

County promises to shut down unlicensed pot stores

WHITTIER – On Tuesday, the LA County Board of Supervisors passed a motion authored by Supervisor Hilda Solis and coauthored by Supervisor Janice Hahn to expand the county’s efforts to shut down illegal cannabis dispensaries operating in unincorporated areas.

Even though all types of cannabis-related businesses are banned in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County, over 80 businesses are illegally conducting cannabis activities in defiance of the county’s ban, authorities said.

“Our current process for shutting down illegal, unlicensed cannabis dispensaries in our unincorporated areas is not working,” said Hahn. “We need a better and more effective strategy that uses every tool at our disposal to shut down illegal dispensaries quickly and permanently.”

In a motion passed at Tuesday’s Board of Supervisors meeting, Hahn and Solis instructed county staff to report back in 90 days with a comprehensive plan to permanently close the unlicensed cannabis operations in unincorporated areas of the county.

In addition to enhanced enforcement, the plan will also include public education and outreach so consumers know which businesses are licensed and how to report an unlicensed cannabis business.

The plan may also include outreach to property owners about the potential legal and financial risks of leasing space to an unlicensed business.

“For the past year and a half I have been working closely with many community members from my district to combat illegally operating marijuana businesses,” said Solis.

“Before the County considers recommendations for expanding marijuana businesses, we must put into place effective measures to end illegal operators. Today’s action is a step forward in ending this countywide game of ‘whack-a-mole’ and reassuring our communities that LA County will protect our residents, consumers, and our neighborhoods.”

Norwalk voted to restrict marijuana dispensaries within city limits but several marijuana stores are located minutes away, including in Bellflower, Paramount and Compton.

According to WeedMaps.com, unincorporated Whittier has nearly a dozen marijuana shops, including several on a stretch of Whittier Boulevard.

Although recreational marijuana is legal to possess in California, local governments still have abilities to regulate their sale and distribution.

Norwalk school officials train for the worst

NORWALK – Local schools and agencies are staying proactive when it comes to campus and workplace incidents involving active shooters or violent intruders that are occurring with alarming frequency across the nation.

And what they’re learning is the important response strategy of getting out of harm’s way rather than just sheltering in place.

Two dozen representatives from area and out-of-town school districts and government agencies participated in a special certification training session recently hosted by the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District.

The two-day event at the district’s Huerta School campus featured table-top classroom instruction, best methods for training employees, research on active shooters and response scenarios using prop Nerf Blaster guns and replica pistols.

“The goal is awareness and preparation through empowering staff and students with strategies that will protect them wherever they may be,” said Elaine Williams, chief of the NLMUSD School Safety Department.

“We want to change the victim mindset of staff and prepare them with the tools to react to a violent intruder incident and what to do until law enforcement arrives.”

The June 26-27 session was presented by ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) Training Institute, an Ohio-based group that conducts instructor training workshops and certification from coast to coast for all types of organizations, which, in

addition to school systems and colleges, includes hospitals, churches, businesses and governments.

The approach, according to Eric Spicer, a Pittsburgh area police officer who led the Norwalk session, is to teach pro-active tactics that call for option-based responses.

“It’s a natural reaction,” he said about the tendency for people to initially be confused or freeze up. “Our mission is to save lives. We’re preparing them to respond better to the situation at hand.”

Spicer said the focus is teaching participants better decision-making in high-stress situations. That means learning and practicing the evacuation procedures and survival maneuvers that state and federal guidelines now call for, not just the stationary “lock-down” strategies of hiding or sheltering in place.

The problem with stationery strategies is that they can create scenarios where those involved in violent events unwittingly become soft targets or “sitting ducks” for the intruders, he said.

Those attending the session included representatives from several local agencies, including the Azusa Unified

School District, Fullerton School District, Loyola High School and Hermosa Beach Police Department. Attendees also came from Brawley in Imperial County and Tulare in the Central Valley. One participant came all the way from Atlanta. In addition to Chief Williams, the NLMUSD was represented by Chris Moton, the district’s director of student and family services.

Garry Creel, the Azusa USD director of child welfare and attendance, agreed that following a lock-down protocol is not enough anymore and believes that the protocols taught by ALICE are a common-sense approach. “It was very important for our district to learn new strategies to ensure our students and staff are safe,” he said.

The ALICE session was the first to be hosted by NLMUSD. Participants in the training are now required to take a follow-up online exam to attain their certification by ALICE.

The certification will allow the participants to serve as official trainers and implement training sessions for employees and others, including community members, in their jurisdictions or places of employment.

2 shot dead outside Downey motel

After a standoff, police arrested a suspect, who was charged with two murders and now faces life in prison.

DOWNEY – Two people have been left dead after a shooting occurred at a motel over the weekend.

Police identified Raymond Joseph Penland, 29, as the suspect in two homicides that occurred at Rick’s Motel, located at 9415 Firestone Blvd. where police responded to reports of shots fired at around 11:28 a.m. on Saturday.

The two victims were found in the parking lot and were pronounced dead at the scene.

They were later identified as 29-year-old Jaime Garcia Jr and 17-year-old Ivan Garcia, brothers who previously lived in Downey before moving to Diamond Bar.

Authorities say that Penland

and the victims were engaged in some sort of altercation before the shootings occurred, and that the incident did not appear to be a random act.

Penland fled the scene and was later located in Santa Fe Springs, where he had barricaded himself in a warehouse within the 13700 block of Bora Drive.

Downey Police Department, Whittier Police Department, and Los Angeles Sheriff’s SWAT were able to take Penland into custody with no injuries shortly before 9 p.m. after a long standoff.

Police also spoke to two people of interest – 25-year-old Catarina Frances Barajas and 32-year-old Vanessa Teresa Cardenas -- but both women were later released with no charges filed.

On Tuesday, the L.A. County District Attorney’s office charged Penland with two counts of murder, with the allegation that he personally and intentionally fired a handgun which caused great bodily injury and death.

He was scheduled to be

arraigned Tuesday and is being held in jail pending his next court appearance. He faces life in prison if convicted.

Cal State Long Beach offering new parking options

LONG BEACH – Long Beach State University will offer expanded student parking options during the opening weeks of the fall semester.

A new contract for 300 off-campus parking spaces at Los Altos Gateway Shopping Center will allow students the option of parking off campus with guaranteed parking along with free shuttle service directly to and from campus.

Shuttles will depart to campus every 15 minutes with the first trip leaving the overflow lot at 8 a.m. and the final shuttle departing the

University Student Union at 5 p.m.

Permits for the off-campus parking spaces will be sold at a discounted rate of \$65. This price is less than half the price of a regular Student Semester Permit for on-campus parking. Fall permits go on sale starting on July 16.

Overflow permits will be valid in the designated parking area within the Los Altos Gateway Shopping Center, Monday through Thursday, for the first eight weeks of fall semester (August 27-October 18). Overflow permits will

also be valid on-campus on the weekends, Friday through Sunday, during this same eight-week period.

After October 18, the additional spaces at Los Altos Gateway Shopping Center will no longer be available for student use and the overflow permits will then be valid on-campus seven days a week until the end of the fall semester.

Cerritos extends deal with Long Beach

CERRITOS – The Cerritos City Council has renewed its contract with Long Beach for animal-care services.

The contract, for \$347,735, is effective July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020.

Since 1989, Cerritos has contracted with Long Beach Animal Care Services for animal care. Over the years, Long Beach Animal Care Services has enhanced services and improved response times to service calls.

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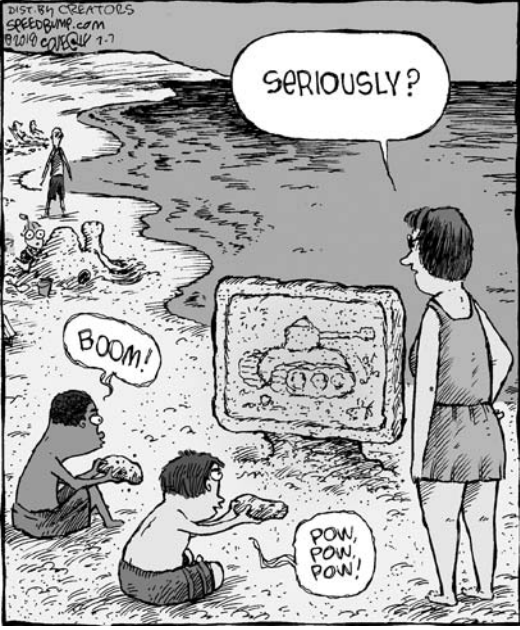

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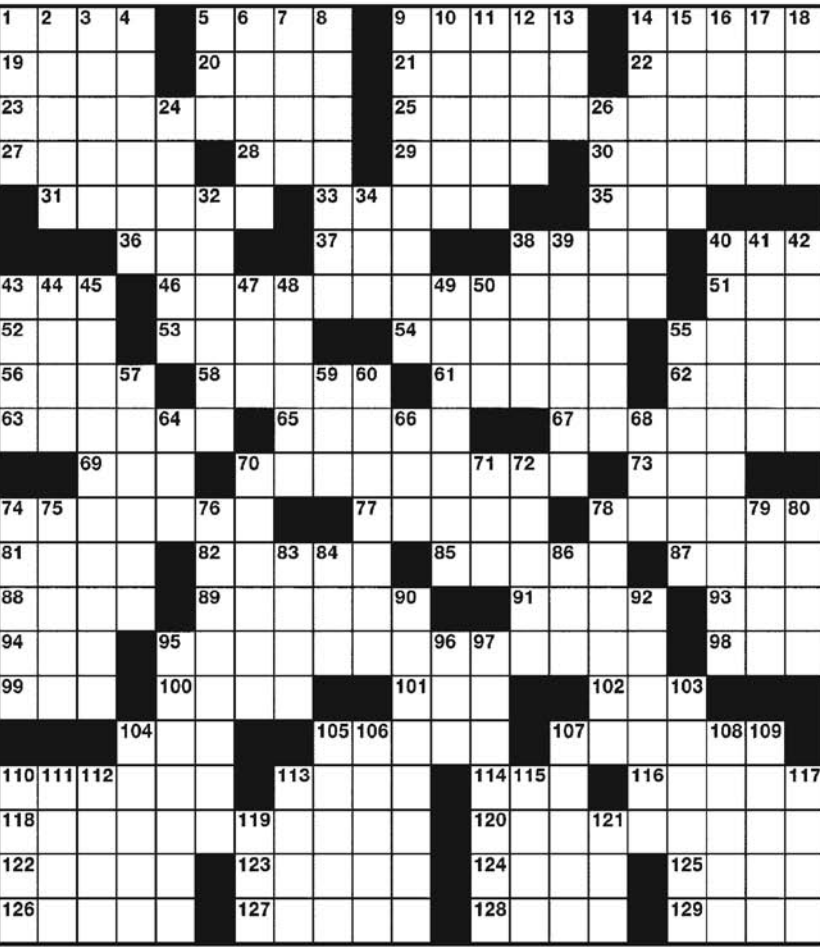

REVIEW: Latest ‘Jurassic Park’ installment falls flat

I adore the Jurassic Park/World franchise, so it was a very quick and easy decision when it came time to purchase my ticket for the opening night of “Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom.”

Back in 2015, I enjoyed “Jurassic World.” While it wasn’t a direct rehash of the films that I knew and loved, it was similar enough that it still felt like a Jurassic Park movie: There were questions on ethics, drama, horror, dinosaurs, and - naturally - people being eaten by said dinosaurs.

However, with the latest installment into the franchise we, unfortunately, circle back around to the age-old adage by Dr. Ian Malcolm: movie makers have become so preoccupied with whether or not they could that they didn’t stop to think if they should. Paraphrasing, of course.

“Fallen Kingdom” lacks the charm and poise that a Jurassic Park film should have, and in consequence feels the least like a natural part of the franchise.

What I’ve always loved about the Jurassic Park movies is there’s a grey area surrounding who the antagonist is (save for maybe in “The Lost World”). It’s not really the dinosaurs; I’d hesitate to even consider them “movie monsters.” Sure, there are shady people with bad morals in each film, but in reality, the films’ core struggle is against chaos and against mother nature. “Life finds a way,” remember?

My point is that there shouldn’t be a “bad guy dinosaur.”

The first Jurassic world got away with villainizing a dino because the centerpiece of the film – the Indominus Rex – was surrounded by a moral, ethical dilemma on whether or not it should have been

created in the first place (pay no mind that the debate was wrapped in razor-sharp teeth).

I was surprised early on in Fallen Kingdom’s advertising before release that we would once again be dealing with a newly manufactured dino. Didn’t we learn this lesson in the last film? Making a bigger, badder dinosaur is a no-no.

Instead, the new “Indoraptor” takes away from two new intriguing questions to ask in the Jurassic film universe: What should come of the dinosaurs already on the island, and what if they were weaponized and monetized?

Both these questions are tackled in the film, although one is used almost more as a means to an end than an actual plot point.

The weaponization (and sale) of dinosaurs was briefly touched on in Jurassic World, and could easily feature as the main antagonistic plot point in its own film. Instead,

it’s smushed in with several other plots and subplots, including the unnecessary “bad dino.”

The other (and far more interesting) question surrounds the dinosaurs that are already living after the events of Jurassic World. Do they have animal rights? Should they be saved? Should they be let to go extinct again? This entire idea could easily be made into its own story. In many ways, the concept had a compelling beginning, middle and end already written into “Fallen Kingdom” that could have been fleshed out so much more.

Instead, this question is merely used as a device to get Owen (Chris Pratt) and Claire (Bryce Dallas Howard) back to the island of Isla Nublar.

Along with the loss of the entire point of the Jurassic movies, “Fallen Kingdom” also comes across as rather goofy in spots, feeling more like a lampooned Indiana Jones

with a prehistoric backdrop. Sure, even Indiana Jones has its comic relief moments, but I never wanted Short Round or Sallah to get offed in the way I desperately wanted Justice Smith’s Franklin character to get swallowed by a T-rex.

“Fallen Kingdom” also pays a fair amount of fan service by alluding back to the original film, which this year is celebrating its 25th anniversary. Unfortunately, these recreated scenes feel more like a poor attempt to gain fans’ favor in the middle of a mediocre film. The return of Dr. Ian Malcolm (Jeff Goldblum) is also rather an ironic letdown, as Malcolm is used to bookend the entire film. It’s rather sad that for the role he plays in “Fallen Kingdom,” the movie itself so misses the mark on everything the character stands for.

Worst of all, everything seems to end abruptly. Villains long established (whether in this movie or the last movie, minor spoiler)

are toppled quickly. For a movie surrounding another “bad dino,” the indoraptor’s time in the movie is rather minimal and rushed.

One thing “Fallen Kingdom” does do well is provide probably the most diverse collection of dinosaurs than any of its predecessors. While it’s nice to see so many dinosaurs that have never been seen on screen before, it still doesn’t make up for the rest of the muddled content, however.

“Fallen Kingdom” falls flat more than it provides a compelling “next chapter” in the Jurassic franchise. If there is to be another Jurassic World movie, filmmakers need to look back at how and why the original Jurassic Park became such a beloved classic, before patenting it, and packaging it, and slapping it on a plastic lunchbox.

Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom is rated PG-13 and runs for 128 minutes.

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Where is Vanessa Delgado?

I’m not going to get into the politics of Montebello, but it does include a recall effort, a city clerk (who must okay the recall procedure) purportedly married to one of the recall male targets, questionable large no-bid contracts and nearly \$2 million dollars spent on a Senate seat which pays just over a hundred thousand dollars.

Never mind asking, “Who is Vanessa Delgado,” ask, “Where is Vanessa Delgado?”

So, what are the scenarios?

I asked Michael Sanchez of the Los Angeles Registrar of voters, what happens if one of the top two vote recipients chooses not to run in their respective primary? (i.e. Candidate Delgado has stated she has not made up her

mind regarding the “special” primary).

His email response to me stated that the election would go forward and if any candidate chose not to actively campaign, that was their choice.

If by chance that same candidate won and did not wish to serve, they’d have to resign per Senate rules.

Regarding the votes for the 32nd district?

“The SOS required our department to certify the special primary by 6/14 so that we can comply with fast approaching legal deadlines leading up to the 8/7 runoff (e.g., sending out military and overseas ballots by E-45). The counting of the ballots for SD 32 concluded last Thursday for both the short term and regular term. Though the short term was certified last week, the regular term was set to be certified along with all other contests on the ballot on 6/29.

This happens in every consolidated election. For some contests, all ballots/ votes are able to be counted halfway through the canvass because there was low turnout. For other contests, it takes longer to count ballots because there was high turnout. However, we wait and do one certification for all contests/jurisdictions at the end of canvass unless there is a special primary like SD 32.”

Whew. Stay tuned. More details as they become available.
