"Starting a Family 1943-49" by Lisa Filler

The Philippines were governed by Japan during World War II. American soldiers left with the promise of General McArthur, "I shall return."

Ligaya and Juan, my mother and father, continued working and learned the Japanese National Anthem, numbers and some Japanese words. In October 1943 Juan Alberto (nicknamed Jubert) was born, the first child

He was so cute with light and smooth complexion. Co-teachers and neighbors liked to take care of him. Ligaya breast feed Jubert while she was on maternity leave. When she went back to work she asked her friend and neighbor, Nan Abarquez, who also gave birth to a son (Teddy), to take care of Jubert while she was at work. Jubert and Teddy were breastfed by Nan, one on each breast. The two became very close friends.

There was a rumor among the Filipino population that McArthur was coming back as he promised. Ligaya's father told them to come to Pagsanjan so they will be close to him. One day in Pagsanjan, Ligaya went to the market. On her way home, a Japanese soldier with a rifle stopped her, demanding her to go inside a house.

Ligaya knelt down, begging him to let her go home. She tried to explain in Japanese that she had a son waiting for her. But the Japanese soldier still

All of a sudden the soldier ran away, to Ligaya's surprise. She got up and started running home. While she was running an American airplane was flying very low. That's why the Japanese soldier ran.

When Ligaya reached home, everybody was packing their things to evacuate to the mountain. They lived on the mountain on her father's coconut plantation while the town of Pagsanjan was bombed by American

When the Japanese surrendered, they went back to the town and most of the houses were gone, including their house. The Filler family went back to their jobs in Welfareville.

In 1945 Ligaya got pregnant but had a miscarriage. In January 1947 she gave birth to a second son who was named Jose. Jose was cuter than Jubert, also with light and smooth complexion. Juan was so proud of Jose because he was allowed inside the delivery room with Ligaya.

In 1948 Ligaya was pregnant again, and this time she was already 40 years old. Teresa and cousins suggested having an abortion. Modern women at that time were having abortions. Ligaya and Juan said no. They wanted to have a girl; and no matter what gender, they wanted this baby.

In Feb 1949, I was borne and was named Lisa. Because Ligaya was 41 years old she was given a Twilight medication that put her to sleep while delivering the baby. I was borne asleep and had to be in an incubator. When Ligaya woke up she asked for her baby. My father explained that there was some complication that I had to be in incubator. They went immediately

Ligaya was so happy to see her baby girl but so sad that she could not hold her. I was not looking good. I had to stay in the incubator for weeks. Ligava was released from the hospital without me but they visited every day.

When I was released from the hospital I was not cute as my two brothers. I was skinny with dark skin and cried a lot. To Ligaya and Juan I was the answer to their prayers; their precious daughter. Ligaya was so happy to hold her baby girl.

I was so close to my mother that we were inseparable. People called me the shadow of my mother. I cried until I fell asleep whenever my mother went to work. Sometimes she would take me to her classroom. Co-teachers and even the principal took turns to watching me.

However, some people were wondering if I was switched in the hospital because I have dark complexion and don't look like my cute brothers.

City planning commission approves new, 100ft freeway sign for McKenna Motors

NORWALK - Amidst a transition period of new leadership, the Norwalk Planning commission approved several modifications to local businesses at its last official meeting on March 22.

Now down to three members, the commission approved several changes to local businesses.



Requests for reconstruction of a former neighborhood market were unanimously voted to be continued at a meeting in May, at the request of the applicant.

FCC warns local residents of telephone identity theft scam

The Federal Communications Commission is alerting consumers to be on the lookout for scam callers seeking to get victims to say the word "yes" during a call and later use a recording of the response to authorize unwanted charges on the victim's utility or credit card account.

According to complaints the FCC has received and public news reports, the fraudulent callers impersonate representatives from organizations that provide a service and may be familiar to the person receiving the call, such as a mortgage lender or utility, to establish a legitimate reason for trying to reach the consumer.

The scam begins when a consumer answers a call and the person at the end of the line asks, "Can you hear me?" The caller then records the consumer's "Yes" response and thus obtains a voice signature. This signature can later be used by the scammers to pretend to be the consumer and authorize fraudulent charges via telephone.

If you receive this type of call, immediately hang up. If you have already responded to this type of call, review all of your statements such as those from your bank, credit card lender, or telephone company for unauthorized charges. If you notice unauthorized charges on these and other types of statements, you have likely been a victim of "cramming".

following tips can help ward off unwanted calls and scams:

•Don't answer calls from unknown numbers. Let them go to voicemail.

•If you answer and the caller (often a recording) asks you to hit a button to stop receiving calls, just hang up. Scammers often use these tricks to identify, and then target, live respondents.

•If you receive a scam call, write down the number and file a complaint with the FCC so we can help identify and take appropriate action to help consumers targeted by illegal callers.

•Ask your phone service provider if it offers a robocall blocking service. If not, encourage your provider to offer one.

DOWNEY – When you hear an orchestra playing beautiful music, do you feel like raising your arms and pretending to conduct the music? Me too! But long-time Downey resident

Last April, she won the annual Downey Symphony baton auction, and she will conduct the first piece the Orchestra plays at its concert April 8. We sat down with Terry to talk about what led her to this exciting moment and why it means so much to

Downey Symphony Orchestra: How did you come to your love of music?

TW: It's a family tradition. My grandfather was a miner in Jerome, AZ. He died young of black-lung disease, leaving my grandmother with nine children. To help pay bills, she took in boarders. One of them was a musician, and in exchange for rent, he offered to give lessons to all the kids. And all of them ended up making their living in music.

DSO: So you grew up surrounded by music?

my grandmother's house, hearing my godmother play piano concerts or my godfather play the violin so beautifully it brought tears to my eyes. My uncles played various instruments and filled the house with Latin rhythms. My mother and aunts played and sang. To this day, Guerrero family gatherings always include music and song.

DSO: Did you study music as well?

TW: Well, I did study violin for a few years back in the day when elementary schools in the LA School District had orchestras and gave free lessons. But my dad was a Mexican immigrant and laborer, and with six kids, we didn't have much money. So I had to give it up. That's why I'm such a strong supporter of the

Downey Symphony's Music in the Schools Program. Music was a wonderful gift to me and very important in my life. And on holidays, there was always music in my family.

DSO: How did you discover the Downey Symphony?

TW: My godmother was a concert pianist and played at the Cathedral downtown. In summers, she took me to the Hollywood Bowl concerts and would explain everything to me, just the way Sharon Lavery does in her pre-concert talks at the Symphony. My husband and I have lived in Downey for 36 years. I read about the Symphony in the newspaper and started going. My husband came with me and we've been season subscribers for some time. It was wonderful to hear such an excellent orchestra right here in Downey.

DSO: When did you decide to bid in the baton auction?

TW: I watched people bidding and decided I wanted to do that too. When I told my husband, he said, "You're crazy!" But I saved for three years and my children helped too. My husband told me not to bid all I'd saved at once, but to stretch it out so the audience would have fun! This is really a long-term dream to honor the Guerrero family and once again be that little girl in the midst of talented musicians making beautiful music.

DSO: How did you decide to conduct Bach's "Jesu, joy of man's desiring"?

TW: Usually the baton winner conducts a march, but that didn't speak to me. I've heard Bach's piece many times, and it's a favorite. I wanted to honor my family and friends, and in my heart, this will be a prayer of thanksgiving for having such a musical family.

DSO: You worked at Rancho and at the Sheriff's Department for many years. What do you do now that you're retired?

TW: I volunteer at church and as a tutor for the library's TW: Oh, yes. I cherish my childhood memories of being at literacy program. I'm also a staunch supporter of music programs at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Elementary School. Exposure to art and music is a life-long gift that enhances the creative and overall development of children.

DSO: It sounds like you're busy in a wonderful way! Is there anything else you'd like to add?

Man charged with rape after series of Norwalk sexual assaults

NORWALK - Detectives on Wednesday released the photo of a man accused of sexually assaulting two women in Norwalk. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department said they believe there could be more victims.


Ronald Douglas, 33, was arrested on March 5 and booked on suspicion of sexual assault, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department said.

"Both cases occurred in the city of Norwalk," according to a Sheriff's statement. "[Douglas] offered to walk the victims home or give them a ride. Shortly thereafter, at a secondary location -- Douglas proceeded to sexually assault the victims."

The statement indicates that DNA evidence linked Douglas to a 2015 case where he is suspected of sexually assaulting a 37-year old female. Douglas is also suspected in the sexual assault of a 40-year-old woman,

The criminal complaint alleges that one of the attacks occurred Nov. 19, 2015, and that the other woman was attacked on March 5, the day Douglas was arrested by sheriff's deputies.

Douglas -- who remains jailed and is due in a Norwalk courtroom today -- has pleaded not guilty to three counts each of forcible rape and forcible oral copulation and

Man gets 80 years in state prison for Pico Rivera shooting

PICO RIVERA - A 32-year-old man was sentenced on March 28 to 80 years to life in state prison for fatally shooting a woman in front of her Pico Rivera home in 2013.

On Feb. 23, a jury found Richard Pallan guilty of first-degree murder. Pallan's co-defendant, Cecilia Gallegos, 30, pleaded no contest to being an accessory after the fact on Feb. 1, 2016. She is scheduled to be sentenced on May 23.

Deputy District Attorney John Chang, who prosecuted the case, said on June 26, 2013, Gallegos drove Pallan to Jessica Gomez's home located in the 9400 block of Underwood Street in Pico Rivera. Pallan exited the car and shot the victim as she was standing in front of her residence, according

After the shooting, Pallan returned to the car and Gallegos drove them away, the prosecutor said.

Neighbors heard the shooting and called 911 for help. Gomez, 27, was taken to the hospital for medical treatment but died from her injuries, the prosecutor added.

Liberals and conservatives don't agree on much, but we all want money out of political elections

In today's polarized political climate, it seems like there's no issue that people can agree on except for maybe one.

Democrats and Republicans, liberals and conservatives, and people on all parts of the spectrum largely agree on one thing: There's too much money in politics. And it's only getting worse.

For me, this goes beyond numbers on a page.

I've been active in the political process for years, and I've campaigned hard for candidates I support. But I can't help but feel more disenfranchised than ever by wealthy donors who can give their handpicked candidates hundreds of thousands of dollars with a single check.

I'm hardly alone. Recently I was telling my brother about my efforts trying to get signatures for a candidate here in Virginia. He replied with something that touched on doubts I was too fearful to voice.

"Money is more influential than campaigning and votes," he said. "So why are you wasting your time bothering to even campaign?"

Is he right? Let's look at those numbers after all.

\$6.9 billion: That's how much money was spent during the 2016 election cycle — over a third of that on the presidential race alone. Just the top 10 individual donors together donated more than \$300 million to Super PACs, many of which don't have to disclose their donors at all.

So it's no surprise that in a recent poll, three-quarters of respondents believed that elected officials put their own interests first. A similar number said politicians don't care what "regular people" think.

Another less than surprising result? About 40 percent of eligible voters abstained from voting last

Like my brother, many people I've spoken to while campaigning say they choose not to vote because they don't see a point. They believe, not implausibly, that our political system is being taken over by a small number of wealthy people.

After all, Trump and his cabinet picks now make up the wealthiest administration in U.S. history. And Trump's Supreme Court pick Neil Gorsuch has sided with big donors over and over again, cynically believing that donors are just exercising their right to "free speech." On the bench, he could well vote to dismantle the few remaining campaign finance restrictions in place today.

Is all hope lost, then? Are we stuck with representatives who don't truly represent us anymore? Not necessarily.

Represent.Us and Wolf PAC are two grassroots organizations that are working to pass laws and constitutional amendments to stop political bribery and get big money out of politics. They're working in red states and blue, and in local communities all over.

Represent.Us has already helped pass anti-corruption laws in Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Oregon, and beyond.

Since the recent election, more and more people have felt a drive for civic engagement. To effectively capitalize on this newfound movement, we need to talk about the source of what drives most of the issues in our country: the few, but powerful, who are able to get their way in politics through their money and influence.

This country is for all of us, not just the top few who are able to buy their member of Congress. But there's a catch for them: They'll always be few.

The power is with us to get big money out of politics.

So it is clear that there is something highly irregular here. It is very It is very clear that the purpose of the surveillance was to undermine the Trump campaign. And then it becomes very clear that the purpose of the surveillance was to undermine the presidency once Trump won it.

When I say "very clear," I'm saying to me. I don't have any doubts about what went on here, and I think it's splitting hairs to say, "Well, they weren't really targeting Trump officials." How do you know?

Look, Obama owes electoral victories to this exact kind of thing. Look at all these sealed divorce decrees that Obama succeeded in getting unsealed about his opponents running for state senate and then United





Annual State of the City

The 2017 State of the City showed promise for the city of Norwalk. The community, elected officials and the police department are striving to move Norwalk

In 2016, Janice Hahn was elected as, Los Angeles County Supervisor for the Fourth District. She is serving the surrounding cities such as, La Mirada, Lakewood, Downey, Cerritos, Bellflower, Long Beach, Whittier, Norwalk, and many more. With the addition of Hahn, the city of Norwalk will also be welcoming three new City Council Members that will be expected to make a big impact in the early weeks of their terms.

Mike Egan, Norwalk City Manager, said "A new proposal for new commercial, outdoor seating and entertainment area has been submitted for the empty lot on Bloomfield and Imperial. The three confirmed tenants are, LA Fitness, Chick Fil A, and Panera Bread." The City Council will look at the proposal in the second meeting in April. Norwalk is in the process of rebranding itself, in ways that will appeal to new and long-standing residents. Improvements to the city consist of: Park playgrounds, the Costco Gas Station, and Don Knabe Golf Center and Junior Academy. 13 Million dollars have been invested in improving the golf course. There will also be a homework center and a community center that will be open to the public sometime in June of 2017. The city of Norwalk has also seen Building Permits up 44% over the last two years. This means more people are investing in Norwalk and making it their permanent home. The city of Norwalk is connecting the community with the environment by planting 1500 trees throughout the city, which were donated by Caltrans. L.A. County Sheriff's Department Capt. Curtis Jensen discussed the Police Departments goal for 2017. They are working towards keeping the crime rate down despite the challenges of Prop 47, Prop 57, and AB109. Over the last four years Norwalk's crime rate has consistently decreased and most recently in 2016, Norwalk was 31% below the national average. The Police Department is focused on increasing the outreach to the youth in our community. The department is participating in an E-Pal program to help identify learning difficulties early on.

The Norwalk Education Alliance and Norwalk Chamber of Commerce are helping provide the resources to help the youth obtain real world skills. Most recently, they held mock interviews to prepare students for future employment. 2017 has just begun and the city of Norwalk is preparing for another successful year in bringing the community, elected officials, and the Police Department together.



Paramount Unified provides free SATs to all juniors


PARAMOUNT - Nearly 1,300 Paramount Unified School District juniors from Paramount and Buena Vista high schools took the SATs at no cost on April 5 as the district strengthens its culture of college preparedness.

The \$43 registration fee was waived for the juniors giving them free access to the test, and was made possible by the district's partnership with the College

Paramount Unified spent \$75,000 to provide free PSATs to more than 5,000 students to ensure the district was prepared for the spring test. SAT prep courses were also offered in February.

"We know that as students take the test more often, and become more familiar with it, they improve their performance," Assistant Superintendent Ryan D. Smith said.

BELLFLOWER - The city of Bellflower and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department have partnered with Kaiser Permanente to host a National Drug Take Back Initiative event on Saturday, April 29 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Kaiser Permanente Bellflower medical offices, located 9400 E. Rosecrans Ave.

Local residents can turn in unused or expired medication anonymously for proper disposal by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). The event is free and open to the public with the site entrance located on Clark Avenue.

Last year, the event collected over 500 lbs. of dated medicine. Medications like personal prescriptions, over-the-counter drugs, dietary supplements, vitamins, and herbal supplements are now a leading cause of child poisoning deaths.

Bringing expired, unused, and unwanted medication to a take-back event like this also helps the environment. In the past, Americans were advised to flush unused medication down the toilet, but this was proven to contaminate the water.

There is also a permanent drug-take-back bin at the entrance of the Lakewood Sheriff's Station at 5130 Clark Ave., where prescription pills, ointments and syrups can be dropped off no questions asked. No sharps are accepted at this location.

'Tastes like home' at Downey's Tropicana Bakery

DOWNEY - "It's in my blood, I guess," muses Melvyn Madrazo about his most artful economic venture. "This business was always

Madrazo, a successful businessman in several fields, was nearing retirement age when he decided to act on a project that had long been dear to his heart.

founded a restaurant chain, decided to open an authentic Cuban café Puerto Rico. and bakery in Downey 18 years ago.

"My grandfather and uncle had a coffee shop and made pastry," he explains. "When I was a little boy, I remember running around the bakery and seeing my grandfather."

Since its opening in 1999, Madrazo's Tropicana Bakery and Cuban Café has grown from a small bakery serving traditional Cuban pastries to an enterprise with a specialty cake division, catering, and a fullservice restaurant with an ambiance inspiring visions of Havana. Four of Madrazo's five grown children are involved with the business.

A distinct menu and vibe have enabled the eatery to retain and grow its customer base even after the more widely-known Porto's Bakery and Café opened a Downey location just a mile away in 2010.

"We've focused on having a boutique café," says son Michael, "a very intimate place where people can meet, and have a social time. With us, it's a Cuban tradition to have your coffee, have your pastries, and have a social hour where people mingle, people interact."

The sustained popularity of the Tropicana shows that there is a big market for Cuban delicacies among the multi-ethnic population of southern California. Counter lines at Madrazo's bakery can be long as people wait to place various orders for pastry, take-out, catering, or specialty cakes.

The atmosphere is primed by Cuban music from outdoor speakers as customers approach the back entrance from the parking lot. Inside,

A collaborative family effort is behind the stylish décor with its distinctly personal touches. Cuban-themed murals, conga drums, and stylized tropical posters evoke days of sun and fun. A collage of island images on one wall flank the large picture of the Havana Catedral. T

he photo of an infant grandson is mounted over the coffee area.

Carlos Dones not only likes the food and coffee at the Tropicana, The retired owner of a commercial embroidery firm, who also had he says that it is the kind of place that he was used to growing up in

> "This is more of a family restaurant that makes me feel more comfortable here," says Dones, a real estate agent in Pico Rivera.

> Gabriel Gil, a social services consultant, likes the food. "The picadillo tastes more like home, like my mom's." He adds, "The spiciness makes you want to lick your fingers."

> Madrazo had been a businessman all his life when he bought a small bakery on Paramount Blvd., just south of Florence. He was retired from a large commercial firm that he had co-owned for thirty

> The rotisserie chicken chain that he co-developed in 1990, Los Pollos, was thriving.

> The Downey location on Florence was the second branch to open, and his children had become involved as the chain grew. Its signature marinade reflected the influence of Madrazo's wife Adela with its blend of Mexican seasoning and Cuban citrus-style mojo sauce.

"The kids were running Los Pollos," he recalls, "so I thought why not go into something I always wanted."

When Madrazo was ready to act on his dream and open a bakery, he says, "I got in touch with my aunt in Cuba and asked her for my

Madrazo put in large windows on the north side of the building, and expanded several times as adjacent business space became available. The restaurant area was made possible by the last expansion.

The goal of creating an authentic, if not exact, Cuban ambiance, prompted son Michael to make changes in his own life. While helping out at the bakery/café during breaks from his studies at Berkeley, he says, "I became captivated by it." He decided against law school in favor of working at the family business.

Tropicana customers entering from the back entrance are treated to a window view into the bakery area where they can watch the elaborate decoration of the specialty cakes.

In the front, small café tables are available for customers who prefer ordering coffee, pastries or light sandwiches from the counter. The restaurant area is full-service for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

Pastelitos of guyava and cheese are one of their most popular bakery items, says Madrazo. Every Saturday the bakery sends a big supply of these favorites to their booth at the Downey farmers market.

One section of the bakery display case is reserved for the elegant pastries that Madrazo says reflect the French influence in the tropical isles. "We inherited these pastries," he explains. They are very popular in Cuba, along with traditional deserts such as bread pudding.

Madrazo left his home in Cardenas, Cuba, before the 1959 revolution and before he was 20 years old. He soon set aside his original goals when he got married and became a father. He named his first-born son Glenn, after the historic space mission of John Glenn.

from Washington, D.C. to visit Cuba in the 1980's to see his family. Madrazo had not seen his family for 22 years, and he wanted his son

As a U.S. citizen, Madrazo petitioned and received permission

Although Madrazo is well into his golden years, he still has the interests of a younger man. The large picture of a Harley motorcycle in the restaurant area is one of the personal decorating touches because both he and son Melvyn, Jr. own Harleys.

Son Michael adds that his father converted his vehicle to three wheels so he could entice his wife into short rides around the block.

Even with sons Michael and Melvyn, J. sharing in the management of the Tropicana, Madrazo still gives regular attention to his restaurant.

He had a vision when he set out to recreate a bit of his homeland with the Tropicana, and it is the personal touch that has attracted so many fans.
