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The President fell for a Saudi prince’s charming spell

The grand romance with the crown prince is over, with blood spilled at the Saudi Arabian consulate in Turkey, where the three world religions and East and West meet.

Send the thank-you note to novice Jared Kushner and his father-in-law, President Donald Trump. Winging foreign policy, Kushner fell under the spell of Mohammed bin Salman, the Saudi prince who is anything but a reformer, by his own admission. Now a countryman’s murder points to the prince.

Not even murderous Macbeth, the Scottish villain in Shakespeare’s greatest tragedy, would do what was done to the self-exiled Saudi journalist, Jamal Khashoggi.

Here we stand at a turning point for the nation, the wide world watching, facing the question: What do we stand for?

No, really, tell me. Is it something besides being the richest arms dealer on earth? Surely Mike Pompeo, secretary of state, will sort it out on his emergency trip to see the Saudi rulers.

Riyadh, the capital, was the first foreign visit the president paid. Trump felt at home with the gold, glitz and servitude. Symbolically, that choice radiated a radical shift in America’s strong stance on human rights. It sent a sour message to our best friends and allies, Britain, France and Germany: a new gang is in town.

U.S. intelligence tells us the Saudi journalist walked in and never left that squat building in beautiful Istanbul. A critic of the cruel desert kingdom, Khashoggi was (apparently) brutally murdered by Saudi agents at that very spot. Reportedly, they tried to wash the blood before letting investigators inside.

After days of denial, the kingdom has finally spoken: Death came during an interrogation. That confirms what Turkish authorities said, that the journalist was likely tortured. (Turkish strongman, President Tayyip Erdogan, is the good guy in the gruesome plot.)

Recall Trump declared “war” on the press his first full day in office, brazenly defying the First Amendment. So why should he really care about a foreign journalist’s devastating death?

The White House Correspondents’ Association hasn’t issued a



statement.

Khashoggi, just shy of 60, served the Saudi monarchy much of his life. A U.S. resident, he contributed columns to The Washington Post and had reason to feel good as a free man. He kissed his bride-to-be goodbye — “my darling” — and walked into the consulate alone in broad daylight, seeking a document for his wedding.

The writer once belonged to the shady Islamist Muslim Brotherhood, but became more progressive.

Well did he know King Salman and the crown prince — who goes by a Western nickname, MBS — hated his dissent from the repressive regime. But would they come for him in Istanbul, a thriving world capital and crossroads?

“This never would have happened without MBS’s approval. Never, never, never,” a former senior diplomat told The Washington Post. The crown prince, 33, with a tight grip on power, campaigns hard to impress upon Western leaders and investors that he is modernizing the medieval oil kingdom, literally the last place on earth for a woman to live, covered and silenced.

The prince let women to drive, but incarcerated several women’s rights advocates. He detained untold numbers, “been ruthless in asserting power” and ordered a “wave of executions,” since becoming heir to King Salman, according to The Post.

The brash crown prince once spoke sharply to President Obama, hectoring him — not often done with a head of state. True to form, Obama was too polite to walk out. Did the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks come up? Passing strange that 15 of the 19 hijackers were Saudis.

Kushner was bamboozled by the prince’s aura. So were a host of rich powerful men who flocked to the first “Future Investment Initiative” conference last October in Riyadh. A second flashy showcase (“Davos in the desert”) is scheduled his month, though the list of dropouts includes Wall Street titan Jamie Dimon and Uber chief Dara Khosrowshahi.

I’m sorry to say Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin is on the fence about going. He’ll decide Friday. But wars are raging — one of which Saudi Arabia is waging on Yemen. Then there’s always Iran. So there are billions in arms to sell at that bazaar.

That may trump everything.

The need for criminal justice reform

Kanye West’s literal embrace of Donald Trump was all over the news last week. The president’s rhetorical embrace of criminal justice reform got considerably less attention, but may prove more consequential.

In an interview with Fox News on the morning of his meeting with the rap impresario, Trump signaled that he was ready to go beyond “back-end” reform, which focuses on rehabilitation of inmates, and support “front end” reform, which focuses on reducing sentences and sending fewer people to prison. The key to understanding Trump’s remarks is Alice Marie Johnson, whose sentence the president commuted in June at the behest of West’s wife, Kim Kardashian.

Johnson, a first-time offender who received a life sentence in 1996 for participating in a Memphis cocaine trafficking organization, has described herself as “a telephone mule, passing messages between the distributors and sellers.” While serving nearly 22 years in federal prison, she became a grandmother and great-grandmother, an ordained minister and a mentor to other inmates.

Although it took the intercession of a fellow reality TV star for Trump to free Johnson, he clearly was impressed by her story. More important, he recognizes that Johnson, whom he calls “the most incredible woman,” is not unique in receiving an absurdly disproportionate sentence for a nonviolent crime.

“You have many people like Mrs. Johnson,” Trump said on Fox News. “There are people in jail for really long terms.”

Notably, Trump did not say the solution is more commutations, although those would certainly be welcome. “There has to be a reform, because it’s very unfair right now,” he said. “It’s very unfair to African-Americans. It’s very unfair to everybody.”

Trump had high praise for criminal justice reforms in Texas and Georgia, which in recent years have seen falling crime rates even as they reduced their prison populations. “They really have done a tremendous job with reform,” he said.

These comments, which may seem surprising from a man who has consciously cultivated a tough-on-crime image, reflect the influence of people Trump respects, people like his son-in-law, Jared Kushner, and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, a supporter of the conservative reform organization Right on Crime. And yes, people like Kanye West and Kim Kardashian.

That influence could be crucial in the ongoing debate about federal sentencing reform. Last May, the House overwhelmingly approved the FIRST STEP Act, a collection of modest prison reforms aimed at reducing recidivism and promoting reintegration. The bill is on hold in the Senate, where Judiciary Committee Chairman Charles Grassley (R-Iowa) is demanding that it include sentencing reforms as well.

The latest proposal would incorporate into the FIRST STEP Act four elements of Grassley’s Sentencing Reform and Corrections

Act. The amendments would widen the “safety valve” that lets some drug offenders escape mandatory minimum sentences, narrow the criteria for mandatory minimums that apply to repeat drug offenders, clarify that escalating sentences for drug offenders who have guns require prior convictions, and retroactively apply the shorter crack cocaine sentences that Congress approved in 2010.

If Trump backs the changes Grassley wants, an amended bill could be approved by the lame-duck Congress after the election. “I believe the president was sincere,” said Jason Pye, the vice president of legislative affairs at FreedomWorks, which supports sentencing reform. “I was skeptical when the White House began dabbling in this more than year ago. But the White House has been fully engaged on this.”

People do change their minds about these issues: Not long ago, Grassley himself was an ardent opponent of sentencing reform. In Trump’s case, the evolutionary pressure may come from people he disdains as well as people he admires.

Attorney General Jeff Sessions is no fan of sentencing reform, which may count in its favor, as far as Trump is concerned. If Sessions does not get on board with “prison reform,” Trump said on Fox News, “then he gets overruled by me, because I make the decision.”

On Wall Street, Us R Toys

As America emerged from World War II, the public generally agreed that the ordinary people who had endured the sacrifice should share in the good times ahead. A golden age for the American worker commenced as business, labor and government stood together on the stage.

Labor has since fallen off. Behold the spectacle at Toys R Us.

About a year ago, the company filed for a Chapter 11 bankruptcy. Its private-equity owners closed 800 stores and laid off 33,000 employees — skipping out on \$75 million in severance pay.

Toys R Us had its challenges, but it wasn’t a dying business. It was cannibalized by a private-equity culture that sees workers not as stakeholders but as part of the plunder.

More than 40 percent of the major retail or supermarket companies that have gone bankrupt since 2015 were owned by private-equity companies, Newsday found.

Toys R Us offers a vivid example of how they operate. In their 2005 leveraged buyout, two private-equity firms, Bain Capital and KKR, and Vornado Realty Trust immediately piled on over \$3 billion of new debt.

With 97 percent of its operating profits now going to pay interest, the company had little left to fix up the stores. How could it compete with Walmart, much less Amazon? There was no cushion when the Great Recession hit.

Basically, the investors had put the company in handcuffs, seized its life vest and thrown it in the ocean. If Toys R Us survived, the investors would declare themselves geniuses. If it didn’t, they’d walk away after collecting \$470 million in interest and “advisory fees.”

The worker advocacy group Rise Up Retail wants that money to go to the laid-off employees. But in the bankruptcy proceeding, they stand in line behind other creditors. “They may end up getting nothing,” according to a Bloomberg report.

Here’s the kicker — or shall we call it “the kick”? The investors now talk about reviving Toys R Us. They’re keeping its brand names and web domains. And they’ve trotted out the Toys R Us mascot,

Geoffrey the Giraffe.

“Guess who’s back?” Toys R Us recently tweeted. “He’s been traveling across the globe for the past few months but now #GeoffreysBack and once again ready to set play free for children.”

The brand clearly still has value. If the owners can dump the company’s debt and legacy wages for employees, they could go back into business, worker advocates speculate. New people could be hired at lower wages.

The resurfacing of Geoffrey has enraged laid-off employees. Toys R Us sells touchy-feely products, and abused workers picketing its properties might not be good for sales.

Facing noxious publicity, Bain and KKR set up a \$20 million “hardship” fund to help the laid-off workers, nowhere near what’s owed them. Vornado didn’t participate.

Meanwhile, Solus Alternative Asset Management, a hedge fund that holds some Toys R Us debt, accused the workers’-rights groups of trying to extort investment companies.

Other countries have significant private-equity investment but more rules of the road. In Germany, for example, most workers are guaranteed severance payments. It seems highly unlikely that the current leadership in Washington will do anything to displease Wall Street.

But some state-run public pension funds that invest in private-equity and hedge funds are asking sharp questions about their role. After all, they represent public employees, many unhappy at how these companies victimize other workers and hurt communities.

It’s understood that in our economic system, companies sometimes fail and workers lose their jobs. But this belief that workers are nobodies, mere pieces the investors can flick off the Monopoly board with no consequences, is a mark of our toxic times. It wasn’t always like that.

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



Whittier school district switches to by-trustee area elections

WHITTIER – The Whittier Union High School District will launch a series of public meetings to gather community input as it begins the process of shifting from at-large elections to by-trustee area elections after the Board of Trustees unanimously approved the transition at its Oct. 9 board meeting.

The shift means that instead of residents voting for any board candidate on the ballot within the Whittier Union District boundaries, residents will vote for a single candidate residing in their newly drawn trustee-area, usually one-fifth of the entire district. The change will go into effect November 2020.

“Every decision our Board of Trustees makes has always been based on what is best for students and their families,” Superintendent Martin Plourde said. “We are proud of the fact that no matter who sits on this board, student successes and achievements remain the priority. Whittier Union is committed to making this a transparent, inclusive process in which all members of our community will be engaged and each voice will be valued and heard.”

The district discussed districting criteria during public hearings Tuesday and will again Tuesday, Oct. 30. Issues to be discussed could include creating compact, contiguous districts, preserving existing political communities and equal population sizes, and ensuring each high school attendance areas are represented by multiple board members.

A professional demographer will draw possible trustee area maps based on those criteria and present the maps during a public hearing at the regular board meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 13. Whittier Union community members will be able to provide input and testimony regarding the proposed trustee areas.

The District will subsequently host a series of open houses/workshops and offer community presentations for residents to review and provide input regarding maps and corresponding election plans and learn about the process for selecting a map. Those dates have yet to be determined.

Revised and additional maps will be reviewed during a regular board meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 11. The board anticipates narrowing the number of maps for review on Tuesday, Jan. 15.

Once the public has provided input, the school board expects to select a final trustee map on Tuesday, Feb. 12. The approved map would then be presented to the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization, likely the following day.

NORWALK – Five of the six candidates vying for four open seats on the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District board of education met for a candidates’ forum in the Norwalk council chambers on Monday. The general election is slated for Nov. 6.

In attendance were candidates Jorge Tirado, Ana Valencia (incumbent), Norma Amezcua (appointed), Miguel Rivera, and Jude Cazares (appointed).

Absent for the event was long-time board member Darrell

Adams.

The format was simple enough: Each candidate would be given a short chance to introduce themselves, followed by questions. Finally, each candidate had time to offer a final statement.

In the audience were supporters, current schoolboard members, Norwalk vice mayor and former school board member Margarita Rios and community members.

With familiar faces in the race, this marks the first campaign for all but 17- year incumbent Ana Valencia.

It was Valencia’s surprise announcement towards the end of the forum that, “Win or lose, this will be my last campaign.”

When asked afterwards what she meant by the statement,

Valencia stated that she had no plans to seek any other political office in the future.

While all candidates at one time or another asked for the question to be repeated, they all seemed to be relatively prepared to answer the questions asked.

After each thanked all those in attendance for the opportunity to express their views on the future of the two-city school district, their individual answers reflected quite a bit on the personal frame of reference, or, where they were coming from.

Candidate Jorge Tirado, coming from a military background, exclaimed several times that “Leadership started at the top,” and worked its way down.

Appointed school board member and candidate Jude Cazares, on the other, felt that

leadership began at the bottom and worked its way up.

Ana Valencia commented on her 17 years on the board with what she referred to as her “teammates” on the School Board in what she considered the successes over the last year.

In a follow up interview, she exclaimed that she was the deciding vote when it came to outfitting John Glenn High School with the state-of-the-art athletic facilities currently under construction utilizing voter-approved Measure G funds. That project is worth \$25 million and is expected to be available for use in the Spring of 2019.

One of the questions asked was each candidates take on the NLUSD’s vision for the future.

Candidate Jorge Tirado continued with, “We need leaders.”

Jude Cazares followed with, “[We need] to make sure the district becomes the premier district, and to prepare students for college and career [paths].”

Norma Amezcua added she wanted to make sure that the, “social emotional needs of the subtends were met.”

Ana Valencia stated that her plans included, “safe school environments.”

Miguel Rivera continued said he wanted to ensure that the students were “college and career ready.”

While all candidates seemed to wish the same for the students and their families, it was candidate Miguel Rivera, talking form his wheelchair, who seemed to have experience with some of the challenges awaiting the districts disabled students, faculty, families and guests of

the district.

Asked afterwards about some of these challenges, Rivera spoke of no wheelchair access at the baseball fields at Norwalk High School and the inaccessibility of his wheelchair in some of the district’s restrooms.

If elected, he stated he would address these shortcomings in the first 60 days in office. A bright smile and determination showed in his answers and comments afterwards.

After the one-and-a-half-hour event, all candidates had the opportunity to address individual questions directly.

The tragedy of MLB’s pension rules

NORWALK – Next month will mark the one-year anniversary of former Major League Baseball (MLB) hurler Tommy Joe Moore’s death at 69.

Moore, who was a pit boss at the Morongo Casino, passed away of lymphoma in Pioneertown on November 16, 2017.

There is more than a little irony in that, since I have long contended that the business of baseball is the pits.

See, though MLB and the union representing today’s

players, the Major League Baseball Players’ Association (MLBPA), are rolling in money -- according to one post-1980 player, the union’s pension and welfare fund is valued at more than \$3.5 billion, while MLB recently announced that its revenue was up 325 percent from 1992, and that it has made \$500 million since 2015.

What’s more, the average value of the each of the 30 clubs is up 19 percent from 2016, to \$1.54 billion -- the league and the union are victimizing the men like Moore, who no longer can fight for himself.

An alum of John Glenn High School, Moore, who was married

four times and had four children, as well as three step children by his fourth wife, Sharon, played for the New York Mets in 1972 and 1973, the St. Louis Cardinals in 1975 and the Seattle Mariners in 1975.

In 42 career appearances, all but three of them in relief, he pitched 88 and one-third innings and recorded two victories.

Yet because he played prior to 1980 and hadn’t accrued the necessary four years of service credit needed to be vested in the MLB pension plan.

As a result of a vesting change that occurred during the Memorial Day Weekend, players

who accrued at least 43 game days of service after 1980 are currently guaranteed a MLB pension.

The league also averted a strike by agreeing that, going forward, all that a player needed to be eligible to buy into the league’s health insurance plan was one game day of service on an active MLB roster.

But men like Moore, who accrued between 43 game days of service but less than four years of service, were left out in the cold. Regrettably, the union forgot to request retroactivity for these pre-1980 men.

In April 2011, men like Moore began receiving \$625 for every 43

game days they spent on an active MLB roster, up to 16 quarters.

However, unlike a real pension, which can be passed on to a spouse or other designated beneficiary or loved one, that payment is discontinued when the man dies.

As a result, when the non-qualified payments are disbursed every February, Sharon doesn’t receive a plug nickel.

Meanwhile, if you’re vested, the maximum pension is \$220,000.

The irony should be lost on nobody: Moore’s family is now being treated just as badly as he was.

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Cerritos sailor talks life aboard a U.S. Air Force carrier

CERRITOS – A Cerritos native and 2005 Salem High School graduate is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS John C. Stennis, a floating airport at sea.

Petty Officer 1st Class Michael Angelo Burdios is a ship's serviceman serving aboard the carrier.

A Navy ship's serviceman is responsible for providing morale-boosting services for sailors, such as the ship's store, laundry services, and the barber shop.

“We bring a sense of home to the crew on the ship,” said Burdios. “Being able to make a difference to sailors, and turn their day around, is the best part of the job for me.”

Approximately 3,200 men and women make up the crew of John C. Stennis, with an additional 2,000 sailors assigned to the ship's embarked air wing, Carrier Air Wing 9.

Named in honor of former

Senator John C. Stennis from Mississippi, the carrier is longer than three football fields, measuring nearly 1,100 feet. The ship, a true floating city, weighs more than 100,000 tons and has a flight deck that is 252 feet wide.

When the air wing is embarked, the ship carries more than 70 attack jets, helicopters and other aircraft, all of which take off from and land aboard the carrier at sea.

Powerful catapults slingshot the aircraft off the bow of the ship. The planes land aboard the carrier by snagging a steel cable with an arresting hook that protrudes from the rear of the aircraft.

Burdios combines the lessons learned from both the Navy and Serritos to take personal responsibility in performing assigned tasks and leading others.

"I learned the value of respect and motivation growing up," said Burdios. "You have to give respect to every aspect of your



naval career, and being able to honor those who've gone before us is important to me."

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied upon assets, Burdios and other John C. Stennis sailors know they are part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes providing the Navy the nation needs.

"Serving in the Navy is a blessing for me," said Burdios.

"It's been life-changing for me, and I'm definitely not the same person I was before I got in. It's a lifestyle for me, and I'm definitely proud of who I've become."

Man rescued after falling into mine shaft while searching for gold

ARIZONA – An Arizona man was searching for gold when he fell into a 100-foot-deep mine shaft in a remote desert area sparking an hours-long rescue mission.

John Waddell, 60, was pulled

from the abandoned shaft Wednesday night, two days after his carabiner clip broke sending him tumbling 40 to 50 feet into the bottom of the mine.

Terry Shrader said Waddell, his close friend, called him on Monday to say he was trekking out to the remote desert area, located near Aguila about 90 miles northwest of Phoenix, to search for the precious metal.

Waddell often frequented the area, but the two had made a deal that if Waddell wasn't back by Tuesday Shrader needed to search for him.

Shrader told NBC News that he became worried on Wednesday when he still had not heard from Waddell.

Luckily, he knew exactly where to find his friend.

“Just as I pulled up in the truck, I could hear him hollering,” he said about arriving at the mine shaft.

Shrader said he found an area where he could get cell phone service and called 911. He then dropped water down to his friend as they waited for help.

Waddell's dramatic rescue was caught on video and shows rescue workers using rope to pull the man to safety. It took about five hours before Waddell was removed from the shaft.

He was then flown to a hospital for non-life-threatening injuries, Maricopa County Sheriff's Office Sgt.

Joaquin Enriquez tweeted.

"We are looking forward to his recovery. Great outcome today with all MCSO and law enforcement partners," he wrote.

Shrader said Waddell told him he had to kill three rattlesnakes to keep them from biting him as he waited for someone to find him.

"He's a tough guy," Shrader told NBC's News 12. "I've never seen anything like this. He's got both artificial knees, one of them was messed up pretty bad."
