charges the ticket price that the market will bear, yet it still attracts crowds that result in hours-long lines for rides.

Plus, our national parks aren't a private entity. Profit is not the goal. They're an investment for all of us in something that is greater than the sum of its parts. And that investment is made possible by all of us.

It wouldn't do for individuals to kick in a few bucks here and there to protect bits and pieces of the national parks as they saw fit. Just as it wouldn't

do for each person to build just the piece of road in front of their house, or

egalitarian. We don't all get time off of work to travel, nor can everyone afford to drive or fly across the country, to pay for a hotel, or buy camping gear.

But once you get there, the price tag of admission is rather affordable. For \$30, your entire family can get into Yosemite or Yellowstone. That's probably less than it costs for the whole family to go to the movies.

Sure, jacking up the price would probably do something about the crowds. But the very point of public ownership of these parks is that everyone should be able to visit. Charging Disneyworld prices would limit millions of Americans from experiencing them.

That's why we pay taxes: because there are some things that we can only afford when we pool our resources together.

Because of your tax dollars and mine, the grizzlies and geysers of Yellowstone will not only be there for you, should you ever wish to visit, but also for your great grandchildren. So will the roads to get there, and the cops who keep the roads safe on the way.

If we share the value that all Americans should have access to our parks,

The same is true for all public services we share. If we don't want to drive on worn out bridges or pothole-filled roads, and we want top quality public schools, we have to pay for it.

All of us, as Americans, share a common path. Despite our rhetoric of rugged individualism, the only way to ensure that path is a good one is to invest in it — together.

Napolitano urges L.A. County registrar to take action against Hahn's donations

LONG BEACH - A law attorney representing the campaign of Fourth penalty and an administration fine of up to \$1.1 million, according to the law. District Supervisorial candidate Steve Napolitano is demanding immediate enforcement of county campaign laws concerning Janice Hahn's campaign contributions of \$439,619, which are more than \$280,000 over the legal limit on contributions from political action committees.

According to the letter submitted by attorney Flora Lin to the county registrar of voters, "Proposition B is a law which prohibits candidates from soliciting or accepting an amount exceeding a total of \$150,000 for each primary election campaign and \$150,000 for each general election campaign, from all political action committees." Initial campaign filing reports show Hahn accepted more than \$280,000 in campaign contributions. No section of Proposition B allows the \$150,000 PAC limit to be lifted in any circumstance, the letter states.

Napolitano's campaign maintains Hahn accepted even more illegal campaign contributions than the original amount of \$439,619 identified by the county registrar of voters for the period between March 2015 and June 2016. New reports for that period now show Hahn accepted a total amount of \$573,319 — which exceeds the legal campaign PAC contributions by more than \$370,000.

"These illegal contributions constitute nearly half of the \$1.2 million she spent on her primary election campaign and, in accordance with laws of Los Angeles County, must be returned immediately," said Kevin Wen, campaign manager for Napolitano's bid to replace outgoing Supervisor Don Knabe. "At nearly \$600,000, Janice Hahn's illegal contributions amount to the largest violation of campaign finance laws in L.A. County history."

In the letter, attorney Lin noted the following to the registrar: "A candidate who accepts \$370,000 in excessive PAC contribution is liable for both a civil

. . . Given the egregiousness of Ms. Hahn's campaign finance violations, it is critical you immediately proceed with an enforcement action."

After Hahn's initial campaign finance reports were first analyzed by the county registrar of voters, Hahn was offered the opportunity to remedy the violation and return the excess contributions within 30 days.

The Napolitano campaign said last week that Hahn has failed to remedy her violation even though 30 days have elapsed since she was first notified.

"The voters deserve a system of fairness and accountability for all candidates running for political office," said Wen. "It is unfair for Hahn to be granted a special treatment behind closed doors. We need a transparent process that puts the interests of the people before law-breaking politicians."

Added Wen: "This is a critical election that will determine the future of the 4th District and L.A. County for years to come. The voters deserve better than a life-long politician trying to buy a seat on the board using hundreds of thousands of dollars in illegal contributions from special interests. As a member of Congress and former Los Angeles City Councilwoman, who has made a career of running for one job and then another, Janice Hahn knew or should have known the rules. Now instead of taking responsibility for her actions, her campaign is blaming everyone but themselves in a total failure of leadership.

"The Registrar of Voters has found her in violation of Proposition B," said Wen. "If the law is to have any meaning they must immediately launch an enforcement action against Ms. Hahn, as specified by the law." He noted that the state Fair Political Practices Commission routinely fines candidates for much smaller violations."



Commentary: For L.A. bike commuters, patience and a backup plan are necessary

NORWALK - Riding a bike in Southern California can be both challenging and rewarding at the

Whether you ride a road bike, BMX, mountain, or an old fashion beach cruiser, riding has its important meaning for each rider.

I ride for many reasons. My bike is a comfortable cruiser style with seven speeds and a rack that holds a detachable bag for gadgets, tools and small shopping items.

Earlier in the summer, I removed the single bag and replaced it with my saddle bags which I took on my camping trip utilizing public transportation including a Metro bus and a Metrolink train.

Recently, in a letter to the editor, Downey resident Lacey Johnson shared her challenges in taking her bike on both the bus and Metrorail cars.

Having experienced both types of issues mentioned -- lack of available bike rack space and/or designated location to store a bike on a Metrorail car -- I have been able to overcome such challenges.

I learned the tricks of public transportation and biking from years of practice.

First, when I have a set appointment, I make sure I leave early. That is, just in case the rack

Here in Norwalk with overlap from two bus service entities, the Metro and Norwalk Transit, I sometimes take the first bus if there is room on the rack. This guarantees a ride.

For the Metrorail, Los Angeles' designated light rail system; there are some challenges that are always going to be present.

While the cars have minimal space designated for bikes, most riders with them do board and stand holding both the cycle and any available part of the car.

Some riders have elected to use smaller specialized folding bikes.

Others, like myself, have devised ways to overcome crowded cars. For example, if possible I try to travel at lower foot passenger times. When that isn't feasible, I too look for the best location for my bike and stand with my bike holding onto something to steady me.

The best tool I have is a bungee cord I bring with me. I learned this riding the San Diego trolley for years. I used it to secure my bike in the front or rear of a car so I may

Recently, I spoke with Metro Customer Service Representative "David," about what options are available. He shared what I already knew.

"If the bike rack is full and it's the last run of the day, a rider may bring it (bike) onto the bus."

This is usually done in the back of the bus to keep the isle clear. However, David said, "There is no policy for the morning run."

BIKING IN LA

On Wednesday, I needed to be NTS Number 2 or the Metro No.

Wednesday though, my right thigh was sore from riding the day before. I opted to wait for the Metro 62 which would drop me closer to the Metrolink station. It ran 10 minutes late.

From afar, I could make out a shape of a bike on the front rack. When it arrived, sure enough, two bikes were sitting in their spaces.

equipped with a three-space rack. After rearranging one of the bikes, I placed my bike on the rack and boarded the bus.

Speaking with Norwalk Transit Director, Jim Parker, he confirmed that the NTS has no three-space racks currently on any of its buses.

He did see them during a transportation event held recently here in the LA area.

Arriving at Bloomfield, I disembarked and rode over to the Transportation Center about a quarter mile away utilizing the recently completed pedestrian/ bicycle pathway.

Locking my bike to the also newly-installed bike rack, I made it to the ticket machine with six minutes to spare before my "scheduled" train arrival time.

Once the seven-minute late Metrolink train arrived, I boarded the specially designated "Bike Car," for the trip to Los Angeles' Union

The bike car has a lot of space for bikes and their riders. I have used the car before, most recently when I ventured to the Los Angeles County Fair in Pomona via Bike, bus and train.

At Union Station, I transferred to a smaller Metrorail car going west towards my final destination. I noticed the space for bikes on the car had no straps to secure your bike -- thus requiring me to utilize my bungee cord.

FINAL THOUGHTS

My experience as a bike commuter for 20 years has taught several things; patience, planning and to have a backup

If I am counting on the bus to get me to my appointment on time, I am prepared to take the next one if necessary. If not, I am then prepared to leave my bike locked up at that stop awaiting me on my return trip (I have not had to do

For Metrolink riding, I have used both the Bike Car and designated bike areas when riding.

Metrorail is a little more challenging in that I have stood and have secured my bike to the designated rail with a bungee cord I carry in my bike bag.

Inglewood man gets five years in prison for mail and wire fraud

INGLEWOOD - Erick Halkier Hansen, 58, of Inglewood was Fortunately, this bus was sentenced last Wednesday by Chief United States District Judge Thomas O. Rice to five years in federal prison as a result of his conviction for conspiracy to commit wire and mail

> Judge Rice also ordered Hansen to pay \$2,872,300 in restitution to 51 investors who lost money as a result of Hansen's criminal activity and required Hansen to serve three years of supervised release upon the completion of his sentence.

> On March 24, the defendant pled guilty to conspiracy to commit wire and mail fraud with regard to his operation of BlueStar Digital Technologies, Inc. ("BlueStar") and related entities in Spokane, Washington from Oct. 1, 2010 through Jan. 1, 2014.

Hansen was the President and Chief Executive Officer of BlueStar during the time frame alleged in the indictment. According to information disclosed during court proceedings, the conspiracy involved Hansen's solicitation of funds from investors across the United States for three separate schemes.

First, in 2010, Hansen took funds from investors based on representations that BlueStar had a contract for the exclusive distribution rights to video footage of a recently deceased celebrity (the "Celebrity Footage") and that BlueStar would replicate large numbers of Bluray Discs containing the Celebrity Footage for profit.

Hansen knew, however, that: 1) BlueStar, was not capable of replicating large numbers of Blu-ray Discs at that time and therefore could not perform under the contract regarding the Celebrity Footage; and, 2) BlueStar took no meaningful steps to undertake any production or distribution of the Celebrity Footage on Blu-ray Discs.

Second, in 2012 Hansen took funds from investors based on representations that BlueStar had a contract with a film company to release an animated film that BlueStar would exclusively distribute, including through distribution on Blu-ray Discs.

Hansen continued to take funds from investors after the contract with the film company expired based on BlueStar's failure to perform under the contract.

Third, also in 2012, Hansen signed a non-binding memorandum of understanding with an individual and another film company wherein BlueStar and the film company agreed to explore the possibility David, from the Metro of the film company investing in
