

# Norwalk man charged with murder

NORWALK – A Norwalk man was charged today with killing two people and injuring others in a DUI crash on the 605 Freeway.

Alex Barragan (dob 8/27/86) faces two counts of murder and one count each of driving under the influence of alcohol within 10 years of another DUI offense and driving with a .08 percent blood alcohol content causing injury within 10 years of another DUI offense.

Arraignment was scheduled for Wednesday at Los Angeles County Superior Court, Bellflower Branch.

On July 16, Barragan was allegedly driving his car on the freeway near Alondra Boulevard when he rear ended a disabled van, prosecutors said. The van erupted in flames and two people died and three others were injured, prosecutors added.

If convicted as charged, Barragan faces a possible maximum sentence of 44 years to life in state prison.

Bail is set at more than \$2.19 million.

The case remains under investigation by the California Highway Patrol, Santa Fe Springs Area.

# Freeway off-ramp closed for 3 months

NORWALK – Caltrans announced the scheduled closure of the Norwalk Boulevard off ramp from northbound Interstate 5 (Santa Ana Freeway) at 10 p.m., Sunday July 15.

The off ramp will remain closed for up to 90 days for reconstruction and paving.

The reconstruction of this ramp is part of the I-5 widening project which is adding two lanes to each direction of I-5 between I-605 (San Gabriel River Freeway) and the Orange County line.

This segment of the project includes reconstruction of the Norwalk Boulevard interchange and the San Antonio Drive Bridge.

Drivers are advised to exit northbound I-5 at the new Rosecrans Boulevard off ramp, where the timing of the traffic signals will be adjusted by the city of Norwalk to accommodate the heavier traffic flow.

Short film festival returns to Santa Fe Springs

► **FILM FESTIVAL:** Saturday's free event will feature short film screenings, painting, live music, and an exclusive pale ale.

**SANTA FE SPRINGS** – The second evening of the Green Salon Short Film Festival returns to Santa Fe Springs this Saturday, July 23, at 7 p.m.

The festival, which features the work of local filmmakers, happens the fourth Saturday of each summer month – June, July, and August – at Studio GalleRoy, the painting studio of Roy Anthony Shabla. It is a free-admission event.

This year, the festival is combined with a small art fair. Local artists and craftsmen will exhibit and sell their work on site. Drawing and painting, sculpture, jewelry, and glass art will be featured.

Studio GalleRoy itself will exhibit a different series of

large paintings each month, encouraging the public to attend all three evenings of film and art.

The Green Salon is a monthly gathering of artists, poets, musicians, filmmakers, and other cultural enthusiasts.

It is usually located in Downey, in the private garden of Roy Anthony Shabla, but moves to Santa Fe Springs for the short film festival each summer. It is the longest-running monthly cultural event in the immediate area.

The Green Salon always hosts an open mic and featured reader. This month, the featured reader is one of the most exciting poets in Southern California, Kevin Ridgeway.

He is published in hundreds of journals and anthologies and will read from his new book, “A Ludicrous Split.”

“He is a star on the local

poetry scene and you will understand why when his work rewires your brain and your heart,” said Shabla. Books will be for sale.

The art fair featured artist this month is Gennie Prochazka. She has been an illustrator for over 25 years, having created images for children’s books, magazine and newspaper articles (including the Downey Patriot), and a book of poetry.

Her work is primarily made with watercolor and pen/ink but recently has forayed into acrylic paint and other media.

For years, Prochazka brought to life the twisted, quirky creatures lurking in her imagination –monsters, mermaids, bat-girls and other oddities– however, now she is focused on painting the tangible world.

In this shift, her recent work reflects icons of Southern

California –the ever-present palm trees and electrical lines that cross our cities. Painted on wood panels in acrylic, the images convey the peacefulness and grandeur of the silent giants that tower over us.

Also, the Green Salon Short Film Festival will host a favorite filmmaker this month, Julian Park.

With a passion for film from a young age and a belief that everyone has a story to tell, Park soon got ahold of a camera and started shooting his own documentaries.

Often featuring unsung heroes, artists, and outcasts (and traveling as far as Kenya), Park’s goal is to highlight the humanity of each character he films.

“Invincible Boy” is his second narrative short film and first as the sole writer and director. It is the story of a wildly imaginative boy’s

mission to become a superhero. He is challenged to remain strong and hopeful when his optimistic view of the world begins to crumble.

“Invincible Boy” was shot almost entirely in the City of Downey. The main action sequence of the film is based on Park’s own childhood experiences in downtown Downey.

This month, the Green Salon will feature Dave the Cowboy Award Winning Homebrew. It is a locally-made, small-batch beer that has recently dominated California brewing competitions.

David R. Youel started making beer in 2013 and has challenged himself to brew each batch better than the last.

“It is a humbling endeavor,” he says. “Even the most successful brewer doesn’t purport to know everything about the practice or subject.

I enjoy the open exchange of thought and expression with other brew masters, it stimulates me to create... with the help of some hungry yeast. I hope to yield a beautiful drink that soothes the concerns of life for a while.”

Dave the Cowboy Award Winning Homebrew is available exclusively and intermittently at the Green Salon. This month, a pale ale will be served. It won first place at the 2017 Los Angeles County Fair.

Also featured at the short film festival: live music by Santa Fe Spring’s own Witch Cake, an open mic, a featured reader, exhibition of the work of local artists, beer, wine and vegan snacks, and short films by local filmmakers.

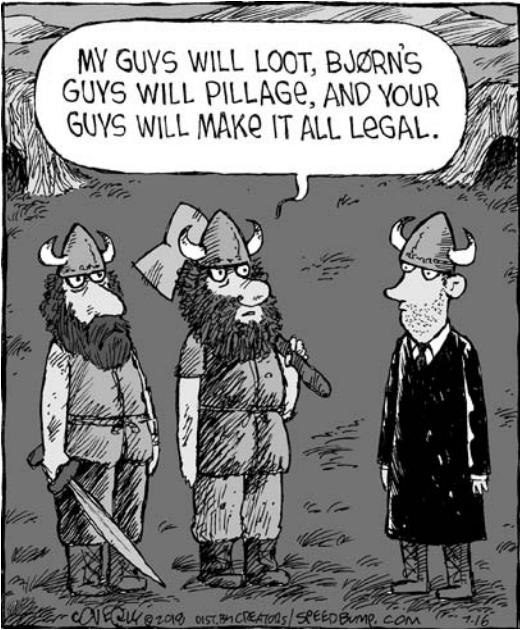

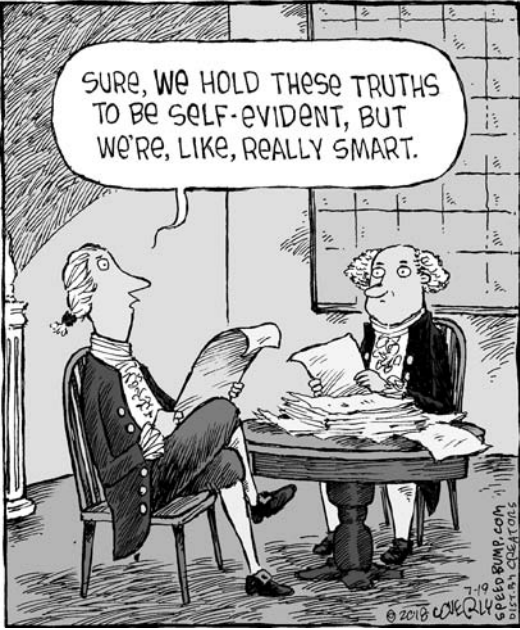

2003: In India, elephants used for commercial work began wearing reflectors to avoid being hit by cars during night work.

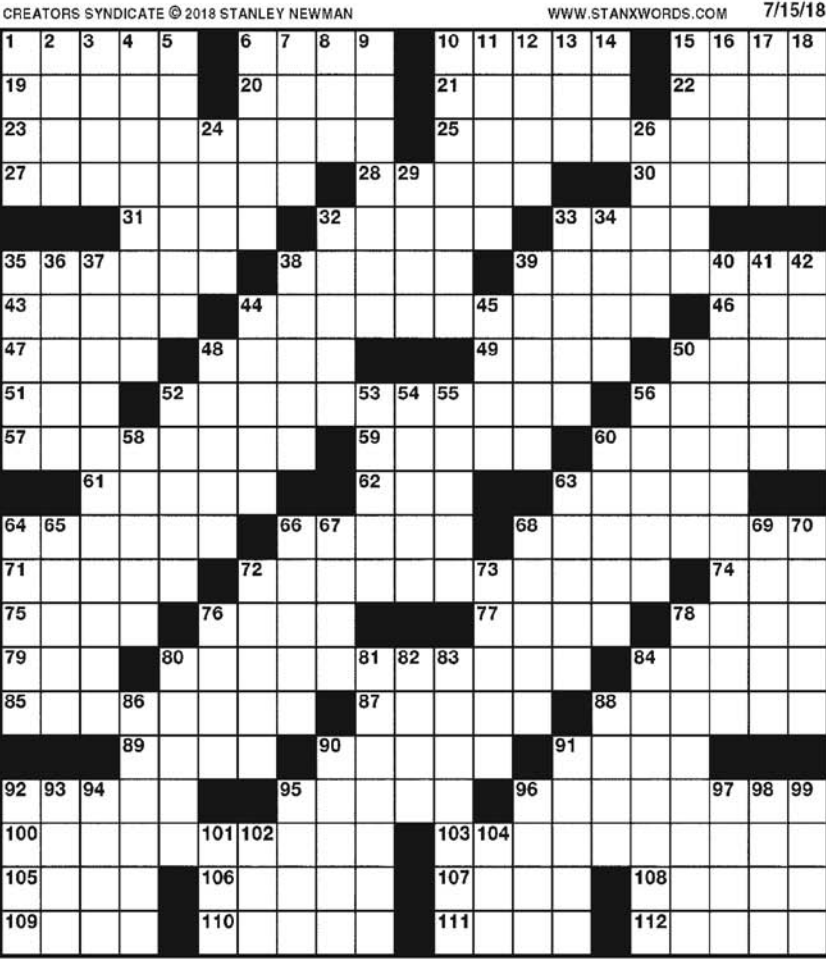

# An interview with Rita Topalian

NORWALK – I afforded the Republican candidate, Rita Topalian, in the California State Senate District 32 race, the opportunity to offer her views on the same topics asked of her Democratic opponent in the November 2018 General Election.

Topalian will represent the Republican party in the special election for the remaining term of the open seat on August 7.

Although her opponent for the short term is Democrat Vanessa Delgado of Montebello, Delgado has not responded to requests for interviews.

As with her General Election (November 6) opponent, Bob Archuleta, we met at Diana’s Restaurant in Norwalk.

The format was similar as it was with Archuleta. We would chat first to gather and confirm some personal information, then move forward with the same questions asked of Archuleta with variance only if guided by Topalian.

Obviously a bit nervous, I tried to put her at ease by asking to tell me her story of her presence in the 32nd Senate District.

Topalian is 71 years old, the mother of three adult boys with six grandchildren. She started dating her husband, Mike English, when she was 16. They have now been married for 54 years.

She, along with her parents, immigrated from Germany in 1951 after some time in a labor camp that was a result of the war. As Armenian civilians caught in the overrun of the German offensive into the Western Soviet Union, she reminisced about the stories not only her parent told, but of many relatives who survived the war.

It is this strong family and cultural connection to the Armenian saga that derives some of her personal shaping and current political viewpoints.

Born in the refugee/labor camp in 1946, the decision was to immigrate to the United States, where the family settled in the city of Montebello. She would remain in the 32nd Senate District for the entirety of her 67 years in the country.

After marrying Mike and having their first child, Topalian decided to go back to school and pursue a higher education. “I was 28 or 29 years old then,” she says.

Majoring in Political Science at Rio Hondo College, it was at

the urging of professors and friends that saw Topalian continue her education at Cal State University, Los Angeles.

Again, while attending the university, she was encouraged to continue her education and to direct her efforts at law school. It was at Cal State Los Angeles where she shifted her political affiliation and joined the Republican Party

### Why are you running for state senate?

“One of the things of my personality is that I’m a problem solver, and I like to bring people together. I’m not in your face about anything, and so, that’s part of my personality. I do that in my profession as a lawyer.

“I try to calm things down so we can move forward.”

### What are the main differences between you and the Democratic nominee?

“He’s establishment.”

At this point, Topalian cited, “I’ve heard some negative things. But that’s not the reason I got into it (the race). I think I’m better qualified, believe it or not, because I’m a people person. I go out of my way for people. I keep promises. I answer telephone calls, and if I can do anything, I help anyone.”

You said you heard things. How can opinions affect one’s behavior or actions?

“Well, it depends on whether you let them influence you. If my personality was a little bit different and I heard bad things I would say bad things, but I don’t.”

“I personally am not going to say bad things. That’s just not my style.”

“You’re either going to vote for me because there’s something in me that you see that is worthy of voting for me or not, not by knocking the other person down. I don’t go up by knocking Mr. Archuleta down.”

At this point, we went off the record for several seconds, returning with: “I don’t judge people, unless I have some conquering evidence.”

### Would she support National Guard troops at the southern border?

“I am not for it, for troops and policing, no. I’m also not for the open border business because I came through the system, my husband’s family came through the system and we need something, but not cops carrying guns. It’s frightening”

As a child of immigrant parents, please comment on our current migrant policies and their effect on the 32nd California Senate District.

“Well, we have a huge Hispanic population and if you go into the chain migration thing, it’s going to happen. Families should be together. I’m a family proponent. They have to be together. “However, we have to do something and it has to be humane. We have to do something. We can’t have absolutely no checks and balances. We have to do something, but not inhumanely.”

Topalian next added her view on the separating of children from their parents upon entering the United States seeking asylum, a reversed White House policy with nearly 1500 children still separated from their parents.

“And then children being taken away? I’m a mother. Don’t take my kids away.”

“Of course, I would think twice before coming someplace where I shouldn’t live as a child. That I don’t understand. But once they’re here, they’re here. We need to be humane. We all went through the system. This country has so much to give all of us and we need to get the right people that will do the right thing.”

“That’s my problem. I can’t stand it. I can’t stand it.”

### Who are the ‘right’ people?

“You know what? That’s a very good question and the answer is, I don’t know. But there’s got to be some people that are good, that can run these things with compassion and humanity.

There’s got to be.”

Going forward, Topalian added: “I think so many of our problems are because as human beings, we’ve lost some measure of dignity in our society. We’ve lost manners, we’ve lost dignity, we’ve lost treating people respectfully. That’s gone. That’s from the breakdown of the family.”

### What are your concerns regarding the 900,000 plus population of the 32nd (Senate) District?

“I have really strong feelings about loosening and lowering the bar with 57, 47 and AB 1.”

California voter approved Propositions 57 and 47 reduced penalties and offered parole to “non-violent” offenders. Assembly Bill 1 increased the gasoline tax and registration of vehicle fees, for road and highway improvements.)

“Unfortunately, we’ve learned through history that people respond when there’s consequences. What we’ve done is taken away the consequences. And why taking away consequences opens doors to do anything. It’s like a five-year-old who knows mommy isn’t going to discipline you for taking candy before dinner, a five year olds going to do it.”

“We just keep giving things away. We [keep] making it easier. We don’t help make it harder. We make it easier. And so that impacts people here. This is a working class neighborhood. People that work hard all day.”

“The Hispanic people, employees, are the hardest working group I’ve ever encountered. They work hard. They want to take care of their kids. ‘Just leave me alone, go away government. I’ll take care of my family, leave me alone’.”

“They become the object of so much. You know Honey. We got to make consequences. That goes back to my theory about families. We don’t have consequences or anything. And when you don’t [have consequences], you keep going along with what you want, hurting people. We need consequences.”

At this point, we went off the record regarding officer morale in the field which was shared with Topalian, returning with the follow up question:

### So, where would your emphasis be in regards to public safety? Would you be, say, proactive and encourage the bonds that are spent for more prisons and perhaps directed somewhere else? Or would you be more inclined to say, increase prisons, lock up more people?

“I was saying, there should be consequences. If you tighten the consequence end of it, and we need more prisons, then that’s how it should be. We need consequences. You can’t let everybody out. We can’t be the good guy for everybody. We can’t be forgiving for everything. There comes a point in life where you’ve got to say no, done.”

In part two of this interview, Topalian comments on community college for everyone, homelessness and family shelters, gun violence and the 2nd Amendment, public employee salaries, switching political parties and the swearing allegiance to the President (as a Republican).

## Downey Board of Education names building after school board member

DOWNEY – The Downey Unified School District Board of Education unanimously agreed to name the Warren High School administration building after longtime member Barbara Samperi at their meeting on

Tuesday.

Samperi has been a member of the school board since 1993. She was last reelected in 2017 by default when the election was cancelled due to a lack of opposition.

After making the motion for Samperi to receive the honor, fellow board members commented on her extended tenure with the district.

“Bobbie really deserves this,” said Corrin. “We have a tradition here in Downey of naming facilities after longtime people involved in the education programs...

Bobbie’s longevity and her effort continues day in and day out, and I know we all appreciate that.”

Samperi described the renaming as a “great honor.”

“I went to Warren High School...I watched it being built as a child, so I’m very excited about that,” said Samperi.

The school board also voted to once again reach into Measure O bond funds, hoping to stretch their dollar for as much as they can.

Measure O – which was successfully passed by voters

in 2014 – authorizes the District to take up to \$248 million in general obligation bonds for campus upgrades and construction projects.

The first draw occurred in October of 2015, for a total of \$50 million.

With Tuesday’s vote, the district will now draw \$135 million.

Superintendent John Garcia explained that pulling the funds now would help keep the district ahead of rising construction costs, especially as the middle schools become the primary project focus.

“The District continues to be concerned that construction costs continue to rise very quickly,” said Garcia. “We’re working and we’ve moved more aggressively in our schedule to put the bigger projects forward, which is for the most part the middle schools.

Stauffer’s already in progress, but each middle school was allotted a large amount of dollars in our original facilities master plan, so this is to continue to move that forward and get those big projects done as soon as we possibly can to beat inflation.”

## Reward offered for Hacienda Heights murder

**HACIENDA HEIGHTS**—Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn offered a \$10,000 reward Tuesday in exchange for information leading to the apprehension or conviction of those responsible for the 2005 murder of Edward Berber in his Hacienda Heights home.

Sheriff Jim McDonnell announced that investigators are seeking information

regarding a person of interest in the decade-old case. Investigators have released a sketch of the individual.

"Nearly 13 years after Edward Berber was murdered, we have a chance to solve this case and finally bring justice to Edward's family," said Hahn. "If you recognize the sketch of the person of interest or have any information about this murder—I urge you to do

the right thing and share what you know with the Sheriff's Department."

On Dec. 6, 2005, Edward Berber's mother went to her son's home in Hacienda Heights to check on his welfare. Edward, who had regular contact with family, had not been seen nor heard from for the entire weekend.

His mother found his home in disarray and found Edward shot to death in his bed.

No eyewitnesses who can identify the suspect have come forward. Investigators believe it would be beneficial to offer a reward which may prompt reluctant witnesses to come forward and provide information to identify the person responsible for this crime.

At a press conference held Tuesday morning, Sheriff McDonnell shared the sketch of a person of interest in the crime.
