

LOST TROPHY: Former Excelsior High champion in search of his atheltic gold

NORWALK – Matt Rodriguez, 76, won the only individual California Interscholastic Federation Championship in the more than 70-year history of Excelsior Union High School. Rodriguez, class of 1958, was a master of the parallel bars and proved it in Pasadena winning the CIF title for his school.

“He was a senior at that time and a member of the exciting gymnastic team,” said Dolores Rodriguez, Matt’s wife and high school sweetheart.

“There was much excitement in the Rodriguez household following the great news [of his win]. His success was written up in the school newspaper, which also included a photograph.”

The prized trophy Matt

was engraved with his name got stashed away and nearly forgotten.

Forgotten by all except the Rodriguez family.

The Rodriguez’s are now on the hunt, requesting local help locating this treasured family heirloom before Matt turns 77-years-old.

“My request is that someone will take the time to research the location of the old trophies and that [Matt’s] only CIF Championship trophy be located and awarded to him for the second and last time,” Dolores said.

“Hopefully this request will not fall on deaf ears and my husband can receive a truly great gift for his birthday this spring.”

Excelsior Union High School has a long history in the community of Norwalk stretching back to the early 1920s when it served as a regional secondary school for the cities of Bellflower, Artesia, Norwalk, and La Mirada.

In the 1960s, the school was formally grafted into the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District and remained a staple at the corner of Alondra and Pioneer boulevards until its closure.

Matt and Dolores have yet to formally petition the school district, which now utilizes the former high school as an adult school, but they are hopeful they can somehow acquire the

lost trophy.

“It only bears his name,” said Dolores. “Thus he believes it should be considered his property.”

■ The two veteran council members grew emotional reflecting on their decades-long tenure as city leaders.

NORWALK – With the City Hall Chambers filled, Norwalk officially said farewell to Mayor Mike Mendez and Vice Mayor Cheri Kelley Tuesday evening.

Mendez and Kelley have served as part of Norwalk’s City Council for 29 and 20 years respectively, which included seven and four year-long mayoral terms.

It was a night of reflection on both councilmembers’ long tenures with the city.

“I’ve given a lot of thought about the last 20 years. First I thought about where we were in 1997. Those of you who were around remember those were pretty rough days...but we were ready to move forward. Then I thought about all the accomplishments of the various city councils that I’ve been privileged to be a part of. The most important thing that we did was to have a balanced budget, each and every one of those 20 years,” said Kelley.

“There were lots of projects...I started to make a list and after page three I gave up. And there are many more projects that are in various forms of completion as we sit here.”

“It has been such a pleasure and honor to serve this community for 29 years,” said Mendez. “...probably more important to me than anything else is all of you that live in this community and work in this community... I’ve been blessed that people have supported me along the way and I really appreciate that.”

At Tuesday’s ceremony, Kelley thanked the city managers that she had worked with during her time on council, as well as city staff, department heads, local law enforcement, and commissioners.

“All of these wonderful people is the reason why I struggled with my decision not to seek a sixth term,” said Kelley. “How do you walk away from family?”

Mendez later echoed many of these same thanks, also including the fire department, his current council member colleagues, and several former council members who were in the audience.

Both Kelley and Mendez also thanked and made presentations to their families.

Both individuals were honored and presented gifts and proclamations by several notable elected officials, including Assemblyman Ian Calderon, County Assessor Jeffrey Prang, the office of Congresswoman Linda Sanchez, the office of State Senator Tony Mendoza, the office of Assemblymember Cristina Garcia, and the office of L.A. County Supervisor Janice Hahn.

The two exiting council members were also commended by representatives of Cerritos College, Little Lake School District, Norwalk La Mirada School District, the Cities of Artesia, Downey, Lakewood, Pico Rivera, and Santa Fe Springs, the California Contract Cities Association (represented by former Councilmember Marcel Rodarte), Whittier Union High School District, the Norwalk Chamber of Commerce, and various community clubs and organizations.

Newly-elected Tony Ayala and Jennifer Perez – who will fill Mendez and Kelley’s seats – were also in attendance. They will be sworn into office on April 11. – Alex Dominguez, staff writer

In the first matchup between the teams at Pasadena City Saturday, March 11, the Falcons defeated the Lancers by a score of 21-0 with 20 hits, both season highs for the Falcons.

The pitchers for the Falcons also had a strong outing only allowing five hits while striking out six and walking only one.

Starting outfielder Rolando Nichols said, “The pitching was doing well and the hitting was doing well.”

In the second game of the series Tuesday, March 14, the Falcons fell behind early going down 6-0 in the top of the sixth.

The Falcons would answer in the bottom of the sixth with three runs of their own, and would tack on two more in the bottom of the seventh to

cut the lead to one.

Cerritos was unable to score in the final two innings and would lose 6-5.

Nichols said, “We kind of came out flat expecting to win and I think that really hurt us in the early innings, we had a lot of

opportunities to score, and we didn’t come through as a team.”

The team tallied a total of 13 hits, five more than the Lancers, but were unable to take advantage of its opportunities leaving 10 runners on base throughout the game.

The Falcons pitchers also struggled as they allowed seven hits, seven walks and only struck out six.

Standing with a 3-3 record

the team is now tied for third with division rival Long Beach City, first in the division is undefeated El Camino who is followed by Los Angeles Harbor and last place belonging to EC-Compton.

In women’s softball, Kylee Brown, sophomore second baseman for the Falcons, led her team to

Cerritos College’s softball head coach Kodee Murray said Brown’s home runs couldn’t have come at a better time and shows how tough of a player she is.

Murray said that early in the game Brown went out there and made two errors in the same inning and could have collapsed and fallen apart. Instead, Brown came back with a three-run home run and then a solo home run that allowed the Falcons to impose the mercy rule on the visiting team.

Murray also said, when talking about Brown, “It’s not what happens, it’s how you react to it, and I think she did a fantastic job of reacting to it.”

This seems to be the theme for this year’s Cerritos College softball team. Although it has multiple players hurt and with the team only carrying a 16-player roster, each member of the team is vital to its success.

Murray said that she keeps her team small, especially compared to its opponent East Los Angeles, as she looks over at the visitor’s dugout, so every player contributes to their victories and their defeats.

Kristen Voller, sophomore pitcher for the Falcons, started the game and pitched 3.2 innings for her team before reliever Carly Gutierrez came in the game and pitched the final 1.1 innings.

Gutierrez came into the game in a pressure situation. The bases were loaded with two outs on the board. She said when she was put in she knew she had to throw strikes and hope her defense was covering everything else.

She went on to say that she is always ready to go in the game at any time and she lets her coach know she is ready, regardless of the situation she is put into.

The Falcons won in the fifth inning after Brown hit her second home run of the game and Lesley Brisen’s RBI put the final run on the board. The five inning victory marked the seventh time this season the Falcons have ended a game with the mercy rule.

“It feels super good to mercy a team and finish on a good note,” Brown said.

She continued, “I think we need to take this momentum into the next game and just remember who we are and stay focused on one goal, that is to win.”
