Vic and I were married on July 2, 1962, while he was on a 48-hour leave from the Marine Corps after completing his boot-camp training at Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, Calif.

Vic was two months into his 19th birthday and I was two months into my 17th birthday. From the few snap-shots that were taken the day we married, I can see that we looked even younger than our tender years.

Vic wore his Marine Corp uniform handsomely. When he removed his cap to kiss me, I noticed he had a picture of me taped to the inside of his cap (shown in the left photo). I remember how that sweet gesture made me feel so very special. I wore a white satin suit (size nine). It had not occurred to me to buy or borrow a hat or veil to wear for our wedding ceremony.

Neither Vic nor I owned a car. My father had a car, but he drove it to work that day. Consequently, my mother and 12-year-old sister took the short bus ride with us to South Gate City Hall.

Only in retrospect does it seem odd to me that I did not question my dad or myself as to why he did not attend our wedding. There were no ill feelings between us for him not to want to be there. I know he liked Vic and loved me, so I can only surmise that dad could not afford to miss a day's pay. In those days I was good at accepting things as they happened.

We did not have an appointment with the Justice of the Peace. That was another thing that I did not think of, or knew to do. We were lucky after scouting around to find an official with some time in his schedule to marry us. Also, we needed to have another witness because my sister was a minor. The judge stepped out into the hall and asked a janitor to fill in.

When I tried to put the wedding band on Vic's finger I found that his knuckle was swollen and the ring did not slip on easily. I broke out in nervous giggles befitting the child-bride that I was.

After the civil wedding ceremony my mother treated us to hamburgers at a café across the street from the city hall and close to the bus stop. I was filled with joyous emotion at being a married lady having my first meal with my husband. Soon, we boarded the bus back to my parent's home.

The bus dropped us off on the corner of our street, several long blocks from the house. When I got off the bus I tripped, breaking my little toe. I was in pain as I hopped and limped, until Vic carried me the rest of the way. We never discussed where we would go, or what we would do after we got back from getting married.

My mother walked to the local market. Within an hour she returned carrying a small white cake along with a little plastic bride-and-groom ornament to put atop the cake.

Just before Vic and I posed for a picture with the cake, I remembered that my sister had a large bride doll complete with a wedding veil.

"Wait!" I shouted excitedly while I took the veil off the doll and arranged it on my head. It was a perfect fit, and it looked even better on me! I was so happy that the pain from my toe subsided, at least for a while.

When my father came home from work my mother announced, "The kids are married." He seemed genuinely happy, and hugged us.

That night as I soaked my badly swollen, blue toe in a pan of water, my parents, sister, Vic, and I watched a popular suspense program, "Thriller," hosted by the legendary king-of-horror actor Boris Karloff. It was not at all thrilling to the new Mr. and Mrs.!

Neither Vic nor I wanted to go to bed before anyone else. It was our wedding night; we felt awkward spending it in my parents' house. We did not have any resources to go anywhere else. Still, we were grateful to be together.

Our wedding is not a day that we look back on with the fondest of memories, yet I take solace in realizing that a wedding is only for a day, but a marriage is for a lifetime.

In 2012 we celebrated 50 years - our golden wedding anniversary. I reflect on our blessings, our two beautiful and accomplished daughters, their supportive soul mates, our six loving, talented grandchildren, and our soon-tobe great-grandchild.

I also reflect on our hardships and trials, as well as the insights that molded our tenacity to weather life's storms, much like we started out, but this time with the maturity that comes with a lifetime of experience.

Our love has been, and still is our fortress, our stronghold where we renew the vows we made to each over a half century and a lifetime ago. That is something to celebrate, on a daily bases.



Cerritos College faculty, board agree on threeyear pay increases in newly-approved contract

NORWALK - After nearly a year of negotiations, the Cerritos College Board of Trustees unanimously approved a new contract for the Cerritos College Faculty Federation last week.

The CCFF has been a commonly heard voice outside of the Board's meetings, as they have held several rallies in their pursuit for a contract.

A tentative agreement between the CCFF and the Cerritos College district negotiation team was brokered in mid-August. Members of the union then went on to ratify the agreement -nearly unanimously - which was then presented to the Board of Trustees at Wednesday's meeting.

receiving 16.5% more over the same period of time. The number of paid office hours (including during summer session) are also increased.

The new contract will give full-time faculty a 10% raise over the course of three years, with part-time

The contract also includes an academic freedom article, regularizes funding for department chairs and program directors, and retains health and welfare benefits for full-time faculty.

Many of the CCFF members were in attendance at Wednesday's meeting, clad in their usual red.

Despite its eventual approval, the contract still managed to create its fair share of controversy when it arrived on the Trustees' desks.

Upon the Board's arrival from closed session, Board President Dr. Sin Liu explained to the crowd that the Board had yet to come to a decision and wished to discuss the matter further. The board then went on to discuss the school's budget for well over an hour.

The obviously frustrated crowd of union members left the room, and it wasn't long before the all-too-familiar chants of "What do we want" "A Contract!" echoed through the school's halls once again.

The uproar successfully derailed the Trustee's meeting; so much so that the Board was forced to go to recess. Eventually, the meeting was able to resume, and the Trustee Board was able to return to closed session to discuss the contract just a little bit more.

By night's end President Liu announced that all seven members had voted to approve the contract.

Reaction to the news by the union was eerily silent initially. However, as the CCFF members quickly exited, cheers of joy would soon be heard just outside of the Cheryl A. Epple Board Room. - Alex Dominguez,

Norwalk's Ken Cook fixes lives above all else

NORWALK - An adventurous kid by nature, Ken Cook was always

Cook recalls having to always wait for one his uncles to come over if his bike ever broke down -- and for a kid, it felt like an eternity. His mom suggested he go and ask the old man down the street -- who had the endless toolbox and the eternally open garage -- if he could fix it for

The old, grumpy man down the street surprisingly agreed to fixing little Kenny's bike, though they had never even exchanged a neighborly smile or nod. The next time something broke, old man Wendell refused to fix it for him. But instead, he agreed to show Cook how to fix his own bike.

Wendell helped Cook fix his bike, but most importantly taught him the virtue of paying it forward.

Today, Cook has a lot to be proud of. The army veteran and father of two young boys has been named one of Fender Bender Magazine's Most Influential Teachers for his great work in the community, both inside and out of the classroom. He has also put Norwalk High School on the map as one of the best automotive programs in the nation, winning back-to-back SkillsUSA's Model of Excellence awards for 2015-2016.

"We don't build cars; we build people," said Cook as he takes a moment to proudly reflect on some of his most memorable student success stories from over the years.

The program is fully inclusive by design because Cook remembers



growing up in a time when high school was less of a sanctuary and more of a penitentiary for students like him, who would much rather work with their hands than take a standardized test.

While 41 percent of the students enrolled in the collision repair program at Norwalk High have a range of special needs, each student brings a special attribute to the team. Cook puts each in a position

One of the big projects for last year's collision repair class was to convert a trailer into a fully functioning mobile BBQ equipped with a grill large enough for two people, a sink, and a refrigerator.

Last Thursday, Cook's class took the BBQ trailer out for a spin and showed off their grilling skills along the community from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. on the love of fixing things.

Last year's trailer was such a success, Cook is building a new and improved mobile BBQ trailer this year but this time with twice the grill space and a custom paint job. The class is currently finishing the trailer, which will be done within the next few weeks, said Cook,

By helping kids in the neighborhood however he can, Cook hopes to steer the students in the right direction just as Wendell did decades earlier for him.

A complete stranger taking the time to teach him how to fix his bike made such a lasting impact on Cook's life that he in fact named his firstborn son Wendel (dropping the extra 'L').

Cook and his class now makes custom bikes for students with special needs in the community with the culinary program. The who don't have the means to afford students set up outside of Lowe's in them. Dr. Sandra Salazar promises to finish what she started

NORWALK – As she campaigns for reelection, Cerritos College Board of Trustee Member Dr. Sandra Salazar says that there is still more to be done.

Salazar currently sits in the Cerritos Community College Board of Trustee seat for Area 6. She was initially elected in 2012.

Salazar says she considers the past term to be a success, however "[there's still] a lot of work to be done; change is slow."

"We've created the first community task force to bring more public input into the college. We've championed student success initiatives - we had the largest graduating class this past year. And we passed a community benefits agreement, which would mean more apprenticeship opportunities for students, more jobs locally, more tax dollars in the district," said Salazar. "So I think it's been successful, [but] definitely more to be done."

Salazar officially filed for reelection earlier this month. This will be her second term if reelected.

Salazar says that it's the statistics in her district that keep her motivated in her bid for a return to her seat on the Board. Not surprisingly, it ties in with her ultimate goal of student

"Only 13% [of students] come college math and English ready, and that's unacceptable," said Salazar. "So you can imagine how much work is to be done in terms to improve those numbers.

"...The main goal of why we're there is to make sure students succeed - whether it means obtaining a certificate or transferring to a four year institution – community college creates these pathways into the middle class for these students..."

The election will take place in early November.



First presidential debate inspires Norwalk residents to register to vote

NORWALK - The Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters on Tuesday held a voter registration event on the lawn adjacent its Norwalk office on Imperial

Brenda Duran, public information officer for the Registrar of Voters said. "The purpose of the day's event was to celebrate National Voter Registration Day and to encourage people to register before the Oct. 24 deadline for the Nov. 8 general election."

"We've had 200 to 300 people come out today to register," she said.

Booths were set up to show off the newest voting technology, recruit potential volunteers to work the polls, describe accommodations made for voters with special needs, and plenty of new voter registration applications for those who wished to newly register or update their current status.

Plenty of food was available from mobile kitchens parked and providing attendees with various selections.

Music was provided by a local radio station and the media was present in numbers with cameras, microphones and video recorders making their way down the row of canopies and tables.

Sitting in the shade under a tree and filling out a voter registration oplication, Norwalk resident Phillip Cazares said, "I haven't voted for 20 years."

Mr. Cazares had previously lived in Rosemead and hadn't changed his registration address for two decades.

Having watched the presidential debate on Monday evening, Cazares continued: "I saw how belligerent Donald Trump was towards [Hillary] Clinton, and decided to come down today and register."

According to Ms. Duran, "As long as the application is in our office or arrives with a postmark no later than Oct. 24, you will be allowed to vote." Regarding volunteering for the election, Duran said, "We are actively

"Our number one priority is preparing our students for college and careers, and healthy students are able to perform their best in the classroom," Superintendent Paul Gothold said. "Our partnership with JWCH and the Wesley Health Centers allows our students to have their health care needs met without worrying about costs."

Part of Lynwood Unified's robust health collaborative, the center also offers referrals to more than 30 participating organizations for specialized mental health, dental, counseling and other services from partners like SCHARP, Masada Homes, YWCA and more.

Lynwood Unified students and their families are encouraged to seek guidance and care from the center and the health collaborative partner organizations at any time, ensuring all students stay healthy and perform their best in class.

"This health clinic means so much for Lynwood Unified students, parents and the community as a whole," Board President Alma-Delia Renteria said. "Teaching our students the importance in caring for themselves is so valuable and can empower them to take initiative in so many other aspects of life."

The Lynwood Wesley Health Center held a soft opening last school year with restricted hours to begin building clientele, opening Wednesdays from 1 to 5 p.m. Now, the clinic is ready to expand its hours as demand increases. The JWCH Institute is a private nonprofit health agency that works to improve the health and wellness of underserved populations within Los Angeles County.



Bellflower breaks ground on events center, fire museum

BELLFLOWER — The city of Bellflower, the Los Angeles County Fire Museum Association, and LEDCOR Construction gathered together last Thursday for a long-awaited groundbreaking ceremony to kick off a unique addition to Downtown Bellflower.

The city of Bellflower Events Center & Fire Museum will begin construction October 2016 on the vacant lot south of the historic Pacific Electric Train Depot located at 16394 Bellflower Blvd.

The new two-story, 24,000 sq. ft. building is intended as a place to learn about fire department history, providing an up-close look at equipment used to save lives and make rescues. The first floor will serve as the Los Angeles County's only fire museum dedicated to housing a wide variety of firefighting apparatuses dating back to the 1800's, including one of the museum's most popular pieces - the famous Squad 51 fire engine from the hit television series "Emergency."

A 300-person-capacity banquet center will occupy the second floor and offer full catering services for private parties and special events. Since December 2009, the LA County Fire Museum has temporarily occupied a large warehouse at 9834 Flora Vista St. in Bellflower and has worked toward securing funds to build a state-of-the-art facility. During construction, the temporary location will remain open for public tours every Saturday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. The anticipated completion is in the Fall of 2017.

NORWALK - At Excelsior Adult School Stadium last Friday night, fans were treated with expletives and derogatory chants by students during the first half of

Families sitting in the stands on the John Glenn High School home side on Sept. 23 listened to the Eagle band playing alongside a student section standing and doing what students do at high school football games.

The students encouraged their team on while challenging the "visiting" Norwalk Lancer side with chants of, "We can't hear you!" throughout the game.

The adolescent group of students shouted expletives, including the "F" word, freely amongst the families trying to enjoy the long-time, cross town rivalry football contest.

With each kick-off after a Norwalk and Glenn score, the John Glenn student cheering section greeted the boot of the ball with a derogatory Spanish homophobic word -- "puto."

The word is no stranger for futbol (soccer) fans. It was a recent point of controversy in both the 2014 World Cup and Olympic

tournaments were held in Brazil.

If the international sports community recognized that the word was indeed offensive, why has the administration leadership at John Glenn failed to curb this addition to the repertoire of English four-letter words coming from their student section?

The John Glenn High student section had many opportunities to yell their inconsiderations since their team was outscored, 46 – 14. Counting both opening kickoffs and touchdowns, the word was audible 12 times.

When asked on the sideline about the use of the derogatory word, fifth-year school Principal Greg Puccia was surprised to hear it was occurring on the Eagle side

"If that is being yelled, we need to put a stop to it," he exclaimed.

Also in attendance, Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District President Karen Morrison, when asked the same question regarding the offensive chant, replied, "No comment," and that she, "was not interested in discussing this right

Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District Nondiscrimination statement says:

"District programs, activities,

Soccer Championships. Both employment, and practices shall be free from discrimination, sexual harassment, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information...'

> When are offensive, derogatory and hateful words okay? Is the use of these words a reflection of the students, family, educators, administration, society or whatever?

When asked about the situation at Norwalk High School, an employee who asked to remain anonymous said that they (staff) heard the word coming at an earlier event and "Nipped immediately."

No words of hate were observed emulating from the equally raucous student section on the Lancer side.

The question is then, when will you, school board president Morrison, be interested discussing the conduct of students from a Norwalk public school, during a public event, held at a publicly-owned facility, being attended by the public, with you, a publicly-elected official?

Earlier this month, Hurricane Hermine caused storm surges that flooded the Florida coast, killed one person, and knocked out power for hundreds of thousands of homes and businesses.

This is the first hurricane to make landfall in Florida since 2005's Category 3 Hurricane Wilma, but the Atlantic basin is no stranger to major storms. In fact, the Atlantic Ocean sees seven named storms per year now, up from an average of five just a few years ago. And storm intensity is increasing in the

For decades, companies profiting from the fossil fuel economy have funded scientists, think tanks, and politicians that oppose the general consensus of scientists worldwide that humans are causing climate change.

Mountains of studies and models show that climate change is real, primarily caused by humans, and is already having major impacts on human civilization. But climate deniers have persuaded many to doubt climate change, slowing the critical transition to renewable energy and clean transportation technologies.

But now, the climate deniers have a real problem. The earth itself is providing overwhelming evidence that climate change is happening much sooner than predicted and already impacting our lives. And it's not just

In July, NASA provided data demonstrating that each of the first six months of 2016 were the hottest on record. July and August went on to break records for summer temperatures. These record temperatures couldn't be explained away by El Nino weather patterns, but they can be by the increasing greenhouse gas effect. So, too, can the massive rains that caused extensive flooding in Louisiana, killing 13 people and damaging or destroying over

All along the East Coast of the United States, cities are experiencing "sunny day flooding" where water inundates cities in the absence of storms. Rising seas, resulting from climate change, are already creating conditions where cities receive flood waters of one to two feet on a regular basis, causing significant damage to homes, businesses, and infrastructure.

Rising seas are caused by rapidly melting ice. The Greenland ice sheet, one of the largest ice formations on earth, is losing ice at a rate of 270 gigatons of ice per year — the equivalent of 110 million Olympic-sized swimming pools per year.

This year, the arctic experienced the second-highest level of sea ice melt on record, which will impact the habitats of gulls and polar bears. Increasing storms and storm intensity and rising sea levels have long been predicted by climate models and now appear to be coming true.

What does all this building evidence mean for climate deniers? Clearly, it's time to stop pretending climate change isn't real, and recognize that it's already having major impacts in the world. And the many corporations that tell the public they're addressing climate change, while simultaneously funding climate-denying politicians, need to end their duplicitous practices.

Climate impacts are already harming the most vulnerable people in the United States. People of color, indigenous people, and the poor, who are least equipped to adapt to climate impacts are the most vocal advocates for stopping polluters. We need to stop questioning the validity of climate science and instead rapidly scale up renewable energy, clean transportation, and sustainable agriculture and forestry, all while immediately investing in adaptation nationwide.

The debate is over — it's time for climate deniers to concede defeat, and start becoming part of the solution.

Californians helping to select a new President, deciding who is best qualified to represent the Golden State in the U.S. Senate, and forging our state's future by voting on 18 (yes 18) ballot propositions. Seven of these propositions include tax increases, not counting local county and city measures.

A record setting voter guide – it is 224 pages long, cost \$15 million and took seven weeks to print - will be mailed to each registered California voter, 18 million of us starting September 29. While the top of the ticket races are what consume the media and social activity, there are literally 1,000 races in California that will affect our everyday lives.

Propositions are nothing new in the election landscape of our state, but there seems to be an interesting relationship between our legislative eligible for parole consideration and authorizes the parole board to leaders in Sacramento and individuals who use ballots as a means to award sentencing credits to inmates. The measure also makes changes bypass the legislative process. Some, like Proposition 59, are strictly to state law to require that youths have a hearing in juvenile court before advisory and have been criticized as basically a taxpayer-funded public they can be transferred to adult court. Since the passage of AB 109 and opinion poll put on the ballot by the majority party in Sacramento.

Essentially ballot propositions are a way to pass the onus of creating state policy to the voters. As the electorate we should know what we have in store for us come November 8 at the ballot box.


So let's take a look at some of the more controversial ones:

Proposition 64 (Marijuana) - Our Lieutenant Governor and Napster founder and former Facebook president are large contributors to this proposition. If passed, anyone over 21 can purchase marijuana but it will still be in violation of federal law. It would also allow smoking ads back on television if the show targets an adult audience.

Propositions 62 & 66 (Death Penalty) - Actor Mike Farrell of M*A*S*H* fame is looking to rid the state of corporal punishment while former NFL player Kermit Alexander, who lost his mother, sister and two nephews to a senseless murder, is behind a proposition to speed up

Proposition 63 (Gun Control) - Lt. Governor Newsom also wants to limit access to ammunition with his second of two propositions. The California Senate and Lt. Governor could not agree on the wording and who was to take credit for this so the Senate passed its own version of this Proposition earlier this year.

Propositions 55 & 56 (Tobacco & Taxation) – If you are a smoker or earn a targeted income of \$250,000 or more the California Teachers Association (CTA) and billionaire Democratic funder Tom Steyer have proposed ways to tax you. CTA wants to add 12 years to the Proposition 30 ("temporary tax") tax increase originally championed by Governor



smoking product containing nicotine (e-cigarettes included). The largest majority of cigarette smokers are in lower income groups. **Proposition 54 (Legislative Transparency)** – It is scary that this is not a law now. It is a simple and important law if we are serious about

transparency in government. It requires our legislators to wait 72 hours after a bill is made public before voting on it. It would also require that public hearings are recorded and are allowed to be posted on the internet. It was amazing that they could not agree to do this in Sacramento and a Proposition had to be written. Common sense hopefully prevails.

Proposition 57 Prison (Sentencing Reform) - This measure makes changes to the State Constitution to increase the number of inmates Proposition 47 in the past few years this proposition is being opposed by many in the judicial branch and law enforcement community.

New bonds for schools, more attempts to make the legislative process more accountable, and more requests of voters to regulate retailers are again on the list of "To-Dos" for the public to take action on. The irony here, of course, is politicians are asking us to do their work in an election year where they want us to vote them into office to get things done.

While these are only a partial list of 2016 ballot propositions in California, if you are planning to vote this November, remember to register by October 24 and to look up the complete list of propositions at the Secretary of State's office website.





PREVIEW: Norwalk Lancers face-off against top-ranked La Mirada Matadores

NORWALK - The (4-1) Norwalk Lancers football team is set to face-off with the (3-2) La Mirada Matadores on Friday at 7 p.m. Although the schedule says Norwalk is the home team, they will be entering hostile territory as the game will be on the La Mirada football field.

The Matadors come into the game as the fifth-ranked football program in the state and the 31st in the nation, according to MaxPreps. Their only two losses were to Mater Dei and St. John Bosco, two of the nation's best football programs who often springboard their student athletes to Division 1 college football programs after graduation.

The Matadors were shutout in both their defeats allowing a combined 82 points over the two outings, though La Mirada is coming off an impressive 62-0 shellacking over Cerritos High School last week. La Mirada's senior stud quarterback Tristen Meyer's numbers are impressive through five games, completing 40 of his 60 passes for eight touchdowns and allowing only one interception.

Meyer is coming off his best performance of the season scorching Cerritos for five touchdowns. His 169.5 quarterback rating was nearly perfect as he completed 10 of 11 passes for 264 yards including his longest of the season of 51-yards.

The Lancers have a better record so far but have played weaker opponents. Over the last three games, the Lancers have outscored their opponents 108-27. Norwalk's only loss this year was to Jordan High School (Long Beach), 6-7, in a defensive grudge match.

Both teams come into the game (1-0) in league action with the winner going home in first place with four remaining league games.

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Downey sailor talks life on a Navy destroyer in Hawaii

DOWNEY - A 2012 Downey High School graduate and Downey native is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the guidedmissile destroyer, USS Chung-Hoon.

Petty Officer 3rd Class Fausto Arteaga is a gas turbine systems technician aboard the forward-deployed Arleigh Burkeclass guided-missile destroyer operating out of Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii.

A Navy gas turbine systems technician is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the propulsion and power generation systems on the ship.

"I work in the oil lab, testing fuel and lube oil for the whole ship," said Arteaga.

"I test for flash point, contamination and water, so we know we're getting good fuel so our engines can operate at maximum efficiency and safety."

USS Chung-Hoon measures approximately 500 feet and is powered by four gas turbines that allow the destroyer to achieve more than 30 mph in open seas.

According to Navy officials, destroyers are tactical multimission surface combatants capable of conducting anti-air warfare, anti-submarine warfare and anti-surface warfare, as well as humanitarian assistance.

Fast, maneuverable, and technically advanced, destroyers provide the required warfighting



expertise operational and flexibility to execute any tasking

"Our Naval Surface Group Middle Pacific guided-missile destroyers are poised, trained, equipped and ready to deploy forward and support the Fleet," said Rear Adm. John Fuller, Commander, Navy Region Hawaii and Naval Surface Group Middle Pacific.

"Working with friends and allies, our MIDPAC sailors provide sea control, advance maritime security, enhance regional stability, and foster continued prosperity in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region."

Approximately 30 officers and Approximately 30 officers and 300 enlisted men and women Norwalk man make up the ship's company. Their jobs are highly specialized and keep each part of the cruiser running smoothly, according to Navy officials. The jobs range from maintaining engines and handling weaponry to washing dishes and preparing meals.

"Besides being my job, the Navy is my life," said Arteaga.

"The other sailors I work with are like brothers, and very close friends, and that's something I never had before."

Challenging living conditions build strong fellowship among the crew, Navy officials explained. The crew is highly motivated, and quickly adapt to changing conditions. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches, and

"Being in the Navy has given me so much opportunity," said Arteaga. "I never would have imagined myself traveling the world, working on millions of dollars of equipment. It's a lot of responsibility for someone my age, and I'm proud to be a part of

sentenced to 45 years in prison for fatally shooting friend

NORWALK - A 33-year-old man was sentenced Wednesday afternoon to 45 years to life in state prison for shooting his friend in the head and staging the incident as a suicide, the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office announced.

Wednesday's appearance, Diego Arnold Castro of Norwalk pleaded no contest to one count of first-degree murder in case VA138175.

Additionally, the defendant admitted a special allegation that he personally and intentionally discharged a firearm, which caused great bodily injury and

Deputy District Attorney Don Syn, who prosecuted the case, said Castro and victim Jose Angel Rios Alvarez, 25, had gone to school with one another and been friends for many years.

On Jan. 15, 2015, Castro picked up Alvarez and took him to the defendant's Norwalk home, the prosecutor said.

While Alvarez was sitting on Castro's couch, the defendant came up behind the victim and shot him in the left side of his head, according to the prosecutor.

The defendant then shot himself in the leg to make it seem as though the victim had shot Castro and then committed suicide, the prosecutor added.

The defendant called 911 and told authorities Alvarez had shot him and then killed himself, the prosecutor said.

Law enforcement initially believed Castro's story, however, through further investigation, including learning that the victim was right handed, they discerned that the defendant's account was untrue, the prosecutor said.

Castro was subsequently arrested and charged with murder on Jan. 27, 2015.

The case was investigated by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.
