Hahn backs bill to convert motels

ANGELES The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has voted unanimously support legislation in Sacramento that would streamline the process of converting motels into supportive and transitional housing.

"Converting motels into supportive housing should be a quick and cost-effective way to address our homeless crisis-- but stricter regulations often make these conversions more difficult and more expensive than other housing projects," said Supervisor Janice Hahn.

streamlining motel conversions we can get people off the streets quickly and into safe, supportive units where they can begin the long process of putting their lives back together."

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a motion by Hahn to support SB 450 authored by State Senator Thomas J. Umberg (D-Santa Ana).

bill would exempt projects related to the conversion of a motel into supportive or transitional housing from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Projects that would qualify for exemptions would not increase the number of dwelling units and would make only minor alterations to the interior of the buildings to add cooking facilities and the provision of a hotplate or microwave to individual units.

Dead baby found in Bellflower is ID'd

BELLFLOWER – A deceased 8-month-old girl has been identified as the daughter of a Sacramento County man after both were reported missing and the child's body was found in the parking lot of a Bellflower mortuary, authorities confirmed Tuesday.

The Los Angeles County coroner's office said the girl's name was Alexia Rose Echeverria. She was discovered in a car seat, partially wrapped in a blanket, on the ground behind a dumpster Monday evening in the 10300 block of Alondra Boulevard, according to investigators.

According to Los Angeles County sheriff's investigators, Echeverria was driving a gray 2014 Volkswagen Jetta with the California license plate No. 7FFT866. Authorities said he has family in the Bellflower area.

Cerritos College sets record with more than 5,000 graduates

The junior college saw a 25% increase in associate degrees for

NORWALK – For the fourth consecutive year, Cerritos College shattered its own graduation record, having certified the largest number of degrees and certificates awarded in the campus' history.

During Commencement 2019 its 61st annual commencement ceremony held on Friday, May 24, the College conferred more than 5,000 degrees and certificates. The Class of 2019 overwhelmingly surpassed last year's recordbreaking number of degrees and certificates by almost 1,500

The college also saw a 25 percent increase in awards to students who earned an Associate Degree for Transfer (AA-T/AS-T) from 2018 to 2019, with more than 1,300 degrees awarded. The AA-T/ AS-T degree guarantees transfer admission to the California State University system.

Since its inception in 2012, more than 5,700 students have earned AA-T/AS-T degrees at Cerritos College. The College currently has 27 AA-T/AS-T degree programs.

Angelica Fregoso, a graduate of the record-breaking Class of 2019, is receiving an AA-T in psychology. She is part of the college's Scholars' Honors Program, and is transferring to UCLA. Through the honors program, Angelica participated in UCLA's Community College to PhD Scholars Program, a seven-month research program.

In addition, Angelica will spend eight weeks at the University of Iowa completing its Summer Research Opportunity Program.

"I would not have the privilege to take advantage of these opportunities without the Scholars' Honors Program, and for that, I am eternally grateful," said Angelica. After earning her bachelor's degree in psychology, she plans to pursue a doctoral degree, and become a psychology research professor in order to give back to her community by mentoring.

Eric Draper, former White House chief photographer for President George W. Bush, served as

the 61st commencement speaker. A Cerritos College alumnus, Draper inspired graduates to find a purpose in life and challenged them to "never underestimate themselves, never be afraid to ask for what they want, and not let their fears hold them back."

"The fact that our students are breaking graduation records year after year is unprecedented in our campus' history, this shows their drive to succeed and the commitment of our faculty, staff, administrators, and everyone at Cerritos college who make our students' education and success their number one priority," said

Norwalk passes \$151 million balanced budget

its 2019-20 spending plan without warn of increasing pension costs.

NORWALK - Norwalk's City Council this week gave the green light to a \$151.5 million balanced budget for fiscal year 2019-20, a spending plan that includes funding for capital outlay projects and homeless outreach despite a half-million dollar increase to its Sheriff's Department contract.

Norwalk City Manager Jesus Gomez said the budget maintains service levels from the previous fiscal year and encompasses the City Council's priorities.

"Emphasis has been placed on public safety including homeless outreach, infrastructure improvements, and economic development, while maintaining fiscal sustainability," Gomez wrote in a report to council members.

Of the \$151.5 million spending plan, more than \$93 million is earmarked for operations, including personnel costs and debt service. "The financial plan also includes an allocation of \$48 million for 67 capital improvement projects, 57 carryover and 10 new, wrote Gomez.

Norwalk plans to spend \$7.6 million on new tools, equipment, vehicles, computers, and upgrades of software and information technology

Norwalk officials were able to balance the budget without using reserves under the assumption that the city will save \$550,000 in full-time salaries cost savings due to attrition.

Revenue into the city's General Fund is projected to increase 6%, or \$2.2 million, to a total amount of \$49.3 million. Officials attributed this projected increase to two factors: a hike in property taxes and a rise in franchise fees.

Norwalk officials also are counting on other sources of

repayment from a former Redevelopment Agency loan;

\$729,000 in loan principal repayments

\$1 million from the city's Pension Stabilization Trust Fund to be used in the future

As Norwalk's total income is projected to increase, so is its spending, particularly in public

Norwalk's contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department is expected to increase \$523,000 from the current fiscal year, while maintaining the same number of deputies and level of service.

Other contractual agreements will increase by \$388,000, not including insurance premiums, which are set to climb \$203,000.

Officials cautioned that the 2019-20 spending plan could change according to ongoing labor negotiations with the city's general and management units.

In the coming years, Norwalk will also likely grapple with increasing pension costs. According to Gomez, Norwalk paid \$5.4 million towards CalPERS this current fiscal year but that number is expected to swell to \$8.2 million

"Additionally, staff prepared the city budget without knowledge of what actions the state may take that could impact local government finances," Gomez

California's general fund reserves is expected to reach nearly \$20 billion, Gomez pointed

"Continued focus on building state reserves is prudent in light of economic and federal budget uncertainty and in preparation for a future recession," Gomez said. "As prepared, it appears that there will be no state takeaways from

The Sheriff's Department raised its price to patrol Norwalk by \$523,000 annually.

L.A. County Library named 2019 Library of the Year

The L.A. County Library system earned the national award for its innovative programs; Norwalk has two L.A. County libraries within city limits.

NORWALK - LA County Library was just named Library of the Year by Gale/Library Journal for its outstanding community support, equity and inclusion, and creation of innovative services and partnerships that support the library's mission.

As the 2019 Library of the Year, LA County Library will be featured on the cover of Library Journal's (LJ's) June 2019 issue, available in print and online, and will be honored at a reception at the American Library Association (ALA) annual conference 2019 in Washington, DC.

Established in 1992, each year the Library of the Year Award celebrates the library that most profoundly demonstrates service to the community, creativity and innovating in developing specific community programs or has seen dramatic increase in library use and leadership in creating programs emulated by other libraries.

This is the third honor LA County Library has received in the past 12 months from Library Journal following their wins for 2019 Librarian of the Year (given to Skye Patrick, Library Director) and 2018 Marketer of the Year (given to the Marketing & Communications team for its efforts in rebranding the organization).

LA County Library is the first organization ever to win both Library of the Year and Librarian of the Year in the same calendar year, and the first organization to win all three awards and be featured on the magazine's cover 3 times in less than a year.

These awards are in addition to three other recent national recognitions: the Library was a Finalist for the Institute of Museum and Library Services 2019 National Medal, and won two National Association of Counties Achievement Awards for its iCount equity initiative and The Great Read Away, a fine forgiveness program for youth.

Of the prestigious accolade, LA County Library Director Skye Patrick said, "I am so proud of the dedicated and passionate staff we have at LA County Library. This is truly a well-deserved recognition of their creativity, hard work, and tireless efforts. We are grateful for the support we have received from the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, Chief Executive Office, and the County Departments we've collaborated with, as well as the multitude of agencies we've partnered with, and the people we serve.

"Thank you to Gale and Library Journal for this honor, and to our staff and partners for helping empower us to succeed in our endeavors and provide exemplary service to the communities of Los Angeles

This award is a testament to the strength of the Library's community-inspired services, like the Library's Turns the Tables beginner's DJ workshop for teens, The Great Read Away fine forgiveness program for youth, its Small Business Saturdays for entrepreneurially-inclined adults, digital camps for youth in underserved communities, its free high school diploma and career certificate program for adults, and mental health clinicians co-located at select libraries.

The Library also takes its services outside of library walls, its MkM maker mobiles, its Reading Machine early literacy vehicles, and its book

kiosks in housing facilities for older adults and youth transitioning out of foster care.

Even in this digitally-inclined age, LA County Library remains a vital resource for its communities. The Library is currently upgrading its public computers and broadband to address the digital divide. In 2017, through the creation of more efficient staffing model, the Library was able to expand library service hours by 8% without an increase in operating costs. This year, overall attendance was up 5%, with 10.3 million customers visiting 87 libraries.

LA County Library has been innovative in re-envisioning traditional library programs to create new approaches to library programming. In addition, the Library adapts non-library program models to the library setting, bringing nationally-recognized, evidence-based programs to its communities—examples include implementation of the Positive Parenting Program, which helps parents navigate common childhood and teen issues, and setting up miniature libraries called Barbershop Books at 10 barbershop locations throughout the County.

"This is a very exciting time for libraries, and LA County exemplifies the creativity and care brought to our communities every day by these vital institutions," said Rebecca T. Miller, editorial director of Library Journal and School Library Journal. "We've been watching LA County Library under the leadership of Skye Patrick, who was recently named LJ's Librarian of the Year. Now this honor signals how effectively the organization has adapted and evolved to set a standard of service worth



The one place kids still play outside

Most of us remember playing outside till the streetlights came on, but our kids can't because of (fill in the blank) crime, creeps, traffic, tennis lessons, homework, no one else outside, all of the above.

Except at RV parks (and probably at regular campgrounds, too, but I haven't been to those). Park your camper, open the door and spill out the kids. They run around like it's the Sputnik era. But if they were "safe" back home, chances are they'd be inside — or, at best, supervised at soccer.

As a gal who spends most of her time trying to persuade parents to loosen their terrified grip, I asked RVers, campground owners and a Harvard professor what gives. It seems to boil down to:

1) Cramped quarters.

"A family of four in 429 square feet is different than a family in 2,000 square feet," says Eric Gaden. He's a traveling nurse — yes, that's right, a nurse who travels to temporary gigs in his RV with his wife and sons, 5 and 8. They've been on the road for four years now, and whenever they land at a new campground, he says, his kids discover "the hiding places and secret places the adults will never see."

That's in part because he and his wife kick them outside. "When we lived in a house, I could say, 'Go to your room!' But here they're just 6 feet further away," says Gaden. So, out they go. And a child in nature

tends to remain in nature.

2) Kids are their own kid magnets.

"The other day, I was going around the campground, and there were five little kids, probably 6 years old — three boys and two girls on the dock fishing, and there were no parents anywhere," says Dave Schneider, owner of the Indian Trails Campground in Pardeeville, Wisconsin. Once there are a few kids outside, others join them. But in the 'burbs, often the parks are empty. Or the only kids out there are part of a program, like Little League, so other kids can't spontaneously join in. Here, everyone's footloose, so kids can swarm. And fish.

3) Unscheduled time.

See above. When kids are away from home, they're also away from karate, Kumon, kickboxing ... This not only gives them free time but also forces them to come up with something to do: "Let's make a fort!" Working together happens to be how children (and adults) make friends, says natural playground designer Rusty Keeler. So the kids become instant buddies.

4) Assumption of friendliness.

If you're at a campground, you're approachable, if only because you're often outside — a sitting duck. That means anyone needing a little assistance may ask you for it and vice versa. (When we went RVing, we asked complete strangers to park our camper for us.)

"People are so friendly at campgrounds the parents feel safer," says Kathy Kasper, who runs the Lazy River campground in Granville, Ohio. By defining yourself as a helpful member of a friendly community (however temporary), you feel a great oneness. This translates into

5) It's tribal.

You've circled the wagons. You've set up camp. And now you are sitting around a fire. That's as ancient as it gets, says David Ropeik, a Harvard instructor, author of "How Risky Is It, Really?: Why Our Fears Don't Always Match the Facts" and — most saliently — a dad who took the family on a 4,000-mile RV trip. "In the morning, we'd head out, and in the afternoon, we'd call ahead, and there was absolutely a sense of safety and relief as soon as the campground said, 'Yeah, we have a place for you.' It wasn't a hotel room. It was being in and amongst

When a traffic ticket costs \$13,000

For most people living in America, transportation is central to daily life. About 83 percent of Americans report that they regularly drive a car multiple times a week. Yet millions of drivers across the country have had their licenses suspended — taking away their ability to drive to work, school, the grocery store or the doctor — essentially because

In 2014, Leah Jackson was ticketed for obstructing traffic in Otsego, Minn., after turning left at a red light. That kind of thing happens to many people. But, as Ms. Jackson explained to state lawmakers in 2018 testimony, she had just started a new job and hadn't yet received a paycheck, so she couldn't pay the \$135 fine right away.

A few months later, she was pulled over, told her driver's license was suspended for an unpaid ticket and cited for driving with a suspended license — a new \$200 ticket. Her job responsibilities as a retail store manager required her to make bank runs and other deliveries, so she kept driving in order to keep her job. In less than a month, she received two more tickets for driving with a suspended license. After accounting for the additional tickets and the resulting increase in her monthly insurance premiums, her debt from the initial infraction spiraled into more than \$13,000 over four and a half years.

The criminal justice system too often produces a self-perpetuating cycle, particularly for the poorest people, who can't pay fines or hire lawyers to make charges go away. In 39 states, you can lose your driving privileges if you're unable to pay a court fine or fee, for things as minor as a traffic violation. But a bipartisan effort is growing to end the

fundamentally unjust practice of wealth-based suspensions.

On May 7, Gov. Steve Bullock of Montana signed a bill to eliminate wealth-based driver's license suspensions. Montana joins the District of Columbia and a handful of states, including California, Idaho, Maine, Mississippi and Virginia, that have recently stopped suspending driver's licenses for unpaid debt. State legislatures in Illinois and Oregon are expected to vote on whether to end the practice in their

The American Civil Liberties Union and the American Legislative Exchange Council, which typically take conflicting positions on policy debates, are aligned on this issue: Driver's license suspensions should be imposed for the limited purpose of keeping unsafe drivers off the road, not as a debt-collection mechanism. State legislatures, courts and motor vehicle administrators should work together to eliminate laws and policies that permit driver's licenses to be suspended for reasons unrelated to a person's ability to drive, including nonpayment of fines

Suspending people's driver's licenses because they can't afford to pay fines or fees is unfair. The A.C.L.U.'s position is that it is unconstitutional.

It's also just bad policy. Wealth-based suspensions are at best ineffective and at worst destructive to the purpose of ensuring compliance with unpaid debt. They also drain resources that could otherwise be used to enforce laws that protect communities from drivers who engage in behavior that could actually threaten public safety, such as drunken driving. Union County, Ohio, found that

driving-while-suspended violations cost an average of nine hours of officer and court time. That's valuable time that could be spent advancing public safety rather than collecting debts from people struggling to make ends meet.

Stripping people of their driver's licenses makes it more difficult for them to earn a living and, by extension, more difficult for them to pay off their debts. A 2011 study found that in New Jersey, 42 percent of drivers who lost their licenses also lost their jobs. In Phoenix, people who lost their licenses lost an average of \$36,800 of annual income. Most people in the United States have limited access to reliable public transportation, so driving is often their only realistic means of transportation. The reality is that many people who drive with suspended licenses do so out of necessity. In the process, they risk additional fines, fees and even incarceration, all of which make it extremely difficult for them to pay their outstanding court debts.

One of the concerns of opponents of this type of legislation is that eliminating a punishment for nonpayment of court debt will result in a decrease in revenue that courts and other government agencies depend on to finance their operations. But government services should be paid for through a general fund, not through burdensome fines and fees on individuals.

Lawmakers across the country should work to eliminate wealthbased driver's license suspensions.

The doctors who put their lives on the line

On May 31, 2009, Scott Roeder drove to Reformation Lutheran Church in Wichita, Kan. He had attended services there before, but he was not a worshiper. He had visited Reformation Lutheran to track the movements of a particular church member, Dr. George Tiller, who provided abortions at a nearby clinic.

On that day in 2009, Mr. Roeder carried out the mission he'd been planning: He walked up to Dr. Tiller as he was handing out programs and greeting fellow parishioners in the church foyer. Knowing that Dr. Tiller customarily wore body armor, Mr. Roeder put a .22-caliber handgun to the doctor's head and pulled the trigger.

In the decade since Dr. Tiller's assassination, the violence and harassment inflicted on those who work in abortion clinics have become only more routine. A Molotov cocktail thrown through the window of a Planned Parenthood building, a clinic escort hit by an anti-abortion activist's car — both episodes that happened in the past several months — barely garner headlines. While most people who protest abortion reject violence, among their ranks are zealots who believe that the perceived killing of embryos and fetuses justifies murder. And abortion providers worry about even one of those zealots being emboldened by a political environment that's spawned extreme anti-abortion legislation around the country this year.

George Tiller did not set out to become an abortion provider, let alone one of the most targeted figures in the American abortion debate. A longtime Republican and former Navy flight surgeon, Dr. Tiller took over his late father's family medical practice in 1970, thinking it would be a sleepy job. He soon learned that his father had quietly provided safe abortions at the office in the decades before the procedure was legal in Kansas — a history detailed in Stephen Singular's 2012 book "A

After initially resisting following in his father's footsteps, Dr. Tiller was swayed by the relentless demand for abortions from women in the community, and by the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision in 1973 that made the procedure legal in every state. "I am a woman-educated physician," Dr. Tiller said years later. He went on to become an expert in diagnosing rare fetal anomalies — cancers, fluid in the skull, undeveloped organs — and performing abortions on women facing these devastating circumstances later in their pregnancies. He also helped find homes for babies women wished to put up for adoption. He came to see his work as a spiritual calling.

As legally risky as his father's clandestine efforts had been. Dr. Tiller's career coincided with political and cultural shifts that made it physically dangerous for doctors and staff members at abortion clinics.

In 1980, Ronald Reagan was elected president thanks largely to a new evangelical voting bloc that was rallied by his anti-abortion, profamily values platform. Over the following decades, as abortion became further entrenched in the American culture wars, a handful of antiabortion lawmakers, like former Senator Iom Coburn of Oklanoma, called for abortion providers to receive the death penalty.

And abortion providers indeed started to die — not in the death chamber, but at the hands of anti-abortion extremists. Dr. David Gunn in 1993. Dr. John Britton in 1994. Dr. Barnett Slepian in 1998. Two receptionists, a clinic escort, an off-duty police officer and others were also killed during acts of anti-abortion violence during that time, and there were many hundreds of nonlethal violent incidents, including bombings and attempted assassinations. One such assassination attempt was carried out in 1985 at the home of Justice Harry Blackmun, who wrote the Supreme Court opinion in the Roe v. Wade decision. (Though the justice and his wife were at home at the time, they were

By the late 1970s, word had spread of Dr. Tiller's work, and his clinic was attracting protesters who would chant, "Tiller, Tiller, the baby killer." Some of them followed Dr. Tiller and his staff members to their homes and put graphic images of fetal remains in their neighbors mailboxes. Others phoned in death threats to the clinic. Someone set up a website listing the personal contact information for the staff.

Dr. Tiller sought advice from security experts, who gave him tips, such as to drive in the right lane to limit the angles available to potential shooters, and he started giving his employees "combat pay" bonuses to keep them from quitting. He eventually bought an armored S.U.V. to drive to and from the clinic, and for two and a half years federal marshals were by his side for much of each day. He also varied his route between the clinic and his home, where he lived with his wife and four children.

He took these precautions because the threats that his clinic received were not all idle. The facility was pipe-bombed in 1986, causing \$100,000 in damage. And in 1993, Dr. Tiller was shot in both arms by an anti-abortion extremist named Rachelle Shannon. (Ms. Shannon, who also committed a series of clinic bombings and acid attacks, was released from prison last year.) Neither the bomb nor the shooting deterred him; he was back at work the day after the shooting. Nor was he cowed when thousands of protesters, some of them aggressive, descended on his clinic and tried to block access to it during the so-called Summer of Mercy in 1991.

Dr. Tiller also stayed strong while Bill O'Reilly, the erstwhile Fox News personality, went on a nationally broadcast campaign against him in the years before his murder. Mr. O'Reilly compared Dr. Tiller to Hitler, said he was "executing babies" and noted in 2006: "If I could get my hands on Tiller ... Can't be vigilantes. Can't do that. It's just a figure of speech." A few years later, of course, someone did get his hands on the

(After Dr. Tiller's death, Mr. O'Reilly said that "Americans should condemn" his murder and that "anarchy and vigilantism will destroy a

Today, abortion providers face an even more volatile political backdrop than Dr. Tiller did during his lifetime. In the years after Dr. Tiller's murder, state legislatures passed hundreds of anti-abortion regulations intended to shut down abortion clinics and make it hardei for women to access the procedure. Then came Donald Trump, who became president thanks in large part to the support of evangelical voters counting on him to deliver anti-abortion Supreme Court justices and other judges — a promise that he has fulfilled, leading antiabortion lawmakers in states around the country to pass a rash of neartotal abortion bans this year.

Since the 2016 election, abortion providers have reported a spike in incidents of vandalism, trespassing, harassment and picketing. According to the National Abortion Federation, which tracks such data, in 2018 abortion providers were subject to at least 1,135 trespassing incidents in the United States and Canada — up from 823 incidents in 2017 and 264 in 2013, when there were more abortion clinics in America than there are today. And last year they experienced nearly 122,600 disruptive events, including internet harassment, bomb threats and picketing. In 2017, that number was fewer than 97,000, and in 2013 it was fewer than 6,500.

Many providers and experts are concerned about enforcement of the federal Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act, which was passed during the Clinton administration to bar the use of "force or threat of force or ... physical obstruction" to keep people from entering reproductive health clinics. Hesitant to wade into a heated political issue, local police officers allow violations of the law to slide, further emboldening the activists.

Amy Hagstrom Miller, the founder and chief executive of the Whole Woman's Health network of abortion clinics, has had reason to call on law enforcement recently: In April, she said, someone set fire to the fence outside the Whole Woman's clinic in McAllen, Tex. The clinic, which is the only abortion facility for nearly 250 miles, has become a hotbed of anti-abortion activity, sometimes attracting hundreds of protesters at a time. It is less than 10 miles from the Mexican border and serves mostly women of color, and Ms. Hagstrom Miller said that it has started to attract protesters with white nationalist tattoos.

Ms. Hagstrom Miller also worries about President Trump saying at his rallies, wrongly, that women and doctors routinely "execute" babies. "This kind of language and rhetoric," she said, "doesn't just fall on the ears of well-balanced people."







Legislation would educate women before first pelvic exam

NORWALK -State legislation the information they need to in "empower" female patients during pelvic exams recently passed the Assembly floor.

Authored by Majority Leader Ian Calderon and Assemblywoman Cottie Petrie-Norris, AB 1030 requires the California Medical Board and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists to develop an informational pamphlet for patients undergoing a gynecological pelvic examination, with basic information regarding how the procedure should be properly performed, privacy and sanitary expectations, and board contact information in order to report any instances of misconduct.

AB 1030 requires that this informational document provided to patients prior to their first pelvic exam. This measure will ensure that female patients receive

> "Given recent horrific incidents of abuse during gynecological pelvic exams, it has become apparent that patients would benefit from advanced information about what to expect during an exam," said Calderon, who represents Norwalk in the state Assembly.



George Tyndall. He treated tens of thousands of female students, many of them teenagers seeing a gynecologist for the first time. Complaints regarding his behavior began in the 1990s, when coworkers alleged he was improperly photographing students' genitals. In the years that followed, patients and nursing staff accused him again and again of "creepy" behavior, including touching women inappropriately during pelvic exams and making sexually suggestive remarks about their bodies. It was not until 2016, when a frustrated nurse went to the campus rape crisis center, that he

Since then, approximately 500 current and former students have accused Tyndall of misconduct. Several lawsuits have been filed at the state and federal level, going into graphic detail about Tyndall's alleged practices - such as fully nude exams that were not medically necessary and digital penetration that did not resemble a routine gynecological exam.

Though the Tyndall case garnered attention because of the educational setting and the astounding number of victims that have come forward, it is, unfortunately, not an isolated

After reviewing the Medical Board of California's disciplinary decisions from the last five years alone, there have been numerous other physicians who have had their license suspended or revoked entirely for sexual misconduct that occurred during a pelvic exam.
