

Seasonal retail workers in high demand

► **HOLIDAY JOBS:** Some retailers are offering perks to entice temporary workers this holiday season.

Retailers won’t just be battling each other for customers this holiday season — they also are gearing up to fight over the temporary workers who will make the sales.

A strong economy has retailers expecting a busy holiday shopping season, but with unemployment near historic lows, staffing up to handle extra demand could be a challenge.

Target plans to hire 120,000 people to fill seasonal jobs in its 1,839 stores, about 20 percent more than last year. That matches the number of jobs Amazon announced ahead of last year’s holiday season and is the largest seasonal hiring estimate from a bricks-and-mortar retailer since Challenger, Gray & Christmas began tracking the figure in 2012.

The retailer said it needs more seasonal workers to handle online orders from stores, such as in-store or curbside pickup or shipping items to customers’ homes. The company said it plans to hire nearly twice as many seasonal workers to fill online orders compared with last year.

FedEx also said it plans to hire more seasonal workers this year: 55,000, up from 50,000 in 2017.

Macy’s plans to hire about 80,000 seasonal workers, the same number it initially announced last year before adding another 7,000 holiday jobs in December. But fewer of this year’s group of holiday hires will be working in Macy’s stores. About 23,500 of the 80,000 jobs are in fulfillment centers handling online orders, up from 18,000 last year, the Cincinnati-based department store chain said.

Retailers have cut thousands of jobs while closing stores in recent years, but they also have created new ones in areas supporting growing online sales, such as fulfillment centers, logistics and transportation.

Some retailers, like Kohl’s and J.C. Penney, began hiring seasonal workers significantly earlier than in prior years.

Wisconsin-based Kohl’s announced in June — about three months earlier than last year — that seasonal jobs were available at more than 300 stores. Additional hiring started at all stores, distribution and fulfillment centers in August, and Kohl’s has been holding hiring events in stores. Target and Macy’s have scheduled nationwide hiring events in October.

Target said all new hires would start at a minimum wage of \$12 per hour and get store discounts. As a new perk, the retailer will randomly select one hourly worker at each store and distribution center to receive a \$500 gift card and \$500 donation to a local community organization of their choice.

Kohl’s, which plans to hire more than 90,000 seasonal workers, has competitive wages, a weekly pay schedule and certain days when employees get larger-than-usual discounts, spokeswoman Julia Markun said. Macy’s also said it gives seasonal workers competitive pay, merchandise discounts and the ability to earn quarterly incentives if they achieve certain goals.

Bomb threat forces evacuation at city council forum

NORWALK – More than 100 people attending a community forum Wednesday were forced to evacuate the Social Services Center after one of the public speakers threatened he had an IED, or improvised explosive device, in his car outside.

It was during the public comment portion of the meeting that speaker Richard Lambert grew hostile, using expletives and the “N word” before threatening he had the components of a bomb.

Sheriff’s officials removed Lambert from the meeting and handcuffed him in the hallway. A Norwalk Patriot reporter covering the forum asked Lambert if he had any comment and he replied, “Not at this time.”

The Social Services Center was evacuated, as were nearby homes. At around 11 p.m., the sheriff’s bomb squad cleared the scene, allowing residents to return home.

Moffitt Elementary’s Josie Hernandez named Teacher of the Year

NORWALK – Josie Hernandez, an educator with a quarter century of service at the same elementary campus in the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District, has been named a 2018 Los Angeles County Teacher of the Year.

Hernandez, a kindergarten teacher at Moffitt Elementary School in Norwalk, was one of the 16 county teachers of the year who were announced by the Los Angeles County Office of Education at a formal ceremony held Sept. 21 at Universal City.

The 16 teachers were presented by L.A. County Superintendent of Schools Debra Duardo as outstanding classroom educators who have served with praiseworthy distinction.

All the county winners will automatically advance, along with other county titlists from around the state, to the California Teachers of the Year competition later in the fall. The top state winner will then advance to the National Teacher of the Year contest that takes place next spring.

“It is an incredible honor to be named a county teacher of the year,” said Hernandez, a resident of La Mirada, about her selection. “I work with some of the most passionate, dedicated and incredibly talented educators

who share in my passion. I became an educator because I have a passion for storytelling. I believe that every child is a story, and I have the opportunity to influence the ending.”

Hernandez began as a paraeducator at the Moffitt campus in 1993 and, after receiving a teaching credential, she became a full-time teacher for the school, starting as a 2nd-grade bilingual instructor. She was named last spring as the NLMUSD teacher of the year and the district’s entrant into the county competition.

Hernandez is the second consecutive county titlist for NLMUSD. Last year, Jennifer Hodge, a visual arts teacher at Benton Middle School in La Mirada, was named a county teacher of the year. She finished as a finalist in the state TOY contest.

Hernandez, 44, a native of Orange County with four children of her own, is the first born of working-class parents who emigrated from Mexico. She is the first in her family to attend and graduate from college. She earned a bachelor’s degree in Spanish linguistics and culture from California State University, Long Beach and a master’s degree in reading intervention from National University.

“We are especially proud of Josie and her many years of accomplishments in the classroom,” said NLMUSD Board of Education President Chris Pflanzner about Hernandez, who

earlier this year was named as the district’s teacher of the year. “She is absolutely an exemplary teacher and very deserving of this special honor.”

District Superintendent Dr. Hasmik Danielian noted that Hernandez brings a culturally sensitive teaching style to her classroom every day. “She is known for her wonderful passion and energy. Josie has been such a positive role model for her students.”

Judged as the county’s top public-school educators for this academic year, the 16 winners were selected from a field of 61 district-level teachers of the year who participated in the 37th annual county contest. The winners will serve as standard-bearers for the teaching profession and their 72,000 classroom colleagues countywide. Each of the winners received a \$1,000 cash award from California Credit Union.

In addition to Hernandez and Hodge, there have been at least three other NLMUSD educators who have been named as county teachers of the year:

Kelly Baker (2013), a district technology coach;

Kristine Cvar (2000), the former NLMUSD director of elementary education; and

Gerri Gandolfo (1997), a counselor at La Mirada High School.

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Is this any way to confirm a Supreme Court justice?

Until two weeks ago, President Donald Trump’s nomination of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to a seat on the U.S. Supreme Court seemed a sure thing. He ably handled more than 1,200 questions put to him by members of the Senate Judiciary Committee. He demonstrated even to his adversaries a masterful command of constitutional jurisprudence. The FBI had completed six background investigations of Kavanaugh throughout his career in government, and it found no blemishes.

Trump promised that he would appoint federal judges and justices who generally share his views on life, guns and administrative regulations and who have a minimalistic view of federal power. When he announced the Kavanaugh nomination, it appeared he had found his man.

The nomination requires Senate confirmation by a majority vote. The Senate currently has 51 Republicans and 49 Democrats. A few Republican senators do not share the president’s stated views on the judiciary, and a few Democrats do. The inside consensus was that enough Democratic senators running for re-election in states that Trump carried in 2016 would vote to confirm Kavanaugh and those Democrats would handily offset the few Republicans who might oppose him.

During his confirmation hearings, Kavanaugh dutifully followed the pattern of all current sitting justices at their confirmation hearings by declining to answer hypothetical questions which sought answers as to how he might vote on certain issues likely to come before the court. He survived the grueling cross-examination by Committee Democrats and even won begrudging praise from a few.

Then, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, a Democratic member of the Judiciary Committee, dropped a bombshell.

She revealed that a constituent who wished to remain anonymous had written a letter to a member of the House of Representatives, who had turned the letter over to Feinstein. The letter contained allegations by the writer, Dr. Christine Blasey Ford, that Kavanaugh had drunkenly attempted sexual assault against her 36 years ago. Feinstein had the letter for two months before she revealed its existence — a week after the Kavanaugh confirmation hearings had ended.

This is reminiscent of allegations leveled by Professor Anita Hill against then-Judge Clarence Thomas, though those allegations were of inappropriate words in the workplace and the Ford allegations are of force and violence in a bedroom. When Hill’s allegations were published, President George H.W. Bush dispatched the FBI to resume its background investigation of Thomas, and it did so.

Trump has declined to dispatch the FBI to investigate Ford’s allegations, and other allegations that have now followed hers, because he and Senate Republicans are determined to seat Kavanaugh by next week.

In the absence of an FBI investigation, Ford gave an interview to The Washington Post in which she aired her complaints in graphic detail, despite missing facts and fuzzy recollections. Democrats demanded that the Judiciary Committee hear from her

and again from Kavanaugh. They appear to be assuming that Kavanaugh should not enjoy the American presumption of innocence and — without hearing a word from Ford or seeing any corroborating evidence — have concluded that Kavanaugh must be guilty of this alleged offense and thus cannot be confirmed.

Then the folks in the White House who are managing the Kavanaugh nomination advised him to violate Criminal Procedure 101: Don’t deny publicly an allegation before it has credibly and publicly been made. So, Kavanaugh was interviewed by my Fox News colleague Martha MacCallum. Her questions were far better than his answers.

His answers to the allegations contained in a newspaper story were three-fold — he didn’t do it, he wants a fair process and — unthinkable — he was a virgin during his high school and college years. I say “unthinkably” not because virginity is beyond belief but because this claim was not in response to any of MacCallum’s questions and it bore so deeply into Kavanaugh’s personhood as to be none of the public’s business. And it is not a defense to the Ford allegations.

What’s going on here?

What’s going on is crisis and panic. The pro-choice Democrats are in crisis: They are so fearful of a decisive vote to limit the Supreme Court’s abortion jurisprudence that they are willing to destroy a qualified judge’s career to block his advancement. And Kavanaugh’s handlers, who, at this writing, probably lack the votes for confirmation, have recklessly put him on the offensive, even if it is debasing and invasive.

Now we await a potentially tragic confrontation on national television between Ford and Kavanaugh, which will come down to perception rather than reality. The issue is not whether he did it. Rather, it is whether his denials are more believable than her allegations. At the end of their Judiciary Committee confrontation, will the general public perception be that Ford was more credible or that Kavanaugh was more credible?

There are no rules here. Ford has no legal obligation to prove her allegations, and Kavanaugh has no legal obligation to disprove them.

A tie — the public perception that Ford and Kavanaugh are equally credible — will be very troublesome for Kavanaugh. No woman would go through what Ford is going through if she lacked a personal commitment to the truth. So Kavanaugh can only win if Dr. Christine Ford is generally disbelieved.

The Kavanaugh nomination was supposed to be Trump’s gift to his pro-life, conservative, evangelical base. It has become anything but that. If Judge Brett Kavanaugh is confirmed, will he ever lose the taint of these allegations? If he is not confirmed, can he return to the second-highest court in the land, on which he now sits? Is this how the framers expected the selection process for the Supreme Court to play out? In a word: No.

We know who you were, and are, Brett Kavanaugh

Crybaby. We know who you were in high school, Brett Kavanaugh, in college, and so on.

The public case against Kavanaugh’s character is building, rising like a river. He can’t believe this is happening to him, the lucky golden boy. That empty seat on the Supreme Court had his name on it. President Donald Trump said so. He’s an advocate for women, he says on Fox News. And then the elite Yalie teared up like a choirboy.

Christine Blasey Ford’s story of a sexual assault incident, which she is telling at great cost to herself, will not move these men from their stony heights. If that’s what Kavanaugh did, they really don’t care. It took me a long time to learn that the truth will not set you free in that crowd.

Rural Iowa’s cranky, salty Senator Charles Grassley, 85, chairs the committee. He may not have heard of the #MeToo movement. One of Hill’s tormentors, Senator Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, has not learned much in 27 years.

A cloud of deja vu is hanging over me — and you, too? People galvanized by the Senate’s shabby treatment of Hill in 1991 are bracing to support Dr. Blasey (as she is known professionally) as she faces hostile questions.

Even worse, the Republicans have hired a female lawyer to ask the questions, trying to hide their all-male optics. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., refused to reveal her name, and said the move will ensure the hearing is “respectful.”

There are four good Democratic women on the committee, and several men. Just you wait, Judge Kavanaugh, for Sens. Kamala Harris, D-Calif., and Dick Durbin, D-Ill.

We know who Kavanaugh was at a Catholic all-boys prep school. That was his first mistake. Boasts about conquests of one girl were banded about on his class yearbook’s pages. We know this via testimonials and his hard-drinking best friend’s book on their “Wasted” years. He was no saint.

When Kavanaugh was young, he was a swaggering piece of work, breathing privilege from every pore. His Yale fraternity was notorious for alcohol, abuse, violence and rowdy parties. Consider Brett Kavanaugh a party man in every sense. No, he doesn’t deserve the benefit of the doubt. The country does.

The feature photo is of a model in a wild “gold corduroy ensemble” boasting exaggerated lapels and wide-legged pants. (They forgot the big red nose.) She’s sitting cross-legged on top of a desk, so we also got to see her black fishnet stockings and roach-killer pointy shoes with ankle straps. ICYMI, heels with ankle straps speak not of power but of captivity.

There’s none of that telegraph-your-individuality in the piece for men. Its unmistakable message is that your sloppy inner self needs containing.

David Coggins, an expert on men’s dress and manners, is quoted as bluntly telling guys who don’t tuck in their shirts at work, “Instead of aspiring to look elegant, you look like it’s Sunday afternoon, you’re living in squalor or you’re still in college.”

For the fashion industry, the tailored women’s business suits of yore had to die because they stayed in style year after year. But it’s not true that they hide the woman within. Katharine Hepburn wore traditional tailoring to great seductive effect.

And if you want to get au courant about it, consider Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez in her conservatively styled suits. They make the 28-year-old socialist look as if she could be running General Motors as opposed to breaking it up.

Sisters, wear what you want, but do not labor under the delusion that sartorial rebellion in the office will draw anything more than stares. When it comes to most fashion advice, even in business publications, know that women are drawing the short straw.

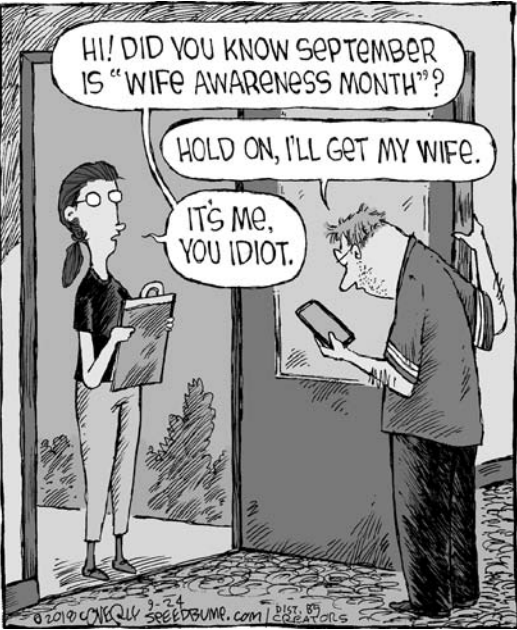
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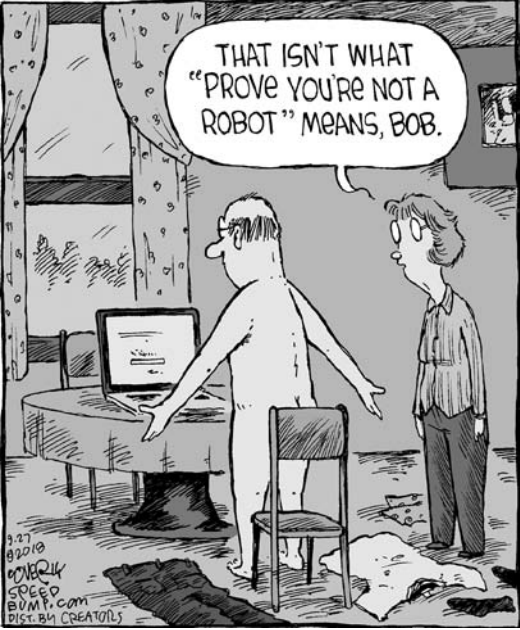
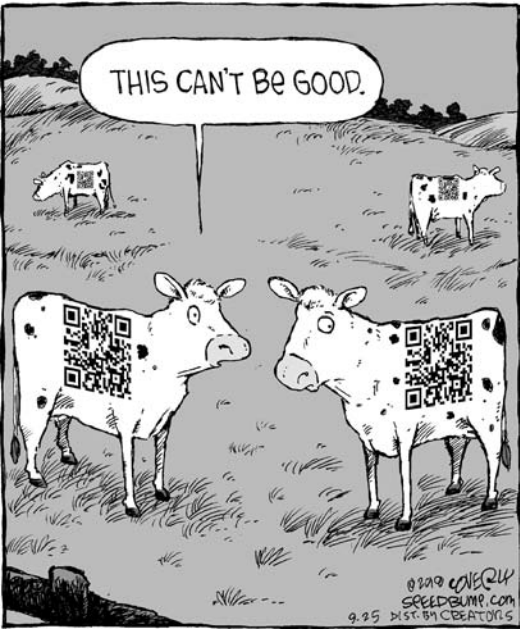

Norwalk man charged with murder

NORWALK — A Norwalk man was charged today with killing two people and injuring others in a DUI crash on the 605 Freeway.

Alex Barragan (dob 8/27/86) faces two counts of murder and one count each of driving under the influence of alcohol within 10 years of another DUI offense and driving with a .08 percent blood alcohol content causing injury within 10 years of another DUI offense.

Arraignment was scheduled for Wednesday at Los Angeles County Superior Court, Bellflower Branch.

On July 16, Barragan was allegedly driving his car on the freeway near Alondra Boulevard when he rear ended a disabled van, prosecutors said. The van erupted in flames and two people died and three others were injured, prosecutors added.

If convicted as charged, Barragan faces a possible maximum sentence of 44 years to life in state prison.

Bail is set at more than \$2.19 million.

The case remains under investigation by the California Highway Patrol, Santa Fe Springs Area.

Former college football player charged with home invasion

NORWALK – Jalen Daniel Hall, a former receiver with the Oregon Ducks, and another man have been charged with a home invasion robbery in Norwalk.

Hall, 19, and Millard Lefenus Hill, 18, were each charged with three counts of home invasion robbery, two counts of kidnapping to commit robbery, and one count of first-degree burglary.

The charges include allegations that Hall was armed with a semi-automatic handgun.

Hall and Hill allegedly participated in the robbery on Sept. 10. Three victims inside the house were reportedly threatened and moved around the home while jewelry and other valuables were stolen.

They fled from police after the robbery but a sheriff airship tracked them down, leading to their arrest.

Bail was set at more than \$2 million each and they both face



a maximum sentence of life in state prison if convicted.

Hall, a 6-foot-4 Long Beach native, joined the Ducks after fielding offers from many of the top universities around the country. He left the team after only one spring practice, however, citing a personal matter.

Oregon football coach Mario

Cristobal officially announced that Hall was no longer a member of the Ducks on Sept. 12.

“Well he hasn’t been on the roster for a pretty long time now,” Cristobal said. “We’re moving on and certainly it is what it is. He hasn’t been on the roster and hasn’t been part of our team roster for some time now.”
