Robbers strike Norwalk donut shop

NORWALK – Authorities are searching for three robbers who were seen on surveillance video holding up a doughnut shop in Norwalk Tuesday night.

The incident occurred about 8:30 p.m. at Randy Donut in the 10900 block of Rosecrans Avenue.

Video showed three robbers, all wearing hooded sweatshirts, jumping over the counter.

As two of the robbers began ripping cash registers from the wall, the third intruder was pointing a handgun at an employee who curled up behind the counter, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department stated in a news release.

Video showed the three escaping the shop through a rear exit leading to a parking lot.

The robbers drove off in what was described as a four-door, silver-colored sedan. The vehicle was last seen heading northbound on Studebaker Road.

Investigators believe the trio got away with about \$400 in cash.

The employees were not physically injured in the incident.

Anyone with additional information was asked to contact the Sheriff's Department at 563-863-8711. Those who prefer to remain anonymous can call LA Crime Stoppers at 800-222-8477.

Later that same evening, authorities responded to a burglary at a Baskin-Robbins about 3 miles away.

The glass door leading to the ice cream shop had been shattered, arriving deputies noticed about midnight.

It was unclear what had been taken from the location in the burglary.

Investigators have not determined if the two incidents are related.

Police search for purse snatcher

WHITTIER – Authorities are searching for a man who stole a woman's purse as he threw her to the ground in Whittier last week, authorities said Monday.

A surveillance image and description of the man has been released by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

He is accused of robbing Stephanie Guerrero as she walked in the parking lot of a laundromat at 13739 Meyer Rd. on May 27 shortly before 8:30 p.m.

Sheriff's officials said he went behind the victim before pulling on her purse as she walked with her 4-year-old son, pushing her to the ground.

The stolen purse contained identification documents and \$40 in cash.

Detectives described the purse-snatcher as a male believed to be between 18 to 20 years old and standing at about 5 feet, 1 inch to 5 feet, 4 inches tall.

Personal data at-risk after breach at Quest Diagnostics, LabCorp

An unauthorized user gained access to the personal information of millions of people.

Quest Diagnostics said the personal information of 11.9 million customers has potentially been compromised.

The clinical laboratory company said in a release that an "unauthorized user" gained access to a system used by American Medical Collection Agency (AMCA), a billing vendor hired by a Quest contractor called Optum360.

Quest said the information that may have been exposed included Social Security numbers and medical information, but not test results.

AMCA first notified Quest on May 14 of "potential unauthorized activity" on its payment page, Quest said. Two weeks later, according to Quest, AMCA then told Quest and Optum360 more about the breach, including the number of patients potentially affected and what information was accessed.

Quest said it has suspended using AMCA and that it was using "forensic experts" to examine the issue.

It also said that AMCA has not provided "detailed or complete information" about the hack, including which customers might have been affected. AMCA and Optum360 did not immediately respond to a request for comment from CNN Business.

"We are committed to keeping our patients, health care providers, and all relevant parties informed as we learn more," Quest said in the release.

Quest's stock was unchanged on the news. The company has roughly 2,200 locations across the United States, according to its website.

LABCORP: LabCorp Opens a New Window. said about 7.7 million customers' personal

information may have been compromised due to a data breach at a billings collections firm — a day after competing lab testing company Quest Diagnostics also announced nearly 12 million patients were potentially affected by a similar security incident.

LabCorp said Tuesday that third-party collections firm American Medical Collection Agency (AMCA) discovered "unauthorized activity" on its web payment page that occurred between August 2018 and March 30, 2019, according to a U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission Opens a New Window. (SEC) filing the same day.

"AMCA's affected system included information provided by LabCorp. That information could include first and last name, date of birth, address, phone, date of service, provider, and balance information," the SEC document stated. "AMCA's affected system also included credit card or bank account information that was provided by the consumer to AMCA (for those who sought to pay their balance)."

LabCorp said it did not provide

AMCA with patients' lab results and Social Security numbers and insurance information was not stored in the firm's system.

The billings collections company is in the process of notifying about 200,000 LabCorp patients whose credit card or bank information may have been affected by the breach. A list of people whose information was compromised and more details about the incident have not been provided, the SEC document stated.

"AMCA has informed LabCorp that it intends to provide the approximately 200,000 affected LabCorp consumers with more specific information about the AMCA Incident, in addition to offering them identity protection and credit monitoring services for 24 months," according to the filing.

"LabCorp is working closely with AMCA to obtain more information and to take additional steps as may be appropriate once more is known about the AMCA Incident," it added.

2 people arrested after buying alcohol for minors

NORWALK – Two people were arrested in an undercover sting operation targeting adults who buy alcohol for minors.

The "shoulder tap" operation was held May 14 at an undisclosed convenience store in Norwalk, where juveniles working with the Norwalk Sheriff's Station approached adult customers and asked if they would buy them alcohol.

The decoy would indicate he or she was underage and unable to purchase alcohol themselves.

Adults who purchased the alcohol were arrested and cited. The penalty for furnishing alcohol to a minor is a minimum \$1,000 fine and 24 hours of community service.

Convenience stores also face possible consequences, including a suspension or permanent revocation of their liquor license.

Norwalk law enforcement officials held a similar decoy operation May 7, but in that operation, no one was cited.

Rio Hondo graduates 1,828 students and awards first Bachelor of Science degrees

Dr. Luis Garcia, a community advocate who earned his diploma while incarcerated, delivered the keynote address.

WHITTIER – Rio Hondo College celebrated 1,828 graduates during its 56th annual Commencement ceremony on May 23, including 16 students who received the College's first-ever Bachelor of Science degrees.

Superintendent/President Teresa Dreyfuss congratulated graduates at the program's beginning.

"Our dedication to Rio Hondo students is seen in the increased number of graduates who receive associate degrees, the increased number of graduates who transfer to four-year universities and the increased number of graduates who enter into vocational and professional careers," Dreyfuss said.

"Today, we also celebrate our first-ever Bachelor of Science graduates in automotive technology," she said. "This marks a historic accomplishment in California's community college system, as we are one of only 15 community colleges in the entire state that offer four-year degrees."

Dreyfuss, who was presiding over her final graduation before retiring June 30, also recognized the 2019 recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award, Professor John Frala. Frala has led efforts in the automotive technology major and helped the College secure a landmark partnership with Tesla to train auto technicians. This spring, the third cohort of students graduated, all finding immediate employment with Tesla.

The event featured a keynote by Rio Hondo College alumnus Dr. Luis S. Garcia, who advocates for marginalized communities as the director of programs and services at the Weingart Center in Downtown Los Angeles.

Garcia, who struggled in high

school and earned his diploma while incarcerated, urged students to be lifelong learners who contribute to their community, focus on the positive and "walk into your loveliness."

"As you leave here this evening ready to turn all your hard work and your dreams into reality, I hope you never lose the will to learn," he said. "Hold on to your imagination. You reached one goal here this evening when you earned your degree or certificate but remember this is an intermediate goal that has prepared you to take another step forward – whatever that may be."

Board of Trustees President Gary Mendez told the graduates that he and the other college leaders understand what it took for them to succeed.

"Over 30 years ago, I sat where you are today. I attended Rio Hondo and, like it was for you, it wasn't easy," Mendez said. "I was a homeless student at times while attending Rio Hondo. I slept in garages, on top of garages and here in the hills of Rio Hondo. I wasn't alone. There were many other students under similar circumstances. We didn't complain, and I certainly didn't want anyone to know. I'm sharing this with you because we know the struggle and obstacles you overcame and endured to be here. I want to acknowledge that struggle."

Valedictorian Hanh "Jenny" Pham, who earned a 4.0 GPA, was honored with the Pellissier Family Award. As an immigrant from Hanoi, Vietnam, Pham arrived in the U.S. about four years ago. An early childhood education and accounting double major, she plans to pursue bachelor's and master's degrees at Cal State Fullerton.

Tiffany Nunez, who helped create and implement the College's food pantry, gave the student address. Nunez served as both secretary and vice president of the ASRHC as well as a member of the College's Presidential

Search Committee.

Nunez, who will be transferring to UC Santa Barbara to study communications, said all of the graduates should be proud of their success.

"All the choices we make in life represent who we are. We made the choice to get out of bed every morning, to hike up that hill and get to class," she said. "We have the dedication to reach our goals and receive our degrees."

"As I look at all of you beautiful people, in your caps and gowns, I hope that each and every one of you are proud of yourselves, because this is a huge accomplishment. Class of 2019, we are finally getting this degree!" Nunez said.

In addition, the event honored four graduates who overcame significant challenges in pursuit of their degree: Eduardo Gonzalez, Kristian Lozano, Luisa Mesones and Kevin Skinner.

After high school, Gonzalez worked two part-time jobs to support his family. A survivor of Hirschsprung's disease as a baby, he decided to seek a degree in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields, earning associate degrees in biology and chemistry. He is considering seeking a four-year degree in life science or biochemistry at a Cal State or UC campus.

Lozano, who is part of the College's Pathway to Law School program, was honored for his service to the College and dedication to his studies. Lozano earned a 4.0 in three consecutive semesters and served as vice president of the Pre-Law Society.

He led planning of events such as a Pathway to Law School/Feris Legales Mentorship Mixer. He has earned an Associate Degree for Transfer in philosophy and will continue his studies at UC Berkeley as a philosophy major. He will receive priority admission review at eight partner law schools, including UCLA, Loyola Marymount, UC Davis, UC



Berkeley and UC Irvine.

Mesones, a grandmother, is a returning student who married young and raised a family as a single mother. After battling and defeating fibromyalgia and breast cancer, she reignited a childhood love of language and enrolled in a French class at Rio Hondo College. This passion of Mesones' led to deeper, more comprehensive studies. She will graduate with four degrees – communications studies, social behavior and self-development, art and human expression, and social studies. She will transfer to UC Berkeley.

Skinner, a former Marine sergeant, maintained a 4.0 GPA throughout his Rio Hondo College career. He mentored fellow veterans at Rio Hondo College and served as president of the Veterans Club. He organized Veterans Week activities and spoke at community events, including the College's 9/11 Memorial. Skinner earned an Associate of Science in general studies with an emphasis in science and mathematics. He will

study environmental science and engineering at Harvard University.

In addition to the students, the ceremony celebrated the 2019 Fellow of the College, professor and counselor Belen Torres-Gil. Torres-Gil retired in 2017 after 29 years at Rio Hondo College and 40 in education. Mendez credited Torres-Gil with helping him pursue his dreams.

"She is directly responsible for encouraging me to transfer when I didn't have the courage," he said. "Belen's dedication to Rio Hondo College only touches the surface of who she is as a person and the significant impact she has made in the lives of so many students."

Torres-Gil told graduates that the choices they make matter, and to make the most of their time and their relationships. As an example, she told a story about a young man who asked to be her intern 13 years ago and, today, heads a community college's counseling department. She then noted his sister also interned with her and is receiving a master's degree this year. And finally,

she added that the young man's mother was inspired to return for her own degree.

"My faculty colleagues and I create legacies and stories like this every day in our work. It's why we choose the work we do," she said.

The ceremony was one of several to honor graduates this spring. On May 22, a pinning ceremony celebrated 80 nursing students who earned Associate Degrees in Nursing, 25 students who received vocational nursing certifications and 53 who qualified for certifications in nursing assistant programs.

On May 17, the students who received the College's new Bachelor of Science in automotive technology were celebrated at a dinner and received stoles marking their achievement. The four-year degree is part of a historic experiment in which a handful of community colleges have been allowed to create bachelor programs in high-demand career fields.

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It's more than the economy

For more than a generation, James Carville's campaign maxim, "It's the economy, stupid," has been held up as an essential truth of American politics.

There's no denying that a strong economy is an incumbent president's best friend. Seventy-three percent of voters currently rate the economy as a very important issue. As a result, if the economy remains strong for another 1 1/2 years, many analysts believe President Donald Trump will be favored to win reelection. On the other hand, if a recession hits next year, we will almost certainly have a new president in 2021.

However, recent data about the president's trade wars suggests that a sizable number of voters consider other factors more important than economics.

For example, just 31% believe higher tariffs on goods imported from China will be good for the United States. However, a much larger number — 58% — support such tariffs. In other words, more than a quarter of all voters think the tariffs will be harmful to our economy but still support them.

A similar dynamic is found on the president's call for higher tariffs on Mexico. Just 25% believe they will be good for our country, but 50% support those tariffs. Again, one-fourth of the nation's voters support a policy they think will hurt economically.

Adding to the mystery is that support for tariffs comes despite the fact that 8 out of 10 voters believe free trade is generally good for the United States. Eight out of 10 also believe free trade creates more jobs in our country than it destroys.

Given these realities, why is there such support for policies that many believe will hamper our economy? It's because — when dealing with other nations — many Americans consider some things more important than the economy.

In the case of China, 63% believe China has used trade to take advantage of the United States. Only 13% disagree. This suggests that many voters see these trade negotiations as a matter of fairness rather than transactional economics.

As for Mexico, the defining factor is immigration debate. While 77% of voters believe that legal immigration is good for the United States, 82% believe illegal immigration is bad. Voter frustration is boiling over

because of a long-held belief that political elites in Washington have no interest in stopping illegal immigration. So, 50% think tariffs are worth a try even at the risk of short-term economic pain.

What's especially interesting about the data is that voters are far from certain this approach will work. Just 39% have any confidence that the president's approach will encourage the Mexican government to help stop illegal immigration. But 50% are willing to try it.

This suggests that voters are tired of political leaders telling them what solutions won't work and then using that as an excuse for inaction. If China is taking advantage of us, stand up to them. If Mexico can help stem the tide of illegal immigration, get them to do so.

This attitude echoes President Franklin D. Roosevelt's belief in "bold, persistent experimentation." In the midst of the Great Depression, FDR said: "It is common sense to take a method and try it. If it fails, admit it frankly and try another. But above all, try something."

Why does Google know everything you've bought on Amazon?

Last month, CNBC reported on a page in Google's account settings titled "Purchases" — a month-by-month list of items you've bought across online services like Amazon and other apps that are collected via Google services like Gmail.

It's not quite fair to call the reveal of the Google Purchases page a scandal; the page is publicly accessible, and it's not as if the company is illicitly purchasing the information — instead, it's scanning your inbox and scraping information based on confirmation and purchase emails you directed to your Gmail account.

And yet, Purchases is a jarring example of how leaky our data really is and how large companies can aggregate that information unbeknown to the consumer. I, for one, was unaware that almost every concert ticket, Domino's pizza and Amazon purchase (including a 2014 accidental purchase of the film "Tango & Cash") was being logged by Google. Equally troubling: The purchases can't easily be deleted from the page without also deleting the receipt emails from your Gmail account.

When I scanned my list I was struck by the length of the trail of information — more than six years of online purchases. The depth of that digital record reminded me of other reports of individuals downloading their data from Facebook and Google after 2018's Cambridge Analytica scandal and despairing at the granular detail of the information collected. Every movement cataloged, analyzed and

leveraged. But to what end?

Google's explanation in this instance feels lacking. The company told CNBC that the Purchases page exists simply "to help you easily view and keep track of your purchases, bookings and subscriptions in one place" and that it does not sell user data or use your Gmail information to show you ads. But the company's privacy page also notes that "information about your orders may also be saved with your activity in other Google services."

Scrolling through my Purchases, I couldn't shake the most basic questions: What good reason is there for Google to store six years of detailed purchase information? Why can't I delete it without deleting the emailed receipts? Why aren't there default time limits on how long information is stored?

I had the same reaction reading a story in The Washington Post last week that revealed how in just one week, 5,400 hidden app trackers transmitted personal data (in some cases, violating app privacy policies) to third parties. I found it hard to get through the piece without getting tripped up on a series of "whys": Why do our apps Hoover up our personal information and funnel it out in the dead of night? Why aren't these behaviors limited by our phones by default? Patrick Jackson, a former National Security Agency researcher who helped The Post conduct the tracker experiment, had similar questions. "This is your data," he told The Post. "Why should it even leave your phone? Why should it be collected by someone when you don't know

what they're going to do with it?"

Of course there are technical answers to many of these questions. In Google's case, perhaps your information is fed to train machine systems to help boost artificial intelligence or to improve intelligence in products like maps and search. In the case of the iPhone apps, data is transmitted in the night so as not to interfere with your daytime usage.

And yet these answers are rarely satisfying. They're logistical answers to bigger, structural questions: Why does the internet have to work this way? Why is the currency of the commercial web our increasingly granular information? Why is it collected, sorted and traded in ways that are nearly impossible to see in the aggregate? And why should we trust the sophistication of ad-targeting technology in an industry where advertisers will lose more than \$23 billion globally to ad fraud just this year?

As the privacy discussion accelerates, grows more sophisticated and bleeds into headlines and the halls of Congress, it's worth asking these fundamental questions of tech companies, data brokers and lawmakers. It may seem overly simplistic, but our current privacy reckoning is about just that: finding satisfactory answers to the most basic questions about the future of our digital lives.

Yes, taxing the rich is possible

For a long time, there was a predictable response to any proposal for increasing taxes on the rich: It will wreck the economy. You don't hear this response quite so often anymore, however, because it's become so obviously false. If anything, the economy in recent decades has grown more quickly when Washington taxes the rich more, not less.

Instead, you often now hear a new argument: There's no point in trying to tax rich people, because they'll just figure out a way to avoid paying taxes.

The Washington Post ran a big news article recently making this case (and parts of the argument have appeared elsewhere too, including in The Times). The Post article claimed that Elizabeth Warren's plan to introduce an annual wealth tax relies on a set of "assumptions that defy a long history of U.S. policymaking": namely, "that the country's wealthiest taxpayers won't find ways to evade the targeted tax hike she proposes."

But this claim is wrong, too. The long history of American policymaking actually shows that raising taxes on the wealthiest taxpayers is entirely possible.


Nonetheless, I expect you'll hear the cynical "taxing the rich is impossible" case a lot in coming years, especially if a future president does try to enact a major tax increase on the wealthy. Lobbyists who represent the wealthy like the argument because it lets them claim that there's no point in trying. And journalists find the argument alluring because it has a ring of tough skepticism, and we journalists love to present ourselves as tough skeptics.

In this case, though, it's important to be skeptical about the skepticism.

Tax facts

Over the last few decades, the total federal tax rate paid by the very rich has tended to hover between 30 percent and 40 percent. It's been closer to 30 percent after a Republican president has cut taxes and closer to 40 percent after a Democratic president has modestly raised them.

The chart above shows the longer version of this history: the



average federal tax rate — spanning income taxes, estate taxes and more — for the top 0.01 percent of earners over the past century. (The data comes from Gabriel Zucman, an economist recently profiled in a cover story for Bloomberg Businessweek.)

And the long version of the history is crucial here. It shows that for much of the 20th century, total taxes on the very wealthy were much higher than they are now. Before World War II, the average rate hovered around 70 percent. From the mid-1940s through the mid-1970s, the average rate was above 50 percent.

It's really no mystery why the rate has declined: The federal government has cut tax rates on the rich. The top marginal rate has plummeted. Taxes on stock holdings have declined, too. Perhaps nothing has mattered more than the erosion of the estate tax, through a combination of a lower rate and an increased threshold for paying the tax. These policy changes have helped turbocharge economic inequality.

Is it possible to tax the wealthy too heavily and damage the economy? Yes. I don't think the top marginal tax rate should be 91 percent, as it was in the 1950s. But it's a very, very long way from 91 percent today. It's only 37 percent, which is too low. Taxes on stocks and most other financial investments are also too low.

Changing this situation is within the power of the federal government. History shows that when the government tries to collect more taxes from its richest citizens, it succeeds. So don't give in to cynicism. Today's radical levels of inequality are not inevitable. They're a choice that our society has made.

The decline of the estate tax and an effective decline in the corporate tax rate are the main reasons that the wealthy pay so much less in tax, as the economists Thomas Piketty and Emmanuel Saez have explained. (If you want the brief version, click that link and check out the chart on page 12.)

Alexandra Thornton and Galen Hendricks of the Center for American Progress released a report yesterday outlining the various options for increasing top-end taxes, including a wealth tax, a higher estate tax and the elimination of various corporate and investment loopholes. The report is called, "Ending Special Tax Treatment for the Very Wealthy." In addition to legislative changes, Thornton told me that "more funding for high-end tax enforcement is needed."


