

NEW CAPTAIN: James Tatreau assumes leadership of Norwalk Sheriff’s Station

NORWALK – Norwalk Sherriff’s Station has a new captain in the form of James Tatreau.

Tatreau says that he feels he was destined to be an officer, coming from a lineage of public service.

“I come from a law enforcement family. My dad, he was an LAPD commander,” said Tatreau. “I think I was destined to be a police officer. I really think being a police officer was a job created for me...I truly love helping people, and helping people in my sense of that word was being a guardian over those people that needed that help and couldn’t do for them what I could do for them as a police officer.”

Tatreau’s career started when he was 20 years of age when he spent around five and a half years at the Men’s Central Jail, moving on to Pico Rivera and eventually to Norwalk, where he originally was a deputy. He has spent a fair amount of time at the Norwalk Station throughout his tenure, however spent some time away after moving on to Headquarters Bureau and being promoted to sergeant and arriving at Lennox Station.

“I’ve hit this station at every rank,” said Tetreau. “It seems to be kind of like my home, if you will, because I keep coming back...I’ve only been gone a year and a half, so I know it very well still.”

Now as captain, Tatreau says he intends to “lead from the front.”

“To lead by example and to show the deputies by example what it means to be a professional law enforcement officer, and how to

foster and cultivate good working relationships with the business owners, the community people, and the kids as well as the seniors in this community,” said Tatreau. “It’s those relationships that help us do our job more effectively.”

The local community has expressed concern about an increase in crime and violence – notably an increase in shootings - over the last several years.

This has not gone unaddressed by the new captain.

“I’m concerned as they are with the shootings. Shootings are up; there has been an increase in shootings,” said Tatreau. “I’ve got a couple plans in place to tackle that...I hope to have some success there.”

When asked what some of his strategies might be, Tatreau said that it has to do with bringing more personnel in from outside of Norwalk.

“It’s not a lot of secret stuff,” said Tatreau. “It’s bringing in people and showing that we’re here and that we’re going to do some enforcement.”

Tatreau has been in his new position for just over a week now. He asks the community for its continued support.

“Continue to be a good partner with us,” said Tatreau. “If you’re skeptical, give us a chance...For those who have had a negative experience with us in the past, I just ask that you not judge all of us by that one experience because we all make mistakes. Just because I’m wearing this uniform doesn’t mean I’m going to defend my people blindly; I will defend them, but I will also be reasonable and fair.”

Perez, Rios, and Ayala sworn into office, Vernola selected as new mayor

NORWALK – For the first time in nearly a year, Norwalk’s City Council once again sits at a complete five individuals after Margarita Rios, Jennifer Perez and Tony Ayala were all officially sworn in Tuesday evening.

Flanked by each of their families, Rios, Perez and Ayala all stood before a packed room within the council chambers and took the oath of office before sitting amongst their fellow councilmembers.

Each said a few words.

“As I was preparing for this moment tonight ladies and gentlemen, I was reminded of a quote from John F Kennedy. ‘Efforts and courage are not enough without purpose and direction,’” said Perez. “Now is the time to combine our efforts and our courage with purpose

and direction and make this year successful.”

“There is much to be done, but it’s not impossible,” said Rios. “Together, we will move Norwalk forward.”

“I’m looking forward to a very productive year, especially in the areas of potholes, public safety and senior citizens; I think we’re on the same page when it comes to that,” said Ayala.

“Really the only thing that makes sense to say right now as I sit here and look out at all of you is to say thank you from the bottom of my heart.”

The newly formed council’s first matter of business was the appointment of the new Mayor and Vice Mayor.

The task was accomplished extremely quickly, thanks in part to two of the Council’s newest members Ayala and Perez, who nominated and seconded veteran councilmember Luigi Vernola into

the position. Council approved the move unanimously.

Leonard Shryock was soon after unanimously voted as Vice Mayor.

Vernola and Shryock will now take lead for the new council, unique in that it is made up of a majority of fresh faces.

“The people are the backbone, the blood, the water, the sweat of this community,” said Vernola. “We all have to work together, no matter what it is or what it entails for the betterment of all.”

Shryock described it as a “new era.”

Rios, Perez, and Ayala all also appointed their representatives to the Planning Commission, naming Rosa Barragan, Kim Apoadoca and Linda Lopez, respectively.

Several other individuals were also appointed to several commissions and advisory bodies as well.

Lakewood man arrested for operating Norwalk-based human trafficking business

NORWALK – L.A. County Sheriff’s investigators announced on Wednesday that they have arrested a Lakewood man in connection with a Norwalk-based escort service that in under suspicion of human trafficking violations.

Omar Sanchez, 37, was arrested after investigators served warrants at his home on April 7 and at “Bombshells,” his agency that operated in an office near Leffingwell and Studebaker roads, the sheriff’s department said.

Sanchez was booked on suspicion of human trafficking, rape and weapons violations

following a six-month investigation that was conducted by personnel from the L.A. Regional Human Trafficking Task Force.

Sheriff’s said he was released after posting a \$420,000 bond, and is scheduled to be arraigned April 28 in Norwalk at the L.A. County Superior Court.

“Mr. Sanchez victimized some of the women who worked at the agency and sold their sexual services for money,” said California Highway Patrol Detective Kerri Rivas, the lead investigator on the case.

“We are also investigating the abuse of underage girls who he employed as escorts,” Rivas said.

The business used the website “Backpage.com” to advertise the women and the services, according to investigators.

Rivas urged people to contact them if they were victimized by Sanchez or the escort business.

Norwalk-La Mirada Unified board of education votes to replace Rios seat with appointment

NORWALK – The Norwalk La Mirada Unified School District Board agreed 6-0 to appoint a replacement for Margarita Rios at Monday’s regular scheduled board meeting.

Rios’ resignation became effective on April 10 so shecould assume her new role on the City Council at Tuesday’s special council meeting.

She was sworn in as one of three newly elected city officials.

Rios replaced former Norwalk Councilman Marcel Rodarte, who resigned his council seat nearly ten months ago in June 2016.

Citing the need to meet a sixty day window for replacing the vacant seat with either an appointment or to schedule a special election, the now six-member board agreed to a process for choosing someone to complete the final sixteen months of the vacant seat.

The process for selecting a new board member included:

- 1) Publicly announcing the opening and offering applications,
- 2) receiving and reviewing

the applications and narrowing the field to five candidates for interviewing,

3) Public interviewing the five finalist candidates,

4) A public vote on the selection at a specially called board meeting.

NLMUSD General Counsel Robert W. Jacobsen stated that even if the board announces

a selection to fill the vacancy, any person residing within the district boundaries may question the appointment within 30 days of the announcement and call for a special election citing the following California Educational Code wording:

“If a provisional appointment

is made within the 60-day period, the registered voters of the district may, within 30 days from the date of the appointment, petition for the conduct of a special election to fill the vacancy.

“A petition shall be deemed to bear a sufficient number of signatures if signed by at least the number of registered voters of the district equal to 1 ½ percent of the number of registered voters of the district at the time of the last regular election for governing board members, or 25 registered voters, whichever is greater.”

The last board member appointed was current member Karen Morrison, who was appointed in 2004.

Additionally, the last special election to replace a board vacancy was in 1993 when after a public petition drive succeeded in the voiding of appointee David Cosper, a special election was held and Lee Millan was elected by the voters of the two-city school district.

Initially, a figure of \$400,000 was suggested at Monday’s board meeting as an estimated cost of an election.

After some vocal disagreements from board members, it will be researched further and a more viable number will be available most likely next week, according to an email from Jacobson.

The U.S. tax plan every '1 percenter' will love

After the failed effort to repeal the Affordable Care Act (aka Obamacare), the Trump administration has set its sights on its next big project: so-called "tax reform."

And the "reform" they seek appears guaranteed to elicit disdain from all sides — with the notable exception of the ultra-wealthy.

Let's first acknowledge that tax reform is hard. The system is held in place by entrenched interests who don't want to see their favorite loopholes taken away. That's a big reason why it's been over 30 years since the last major tax overhaul, championed by Ronald Reagan in 1986.

Adding to the complexity of tax reform is the fact that all of the White House people working on it are resplendently wealthy.

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin and Trump economic adviser Gary D. Cohn are each worth hundreds of millions. In fact, Trump's cabinet is the wealthiest in history. That might have something to do with Trump, himself a billionaire, being the wealthiest president in history.

Put simply, the folks making the rules around taxes may not have working families' interests in the forefront of their minds. Crowding them out are the wishes of the ultra-rich friends they see regularly in their glitzy country clubs and gated communities.

A seminal study by Professors Benjamin Page, Larry Bartels, and Jason Seawright in 2013 showed that the policy preferences of the wealthiest 1 percent are "much more conservative than the American public as a whole" when it comes to "taxation, economic regulation, and especially social welfare programs."

The top 0.1 percent, those with assets over \$40 million, have even more conservative views, the paper points out.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, the study shows, the wishes of the wealthiest citizens are much more likely to make it into public policy than those of the less affluent. One person, one vote be damned.

Every year Gallup puts out the same poll asking people about taxes. Every year they get the same response: Over 60 percent want to see the wealthy pay more in taxes. More than half believe "government should redistribute wealth by taxing the rich."

Earlier this year, Treasury Secretary Mnuchin seemed to agree. He promised in no uncertain terms that this administration wouldn't seek to cut taxes for the "upper class."

Unfortunately, that was

a bald-faced, pants-on-fire, inexplicable lie.

Trump's plan does redistribute wealth, it turns out — but it's towards greater inequality, not less. It takes serious mental gymnastics to argue that what Trump's team has proposed on taxes would benefit the average working Joe or Jane.

The plan eliminates the federal estate tax, a levy that only impacts the wealthiest 0.2 percent of heirs and heiresses. It was put in place a hundred years ago with the express goal of reducing inequality and preventing aristocracy.

The plan also cuts the effective tax rates on the wealthiest individuals and most profitable corporations, those doing phenomenally well right now.

Meanwhile, the administration has proposed massive budget cuts eliminating whole programs for working people.

This draconian effort would intentionally and literally push working families into the cold, by zeroing out the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program. If that weren't savage enough, the administration also wants to cut the Women Infant and Children (WIC) food program that provides nutrition assistance to about half the babies born in this country.

The poor in this country often don't see themselves as poor, the late author John Steinbeck noted, but as "temporarily embarrassed millionaires." Maybe that's why some working class people support this administration.

But what's really embarrassing is what they'll get in return.

What you can do for Middle East peace?

While news swirled around health care and climate rules last month, another potentially momentous development slipped through the cracks.

It was the Senate's quiet confirmation of David Friedman to serve as the new U.S. ambassador to Israel. That vote threatens to create a mess of new problems in the already troubled Middle East.

Friedman, a Trump appointee, strongly supports Israel's settlements on Palestinian territory, which are illegal under international law, and opposes the formation of a Palestinian state.

Support for a Palestinian state — and opposition to Israeli settlements — has been the basis of U.S. policy for years. But Friedman's appointment represents a shift.

Since Trump took office, the Israeli government has approved the construction of over 6,000 new Israeli homes in West Bank and East Jerusalem settlements. And in early April, Israel approved the construction of its first completely new settlement in 20 years, deep in the heart of the West Bank.

The U.S. response? Near silence.

Under past administrations, we could have expected immediate condemnation. But earlier this year it took four provocative settlement announcements to elicit even a tepid U.S. response.

These changes are important.

For more than a decade, officials have been warning that the window of opportunity for realizing the two-state solution is closing. This begs the question: Do these changes mark the formal closure of the Middle East peace process? And, if so, what does that mean?

Israel's settlement policy has long stood in the way of a two-state solution. By putting Israeli homes on Palestinian land, they make it nearly impossible to draw a border between Israel and a viable future Palestinian state.

In the early 1990s there were approximately 110,000 Israeli settlers in the West Bank and another 150,000 in East Jerusalem settlements. Today, there are over 350,000 settlers in the West Bank and more than 300,000 in East Jerusalem. In total, settlements now control over 43 percent of all West Bank land.

So, what should those concerned with peace do?

Simply speaking out is no longer enough. Neither is calling for a return to the established peace process, which has failed for a quarter-century now.

Instead, what's needed now are actions to impose a cost on Israel for its settlement building and continued occupation.

For governments, that means cutting bilateral assistance programs, modifying or ending special trade arrangements, and implementing sanctions. For individuals, it could mean boycotting and divesting from companies complicit in Israel's settlement enterprise and military occupation.

It's these concrete actions, not just words, that will make change.

At the same time, the international community must also take time to evaluate the

peace process to understand why it's failed. We must ask what a new goal might look like if two states can't be achieved.

What does it mean to build peace in a post-two state environment? How can equality and justice be achieved for all Palestinians and Israelis regardless of where they live? What might a peace process look like if it were based on the idea of achieving justice and equality rather than ethnic separation?

Exploring these questions won't bring immediate relief to people whose land is being confiscated or who are victims of violence, but answers may open paths to change. And change is needed.

Meanwhile, the status quo isn't working, and continuing down a path that has failed for nearly 25 years won't bring peace.

MFV: Gorsuch confirmation to U.S. Supreme Court proves we need to reclaim our democracy

The following is a statement by Ben Monterroso, executive director of Mi Familia Vota:

"Neil Gorsuch did not deserve a lifetime appointment to the nation's highest court. Those of us who work daily to promote civic engagement in the Latino and immigrant communities see the threat that he poses to the very democracy we try to uphold.

"Gorsuch favors corporations and the rich over workers. He ruled that corporations are people, and suggested hands off to restricting money in politics. He is not carrying out justice when he lets the wealthy decide the candidates, the issues, and who gets to vote. During his Senate confirmation hearings, Gorsuch refused to answer questions about issues, including voting rights, which already have been diminished by the supreme court and remain under attack.

"The Gorsuch record also includes bias for corporations and institutions and against average Americans: the truck driver in sub-zero temperatures, who briefly left behind his broken rig and cargo so that he could warm up and was fired; the college instructor and cancer patient who was advised by her doctor not to return to campus during a flu epidemic and also was fired for taking sick leave; the disabled child who was deprived of equal access to education. All were denied justice by Gorsuch.

"There is nothing mainstream about the Gorsuch record. That is why the Republican-controlled senate arrogantly blew up the rules instead of requiring the usual 60-vote approval for supreme court confirmation. They lowered the standard to a simple majority vote.

"In taking such dictatorial action for the sake of a political win, the senate majority disregarded the serious misgivings about Gorsuch and damaged the institution of the Senate for years to come. The senate should not feel proud of how this confirmation was obtained.

"Gorsuch is a done deal, and we can only hope he shows fairness and independence on the supreme court. But the senate majority made the supreme court a political battleground and we will remember that when one-third of the senate faces voters in 2018. Our government's Constitution begins with, 'We the people,' and it is up to all of us to reclaim our democracy."
