

Hospitals get stricter with visitors

■ Hospital visitors must be vaccinated or show results from a recent COVID-19 test, according to new state guidelines.

Visitors at hospitals, skilled nursing facilities or intermediate care facilities in California are now required to show proof of full vaccination or a recent negative COVID-19 test.

The requirement was part of a state Public Health Officer Order issued on Aug. 5 that also requires all workers at health care facilities to be fully vaccinated by Sept. 30.

The visitation order requires the affected healthcare facilities to verify visitors are fully vaccinated or have received a negative COVID test, with the test specimen collected within 72 hours of the visit.

Health facilities also must maintain records of vaccine/testing verifications of visitors.

Meanwhile, those visiting health facilities are continued to be required to wear face coverings.

People visiting a patient in critical condition, "when death may be imminent," may be given an exemption. The rules also do not apply to people conducting a solely outdoor visit that does not require entering the building.

"As we respond to the dramatic increase in cases, transmission prevention measures must be increased for the protection of the patients in the facilities referenced in this order," according to the mandate from state Public Health Officer Dr. Tomas Aragon.

"This can be done by reducing the risk that visitors to these facilities are bringing COVID-19 from the community and introducing it into these settings."

In response to the state health order, PIH Health released its own updated visitation policies.

Visitors will only be allowed to enter by showing one of the following:

Vaccination card, photo of a vaccination card, vaccination passport, photo of a vaccination passport (must include visitor's name, and date of each vaccination).

Hard copy of a negative COVID-19 test result in which the test was taken less than 72 hours prior to entrance (must include the visitor's name and date of test).

In addition, please be aware of the following:

PIH Health hospitals have adjusted their visiting policy to allow one (1) visitor per patient per day with single entrance only (no exiting and re-entering).

Visitors accompanying a patient to an Outpatient Department located within the hospital, but with a separate entrance, including the Emergency Department, will be required to drop off the patient at the Outpatient Entrance, then enter through the Main Entrance for screening and badging, before returning to the Outpatient Department.

Visitors must wear a surgical mask supplied by PIH Health (which may be worn over their own mask). Masks must remain in place throughout the entire visit.

Visitors must physically distance themselves from all healthcare providers

Norwalk residents mourn COVID-19 victims

■ Residents marched on Norwalk streets Saturday to honor those who have died of the virus.

NORWALK - Family and friends of COVID-19 victims marched in silence to Norwalk city hall Saturday to establish a memorial and raise awareness for the virus.

The march was organized by Norwalk resident Marlene Bojorquez, who created a Yellow Heart Memorial on her lawn after losing her father during the pandemic.

Yellow Heart Memorials were established in cities across the county to remember the victims of COVID-19. The organization also coordinated 30 other marches across 20 states on Aug. 7.

Norwalk city council declared Aug. 7 as COVID-19 Awareness Day in the city, during their recent meeting. The virus has claimed 377 lives in Norwalk.

"When my dad died, I wanted to do something to make sure people were aware that COVID is real and that we are losing loved ones," said Bojorquez. "As part of the Yellow Heart Memorial, I thought I could organize a walk here for my dad and for the loved ones in the area."

Arturo Rivas, 13, also took part in the march after losing his father to the virus on Feb. 1.

"I wasn't thinking he would pass away. I was ready for him to come back home. I thought he would come back safely and we would all be fine," said Rivas. "I didn't get to say goodbye. We got a call at 3 am, and they said they couldn't save them."

An estimated 100 people walked down Norwalk Boulevard to city hall, where family and friends tied yellow ribbons with the victim's name around a small fence.

When one-year-old Victoria Rodriguez saw her great-grandmother's photo next to her ribbon on the memorial, she

went to kiss the picture of her great-grandmother.

Anabel Huerta, 25, lost both of her parents to COVID-19, and was also unable to say goodbye to her family. Her cousin, Nancy Pulido, lost her father as well.

The cousins shared their anger over California's reopening and lifting of mask mandates.

"We're back in another wave because the mask mandates came off. That was so dumb," said Pulido.

Bojorquez agreed that California lifted the mask mandate too soon, as the highly contagious delta variant claims more lives across the state.

While many agreed that mask mandates were lifted too soon, there was disagreement among the demonstrators about mandating the COVID-19 vaccine.

Companies such as Disney and Google require their employees to get the COVID vaccine. President Biden announced that all federal workers must get vaccinated as well.

"I agree with the vaccine



mandates," said Pulido. "In order for us to be on the same page, we all need to do our part. Getting vaccinated is our part."

"Getting vaccinated is up to you," said Bojorquez's mother, Margie Briones. "Everyone has their own beliefs. It's been forced on people, that's not our country."

Norwalk city council has expressed the idea of creating a permanent COVID-19 memorial

in the city. Mayor Jennifer Perez, who took part in the march, feels a permanent memorial would be welcomed by the city.

Bojorquez hopes to organize or take part in future COVID-19 awareness demonstrations, as she continues to add names to her Yellow Heart Memorial on her front lawn at 12922 McLaren St.

L.A. County libraries eliminate fines

NORWALK - Fines for overdue library books are a thing of the past in Norwalk.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors unanimously voted this week to immediately eliminate late fines at L.A. County libraries.

"Library late fines do much more harm than good," said Supervisor Janice Hahn, who authored the proposal. "They makeup less than 1% of the Library's revenue and they can dissuade people from using the Library's services. Our LA County Libraries are full of great resources and we want people to take advantage of them. It is time to make LA County Library a fine-free library system."

Hahn's motion instructs LA County Librarian Skye Patrick to waive all fines and fees for overdue books and other library materials, effective immediately. It also instructs the County Librarian to work with the county's auditor-controller, county counsel, and treasurer-tax collector to waive all existing fees for library patrons as well as write off the library's accounts receivable.

"We are pleased the Board of Supervisors approved the elimination of library fines. This is a critical step in removing barriers and opening access to all Library customers," said County Librarian Skye Patrick. "This important initiative will help us do our everyday work of fostering learning experiences, sparking curiosity, making connections, and building skills for all LA County residents."

Collecting fines for overdue library materials was originally implemented as a source of revenue for the LA County Library system - but, presently, these fines make up less than 1% of library revenue. Additionally, the staffing cost associated with the collection of late fees has exceeded the amount of fees collected in the past two fiscal years.

Transitions to fine-free library systems are not unique. In recent years, large urban systems across the country - including the LA City Public Library, San Diego Public Library, San Francisco Public Library, Chicago Public Library, Denver Public Library and Columbus Metropolitan Library systems - have adopted a fine-free model, with research showing that such policies have resulted in a 200 percent increase in returned library books and other materials.



Sheriff's searching for hit and run driver

NORWALK - Sheriff's investigators are asking the public's help in finding the driver of a utility van who struck and killed an elderly woman in Norwalk on Sunday and then sped off.

The collision occurred Sunday at around 8:11 am near the intersection of Pioneer and Firestone boulevards.

Authorities say the driver of the van struck the woman while pulling out of the parking lot and continued driving without stopping to help the woman. The woman died at the scene.

The driver returned a few minutes later but left again without telling sheriff's deputies he was the person who struck the woman.

Downey ponders how to conduct City Council meetings post pandemic

■ Phone calls and emails have allowed residents to participate in meetings from home but it has also sparked abuse.

DOWNEY - The Downey City Council still plans to allow written correspondence to be addressed in their meetings at the end of the pandemic.

Prior to the pandemic, meeting rules operated under the assumption that residents who wished to address the council on an issue would physically attend council meetings.

However, ever since meetings were forced to close to the public, participants were allowed the opportunity to either email their comments prior to the meeting and have them read into the record, or to call in while the meeting was in progress.

Though still currently under emergency orders which allow for such participation, some questions have arisen as to if the council would still accept emails and phone calls during their meetings once the pandemic has concluded.

Councilman Mario Trujillo was wary of what he described as "abuse" by some callers.

"With the pandemic, we learned that the public could access our council meetings through technology; they could communicate with us, they could call in," said Trujillo. "Some residents of the city wanted to know if we were going to continue

to allow that, to develop rules that would allow members of the public to call in their comments.

"I thought we would bring it up for discussion to see what are the current rules, and do we want to do that. There's so much abuse that was obvious by the amount of people calling in. It's sad that some of those people are probably going to ruin it for others."

Though he didn't mention them specifically by name, Trujillo was likely referring to regular council antagonists Armando Herman and Wayne Spindler, who regularly call multiple times during a meeting and try to trick and confuse the council by disguising their voices.

Councilman Sean Ashton expressed concern over the elimination of accepting emails for the meeting.

"When we first opened up again a month or two ago, it was kind of said, 'We're not going to do emails anymore.' No, I don't get that," said Ashton.

"Usually when people want to complain about something, or do something, or say something to their city representatives, usually the first thing is I'm going to come to city council and talk to them. Obviously, some people can't be here at 10 p.m. in the evening or later to address some of those concerns."

While residents always have the option to email their representatives at any time for any issue, the issue at hand was if public comment emails to the city clerk would be read - or at the very least accounted for - in each meeting's official record.

Ultimately, the council

decided to keep emails as a viable option for the public at their meetings, while leaving whether they are read or merely tallied (in approval or opposition of an agenda item) to the discretion of the mayor.

Submitted emails will also be made public online.

Trujillo still encouraged residents to email the council whenever there was an issue, and not to necessarily "wait for a council meeting."

"We tend to be good about responding," said Trujillo. "We try to make ourselves accessible at all times to people."

In addition, Ashton requested that the city broadcast meetings over Zoom in addition to YouTube.

"I know we've had meetings where we've had to wait because something's been going on with YouTube," said Ashton. "My whole thing is I want to give people at least access to say 'Hey, this is what we're doing here, so watch us.'"

"If the YouTube isn't working very well, then maybe this can be a backup, or have the YouTube be a backup and have (Zoom) be the main thing. I think having both is a good idea."

According to city officials, both Zoom and YouTube would be viable options whether used concurrently or separate.

Residents who watch on Zoom will not be able to participate through the platform.



Cerritos expands library with 15 new computers

CERRITOS - The Cerritos Library has 15 new computers with high-speed internet access for use by the public. The computers are located in the Craftsman Area on the first floor of the library. In addition to broadband connectivity, the computers offer the Microsoft Office suite of software.

The Cerritos Library has a computer reservation system to help provide patrons with an opportunity to use one of the public computers. Computers located in the Craftsman Area on the first floor and in the Access Plus Room and 21st Century Area on the second floor are on the system.

If computers are available, patrons can go directly to a computer and log in. Log in requires entering a Cerritos

Library card number and a PIN, or a Computer and Print Use card number and PIN. The default PIN is 111111. Patrons who would like to customize their PIN can ask the Computer Help Desk staff for help. Patrons are also required to accept the Library's Public Computer Use and Internet Access Policy as part of the log in process.

If there are no computers available, patrons can enter a reservation request at a Computer Sign-Up Station. The Computer Sign-Up Stations are available in the Craftsman Area on the first floor and in the Print Center on the second floor.

Screens in each area display a reservation queue that lists the first name and last initial of each person who has entered a reservation request. When a

computer becomes available, the screen will show the location and number of the computer where the patron can log in.

Computers can only be reserved on the day of use, and reservations must be made at the library. Time limits are in effect to provide access to the computers. Cerritos Library cardholders can use a computer for up to four hours per day, Monday through Friday, and for up to two hours per day on Saturday and Sunday.

There are three computers located on stands near the Adult Reference Desk that can be used for up to 15 minutes without a reservation.

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Obituaries

Trevor Moore, sketch comedy writer

Trevor Moore, a comedian who was a founding member of the sketch comedy troupe “The Whitest Kids U’ Know,” died Aug. 7 from an accident at the age of 41.

In his teens, Moore had a sketch comedy show, “The Trevor Moore Show,” on local public access cable; it was picked up by Pax-TV for a brief run. He went on to work as an intern at “Saturday Night Live” in college and later became a page at NBC.

Moore co-founded “The Whitest Kids U’ Know” in 1999, with some fellow students at the School of Visual Arts. The troupe began gaining acclaim, winning Best Sketch Group at the HBO US Comedy Arts Festival in 2006.

They were picked up for TV by Fuse, where “The Whitest Kids U’ Know” ran for a season in 2007 before moving to the Independent Film Channel for an additional four seasons.

Moore played recurring characters including the chairman of the National Hunting Board and Mr. Welburn, a business executive.

He also recorded several albums of comedic music. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Moore began broadcasting “Trevor Moore’s Quarantine Show” on YouTube, later broadcasting on Twitch along with other members of the troupe.

“I really like short-form comedy; I feel like sketch and music are very similar—I try to keep both of them around three minutes long,” Moore said in 2015. “I like that on the albums that I’ve done, you can just jump from one topic to another topic, one genre of music to another genre, without having to build connective tissue or make one bleed into the other. That’s also what I like about sketch too; if you had something to say about a topic, you could say it and make your point, and then jump over to a completely different point you wanted to make.”

Bob Ringwald, jazz pianist and famous father

Bob Ringwald, a jazz pianist who was the father of actress Molly Ringwald, died Aug. 3 at age 80.

He began taking piano lessons at 5 and started his first band at 13. Ringwald founded the Fulton Street Jazz Band, playing piano. He was a co-founder of the Sacramento Jazz Festival in 1974 as well as performing there.

Blind since his teens, Ringwald played in other bands including Sugar Willie and the Cubes, The Great Pacific Jazz Band, and The BoonDockers.

Ringwald often accompanied his daughter, Molly, as she sang. She wrote his obituary, featured in the Sacramento Bee.

In addition to music, Ringwald’s passions included ham radio and the Los Angeles Dodgers, for whom he once served as a guest announcer, reading the lineup in Braille.

“Anyone who knew Bob also knew his mischievous streak, and his ever-present, slightly ribald sense of humor. If you didn’t sufficiently beg to get off of his email joke list, you would have received one just a couple of days before he died,” Molly Ringwald wrote.

Besides his daughter Molly, Robert Ringwald is survived by Adele, his wife of 60 years; a sister, Renée Angus; another daughter, Beth Ringwald Carnes; a son, Kelly Ringwald; two grandsons; two granddaughters; two step-granddaughters; one great-grandson; and one step-great-grandson.

Dennis Thomas, founding member of Kool & the Gang

Dennis “Dee Tee” Thomas, one of the founding members of Kool & the Gang, playing saxophone and other instruments, died Aug. 7 in his sleep at the age of 70.

Thomas co-founded Kool & the Gang in 1964 along with school friends including Robert “Kool” Bell and Ronald Bell. Thomas was a self-taught musician who played alto saxophone, flute, and percussion.

The band became wildly popular in the 1970s and ‘80s, with

hit singles including “Get Down on It,” “Ladies’ Night,” and the enduring No. 1 hit “Celebration.”

The band’s accolades include one Grammy award and three Grammy nominations, according to the award’s website, and five American Music Awards, according to the award’s website. In addition, it had 25 Top Ten R&B hits and nine Top Ten Pop hits, according to Billboard.

Thomas was known for his stylish clothing. The band noted in a statement that in their early days, Thomas was their “budget hawk,” known for “carrying the group’s earnings in a paper bag in the bell of his horn.”

Jane Withers, actress in TV, movies and commercials

Jane Withers, an actress who was a child star in the 1930s and later became known for Comet cleanser commercials, where she played Josephine the Plumber, died Aug. 7 at age 95.

Withers was one of the biggest child stars of the 1930s, sometimes acting as a foil to the superstar child actress Shirley Temple. Withers tended to play mischievous little girls and tomboys, a formula that followed her into her teens.

Her notable films as a child star included “Bright Eyes” (1934), “Ginger” (1935), and “The Holy Terror” (1937).

She became a popular actress, with licensing deals for dresses, paper dolls, jewelry, and more under her name, as well as starring in a series of mystery novels.

In her teens, Withers occasionally played romantic roles, but her fame began to wane as she aged, and she retired at age 21.

Withers returned to the big screen for a supporting role in “Giant” (1956) and thereafter continued to work intermittently. She appeared on TV shows including “Bachelor Father,” “The Munsters,” and “Murder, She Wrote.”

Her greatest later-career fame came when she accepted a role as Josephine the Plumber in a series of Comet cleanser ads in the mid-1960s. She continued playing the role for a decade, becoming highly recognizable to TV viewers.

Later, Withers took over for the voice of Laverne the gargoyle in “The Hunchback of Notre Dame” (1996) when the original voice actress, Mary Wickes, died before the film was completed. She played Laverne in the movie’s 2002 sequel.

Patricia Kennealy-Morrison, music journalist

Patricia Kennealy-Morrison, an author and journalist who was in a relationship with rock star Jim Morrison of the Doors, died July 23 at age 75.

Kennealy-Morrison became a rock music journalist as a young woman, bringing a new seriousness to rock criticism as one of the first women in the field.

She interviewed Morrison in 1969 for Jazz & Pop, the magazine she edited and contributed to. The two began a relationship, largely long-distance, and they participated in a handfasting ceremony in 1970.

It wasn’t a legal marriage, though Kennealy-Morrison considered herself Morrison’s wife. It was a controversial claim, refuted by some who point out that Morrison was also in a serious relationship with Pamela Courson.

The handfasting ceremony was included in the 1991 Oliver Stone movie “The Doors.” Kathleen Quinlan played Kennealy Morrison, and Kennealy-Morrison herself appeared in the scene as the Wiccan priestess who performed the ceremony.

Kennealy-Morrison wrote the 1992 memoir, “Strange Days: My Life With and Without Jim Morrison.” It was one of more than two dozen books written by Kennealy-Morrison, including several fantasy novels in “The Keltiad” series.

In 2007, she founded the publishing house Lizard Queen Press, riffing on Morrison’s “Lizard King” nickname. She went on to write and publish a series of rock-themed mystery novels, including “Ungrateful Dead: Murder at the Fillmore,” “A Hard Slay’s Night: Murder at the Royal Albert Hall,” and “Scareway to Heaven: Murder at the Fillmore East.”

Paul Johnson, DJ behind ‘Get Get Down’

Paul Johnson, a house DJ and producer known for his 1999 hit single “Get Get Down,” died Aug. 4 of COVID-19. He was 50.

Based in Chicago, Johnson began working as a DJ and producer in the 1980s and gained worldwide recognition with “Get Get Down,” an No. 1 hit on the dance music charts with mainstream success in Europe.

His music was influential on musicians including Daft Punk, who named him in their 1997 track “Teachers” that paid tribute to their influences.

“Get Get Down” was added to the dance video game “Just Dance 2021.”

Johnson used a wheelchair after being injured by a stray bullet in his teens; later in his life, he became a double amputee.

Razzy Bailey, 1980s country singer

Razzy Bailey, a country singer and guitarist who had a string of No. 1 hits in the early 1980s, died Aug. 4 at his home in Goodlettsville, Tennessee at the age of 82.

Bailey recorded his first single, “9,999,999 Tears,” in the mid-1960s, but it didn’t take off.

When it later became a comeback hit for Dickey Lee, Bailey received a record deal with RCA Records and began charting early hits including 1978’s “What Time Do You Have to Be Back to Heaven” and 1979’s “If Love Had a Face.”

In 1980, Bailey’s most successful period began as he hit No. 1 on the country music chart with songs including “Loving Up a Storm.” He followed it with No. 1 hits “I Keep Coming Back,” “Friends,” “Midnight Hauler,” and “She Left Love All Over Me” in 1980 and 1981.

Known for adding an R&B element to his country music, Bailey continued releasing moderately popular singles throughout the ‘80s.

Arthur French, Broadway actor

Arthur French, an actor who was a founding member of the Negro Ensemble Company and appeared in movies including “Car Wash” and “Crooklyn,” died July 24 at age 89.

French joined New York City’s pioneering Negro Ensemble Company early in his career, appearing in their productions including “Three Days of Absence.”

He made his Broadway debut in 1971 in the musical “Ain’t Supposed to Die a Natural Death.” He went on to appear in Broadway productions including “The Iceman Cometh” and “Death of a Salesman.”

On the big screen, French had a supporting role as Charlie in 1976’s “Car Wash” and appeared in the Spike Lee films “Malcolm X” (1992) and “Crooklyn” (1994). He made several TV appearances on “Law & Order.”

Also an acting teacher, French was honored with an Obie Award for Sustained Excellence and a Paul Robeson Citation from the Actors’ Equity Association and the Actor’s Equity Foundation.

Markie Post, actress in ‘Night Court’

Markie Post, an actress known for roles in “Night Court,” “The Fall Guy,” and “Hearts Afire,” died Aug. 7 of cancer at age 70.

Post was best known for her work on “Night Court,” where she played public defender Christine Sullivan. Her character was brought on in the show’s third season and became a love interest for Harry Anderson’s and John Larroquette’s characters.

Before “Night Court,” Post had a prominent role on “The Fall Guy” and made memorable appearances on “Cheers,” “The Greatest American Hero,” and “The Love Boat.”

In the years after “Night Court” ended, Post starred opposite John Ritter in the sitcom “Hearts Afire.” Later TV appearances included “Scrubs,” “30 Rock,” “Santa Clarita Diet,” and a recurring role on The Kids Are Alright.”

Post also had a supporting role in the movie “There’s Something About Mary,” playing Mary’s mother, and she was the voice of June Darby in “Transformers: Prime.”

Why government has a constitutional duty to save the news industry

Only one private institution is mentioned in the Constitution: the press. Our nation’s founders recognized that a press free to criticize those in power and spread information across society is essential in democracy. But what does that mean today when we see newspapers disappearing every month? Is our government failing to meet its duty to protect and strengthen the press?

The 1st Amendment assumes the existence and durability of a private news industry. This suggests the Constitution not only allows but requires the government to take steps to keep the press viable. And in fact, the government has done this since the beginning of the republic.

The current press landscape demands new action. Journalism jobs over the past two decades have declined by 60%. As newspapers close and local broadcasting and cable news reduce investment in reporting, digital platforms have diverted ad revenues and enabled the spread of conspiracy theories and misinformation. Especially notable is the loss of reporting in smaller towns, suburbs and rural areas, leaving thousands of American communities with no local coverage. This decline may even be tied to fewer candidates for office in local elections.

The idea of government intervention in the news media is not new. Throughout our nation’s history, the federal government has directly and indirectly contributed to the cultivation and growth of the news industry.

Deliberate government actions map neatly to the history of news in America. The Postal Act of 1792 generously subsidized the delivery of all newspapers. Other policies include investments in the telegraph, regulation of broadcasting and cable, even the financing of research behind the internet. And the government created the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, PBS and National Public Radio and developed public television and radio stations, providing critical vehicles for further

innovation.

More recently, existing tax benefits for individuals and foundations are helping to strengthen the burgeoning field of nonprofit journalism. The Internal Revenue Service’s 2019 ruling that allowed the 150-year-old Salt Lake Tribune to turn itself into a nonprofit enterprise creates a new model for other newspapers interested in finding a way forward that includes philanthropy.

There are many other ways the government can strengthen the failing news industry while steering clear of censorship or control of media content.

For example, the Local Journalism Sustainability Act, a bill that has bipartisan support in Congress, creates tax incentives to encourage people to subscribe and donate to their local news organizations. It would relieve local news organizations of paying payroll taxes for journalists. And it would also provide tax incentives to businesses that advertise in local news organizations. This could help restore some of the revenue lost in the shift of billions of dollars in advertising to Facebook and Google and other online platforms — none of which has its own newsgathering operation.

Legislation has also been proposed that would address the harms caused by social media platforms in fueling the spread of misinformation and increasing political polarization through algorithms. More people today get their news from social media than from organizations that report and produce the news.

Through antitrust investigations and litigation, government could curb online platforms that abuse concentrated economic power and fail to pay for material generated by news organizations. Congress could end protections granted to those platforms against liability for consumer protection, fraud and defamation — which give them a huge advantage over conventional publishers and media organizations. Federal and state governments could further increase public subsidies for nonprofit and

public media and even exempt local news organizations from sales and property taxes.

Such efforts are compatible with the 1st Amendment because they increase, rather than abridge, freedom of speech and press, and because they echo government actions long underway. The amendment’s meanings have also unfolded in response to new challenges. Over the course of the 20th century, its enforcement by the courts came to reflect social changes and demands. Freedom of speech now is a basic, enforceable right, and includes the rights of listeners.

Finally, the large degree of existing government involvement in media, in combination with media’s importance to democracy, lends constitutional support for new policies. Since the 1930s, the federal government has required disclosure by broadcasters of the actual sponsors of materials, because “listeners are entitled to know by whom they are being persuaded.” It has long enforced rules against broadcasters spreading hoaxes. And in 1994, the Supreme Court upheld a federal law requiring cable networks to carry local and public educational stations in service of competition, information dissemination and programming variety.

Voters and government officials — anyone devoted to the Constitution — should not be willing to watch the news industry collapse. Preserving democracy calls for measures to revitalize the creation, production and distribution of news. Any contrary view of what the Constitution permits in this field imperils the very system of government it establishes.

It takes a village to end human trafficking

Human trafficking is the act of compelling someone into work or commercial sex through force, fraud, or coercion. It is illegal everywhere but happens every day in big cities and small towns across the United States.

Human trafficking takes many forms: A foster care youth forced into commercial sex work by someone pretending to be her “boyfriend;” a migrant locked in a house, compelled to cook and clean; a man with a mental health disability laboring in a poultry processing plant for no pay. It occurs across oceans and in our own backyards.

Human trafficking is a \$150 billion a year industry. There are more than 40 million victims worldwide -- including many in the United States. The National Human Trafficking Hotline recorded 11,500 domestic cases in 2019.

And those were just the reported cases. Many more are never brought to light.

Sadly, marginalized communities -- including people of color, LGBTQ+ individuals, undocumented immigrants, and survivors of abuse -- are more likely to become victims. Studies estimate that 40% of U.S. sex trafficking victims are Black Americans and over 60% of labor trafficking victims are Hispanic.

There is no silver bullet to end human trafficking, and it won’t happen overnight. However, a concerted effort from all levels of society to combat this evil is our best hope to end it.

When communities come together, we can develop a comprehensive response. United Way is proud to leverage our network of more than 1,000 United Ways in 40 countries to identify and support local stakeholders in the fight against trafficking. By mobilizing individuals, businesses, governments, and nonprofit organizations, our Center to Combat Human Trafficking helps coordinate efforts to end this systemic injustice.

This comprehensive approach is being piloted in cities across the country, from Las Vegas to Atlanta. Each program is designed to address each community’s unique challenges, from child abuse to poverty to homelessness.

Companies can work to educate their employees and marshal donations toward projects dedicated to combatting trafficking. Many employees at UPS, for instance, are trained to spot signs of trafficking on their daily routes. UPS employees have given millions of dollars to anti-trafficking efforts led by United Way’s Center.

Additionally, business leaders can strive to employ survivors of trafficking. Secure employment and financial stability help reduce one’s risk of being trafficked again. Employing survivors may require more

inclusive hiring practices, like not automatically disqualifying those with criminal records. As one advisor at the Human Trafficking Legal Center explains, trafficking victims are often “arrested and prosecuted for their traffickers’ crimes.”

Individuals can support anti-human trafficking initiatives by considering their purchasing choices. Consumers can look for signs of sex and labor trafficking in stores, salons, hotels, and restaurants. They can research whether brands employ responsible sourcing practices in their supply chains.

Concerned voters have immense influence to wield, too. Congress will soon reauthorize the Trafficking Victims Protection Act, which was first passed in 2000 to prosecute traffickers and support survivors. Americans can call their representatives and urge them to pass this legislation and fund anti-trafficking efforts.

Every day, our lives intersect with this issue through the products we purchase, the systems we perpetuate, and people we pass on the street. Each of us has the opportunity and ability to combat human trafficking. United, we can end it.

The American labor crisis

It’s 4:30 in the morning, and Raymond Mikesell’s alarm has gone off.

Within an hour, as the first rays of pink and orange morning light reflect off the skyscrapers in the city, Mikesell is at his restaurant, Cafe Raymond, in Pittsburgh’s Strip District, the city’s Main Street for small businesses.

On his way to the restaurant, he stops by the food terminals, hoping they will have the produce and stock he needs for the day. But he ends up having to turn away the beverage distributor at his own loading dock.

“I ordered over \$1,000 in bottled water, tea and drinks and he tells me he only has about \$100 worth of the supplies I ordered for the day. It’s the third time this week this has happened,” said Mikesell, 55, shaking his head.

And, as far as workers go, all he can do is hope that everyone shows up for their shifts and that maybe today someone will answer the ad he placed in March looking for servers.

So far, he said, no one has shown up to interview for the jobs, which pay more than the \$15 an hour progressives have demanded all businesses — including small ones — pay employees.

Joe Mistick, sitting on the balcony of Cafe Raymond, said the problems small business owners face here in the Strip District are a microcosm of what’s happening across the country.

“If it is happening here, it is happening everywhere,” said Mistick, former chief of staff to two Pittsburgh mayors and current law professor at Duquesne University.

There are 30.7 million small businesses in the United States, accounting for 99% of all American businesses, according to data collected by the U.S. Small Business Administration.

And a lot of small businesses in America are facing a crisis right now that stems from a perfect storm of problems: a short-handed workforce, a broken supply chain and inflation that is very real, despite President Joe Biden’s dismissal of it as “temporary.”

Generous federal unemployment benefits funded by Biden’s American Rescue Plan currently give people \$300 per week in federal money to supplement state jobless aid, which also averages \$300 a week. Add those numbers up, and the motivation for workers to stay home rather than get a job is real.

“We Are Hiring” signs are plastered all over small shops in the Strip District. A poster saying “Temporarily Closed” has hung on the door of Deluca’s Diner for weeks because they can’t find servers and cooks, according to the owner’s father.

This has all led to a broken supply chain, explains Jimmy Coen, owner of three sports-themed variety stores called Yinzers.

“If, somewhere along the supply chain, someone does not have enough workers to either make their products or load their products or deliver their products, the small businessperson is left uncertain if he or she will have in stock what the consumer demands.”

As a result, shortages in everything have spread across the country — from labor to lumber and from swimming pool chemicals to ketchup packages. Even if products are getting made, there’s a dearth of drivers to deliver them.

Coen is president of the Strip District Business Association that includes nearly 30 small businesses along Penn Avenue. He said that, without getting the goods they need, small business owners will be forced to raise prices to make ends meet.

“These shortages are what is making inflation skyrocket,” he said.

Last week, the Labor Department reported that consumer prices rose 5.4% in June, the fastest pace recorded in 13 years.

The cost of fresh meat is especially out of control, Mikesell said.

“Brisket went up 30% easy, beef in general is going outrageous. So has salmon. So has chicken. And don’t get me started on fuel charges for when you do deliveries.”

Mistick said everyone on Penn Avenue hustled last year to figure out how to stay afloat amid the closures caused by the pandemic.

“Raymond was creating Sunday dinners for four for families to pick up, Jimmy was selling masks on tables in front of his stores, Pennsylvania Macaroni was shipping their Italian groceries on dry ice to their customers. They all worked hard to survive, and they did.”

If you had told Mikesell midway through the COVID-19 crisis that when the economy started to rebound he wouldn’t be able to bring in workers nor supplies, he never would have believed you.

“Honestly I am shocked,” he said. “It blows my mind that this is where we have ended up.”

Vulnerable Americans go first

Should vulnerable Americans — say, senior citizens and those with underlying conditions, to begin with — get their third shot before people all over the world get their first?

I would say yes. The World Health Organization says no.

In the past week, both Pfizer and Moderna have announced that they are testing a booster shot to address the uncertainty of antibodies waning over time. Some reports suggest that booster shots could be as soon as next month when those of us who have received two doses may be back in line for the third. “We believe a dose three of a booster will likely be necessary to keep us as safe as possible through the winter season in the Northern Hemisphere,” Dr. Stephen Hoge, the president of Moderna, told an earnings call.

Even Novavax, which has struggled to produce its vaccine, announced that their formula worked better as a booster than in its own two-dose application.

France and Germany have announced their own plans to move forward with a third dose for broad categories of their people. Israel has already started administering third doses.

The World Health Organization is not happy. On Wednesday, it called for a moratorium on booster shots in wealthy countries until the end of September at least.

“I understand the concern of all governments to protect their people from the delta variant,” Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, director

general of the WHO, told reporters in a briefing. “But we cannot — and we should not — accept countries that have already used most of the global supply of vaccines using even more of it, while the world’s most vulnerable people remain unprotected.”

To be more specific, the WHO has proposed that wealthy countries hold back on boosters until at least 10% of the population of every country in the world has received their vaccines.

Asked about the issue at the White House, Jen Psaki, the White House press secretary, said: “We feel that it’s a false choice and that we can do both. We will have enough supply to ensure, if the FDA decides that boosters are recommended for a portion of the population, to provide those as well.”

Guns and butter. Not so fast.

Supplies are limited. We are talking here about decisions that are at most weeks away.

Should Pfizer and Moderna send the additional doses for every American over 65, or should those doses go to even more vulnerable populations in Africa?

The organization Doctors Without Borders has called proposals for Americans to receive booster shots while only 1% of those living in lower-income countries have received their first dose unconscionable. “Leaders of governments like the U.S., which has already vaccinated well beyond the most vulnerable people, need to stop and take a look at this dramatic global imbalance in access to vaccines before offering

boosters to vaccinated people,” said Dr. Carrie Teicher, director of programs at MSF-USA.

Do we think globally, or do we think of ourselves? I can give you statistics to make us feel better, about how much we are helping lower-income countries through the COVAX problem. We are contributing, but not at the cost of Americans receiving their shots.

WHO has lost much of its credibility because of what was seen, with much supporting evidence, as its catering to Beijing rather than moving swiftly to limit the risk to the rest of the world. The organization was among the last to recognize the global “pandemic” as such.

But calling on the United States, along with France and Germany, to put its own citizens’ health second ignores the reality of democratic politics.

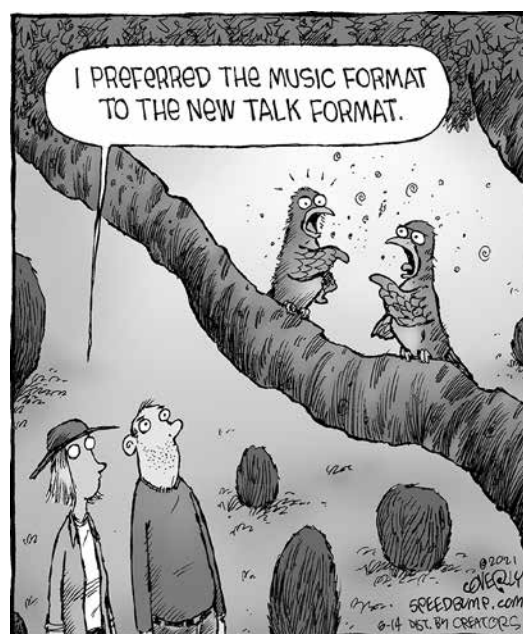
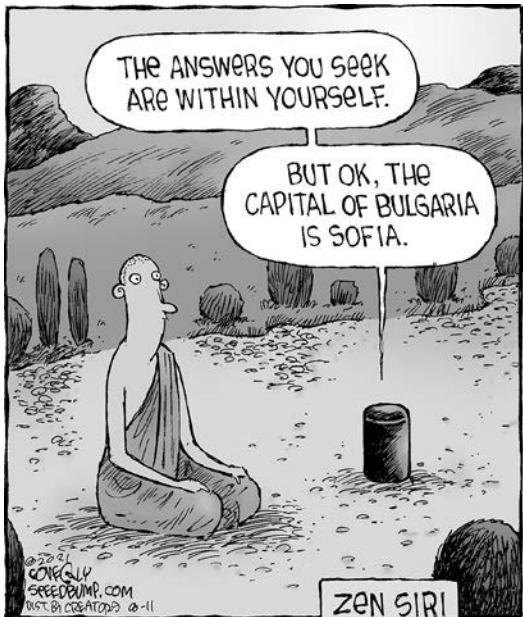
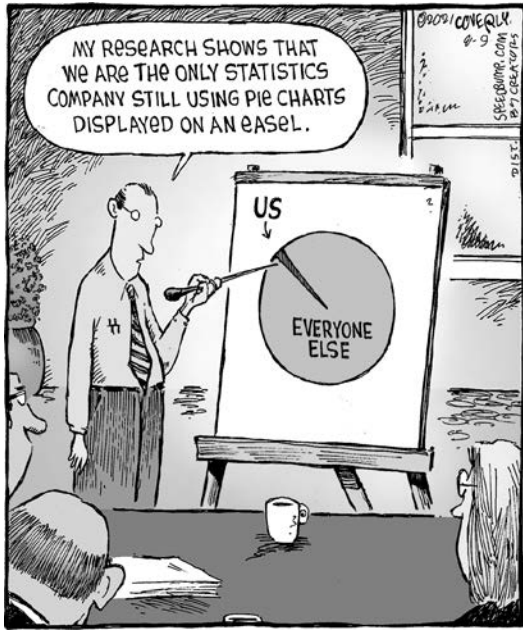
Imagine the Biden administration telling Americans to be patient about boosters being given in other Western countries so we can get more doses to vulnerable low-income countries.

Nor going to happen. Nor should it. You and I spent billions of dollars to develop those vaccines. We have spent more since to buy more doses.

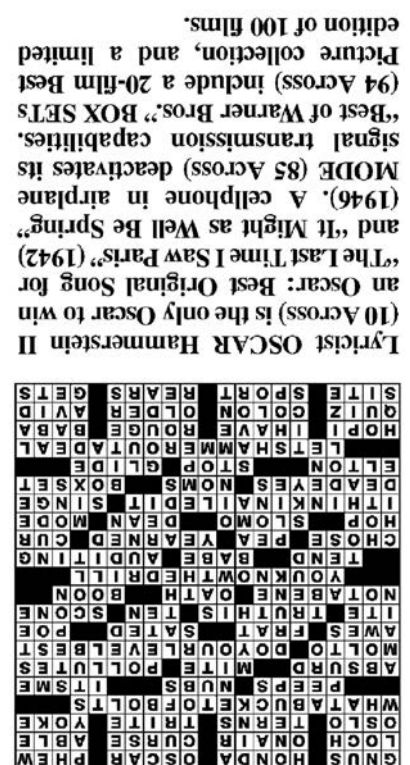

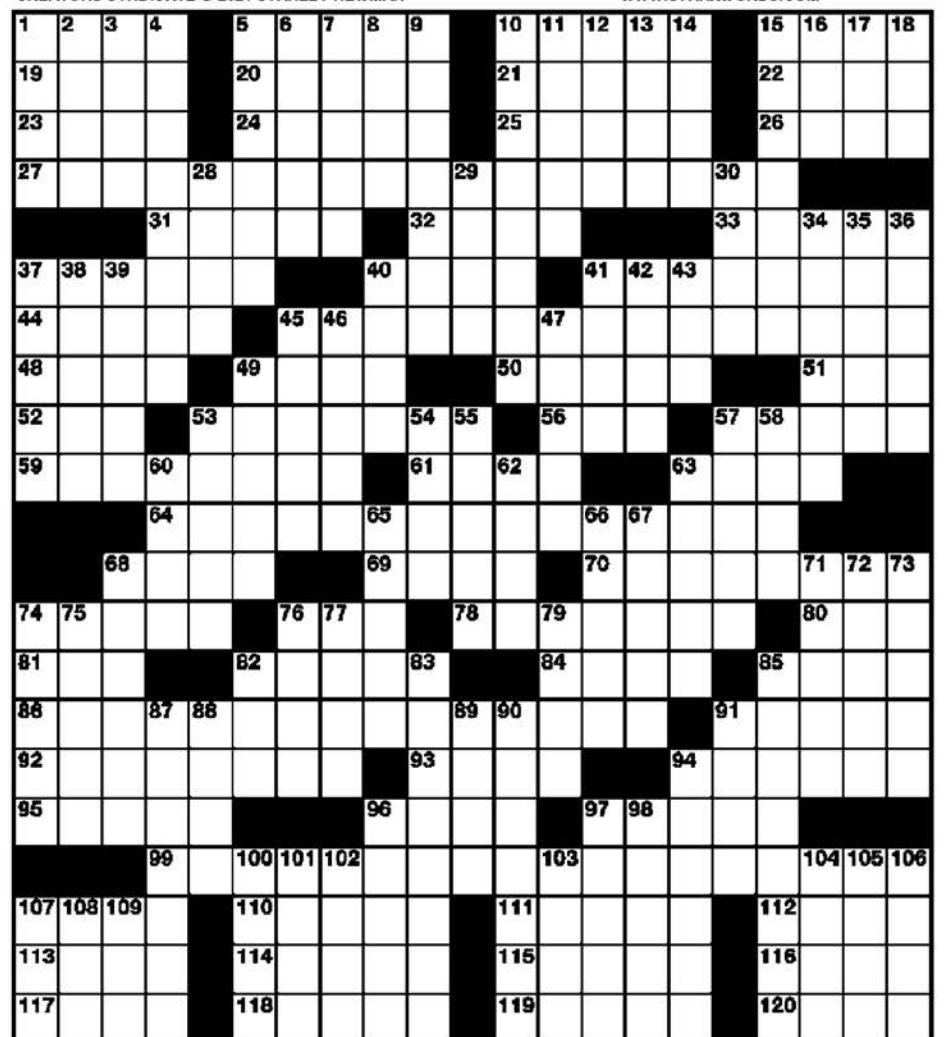

Today is Friday the 13th. Why is it considered spooky?

Long considered a harbinger of bad luck, Friday the 13th has inspired a late 19th-century secret society, an early 20th-century novel, a horror film franchise and not one but two unwieldy terms—paraskavedekatriaphobia and friggatriskaidekaphobia—that describe fear of this supposedly unlucky day.

The Fear of 13

Just like walking under a ladder, crossing paths with a black cat or breaking a mirror, many people hold fast to the belief that Friday the 13th brings bad luck. Though it's uncertain exactly when this particular tradition began, negative superstitions have swirled around the number 13 for centuries.

While Western cultures have historically associated the number 12 with completeness (there are 12 days of Christmas, 12 months and zodiac signs, 12 labors of Hercules, 12 gods of Olympus and 12 tribes of Israel, just to name a few examples), its successor 13 has a long history as a sign of bad luck.

The ancient Code of Hammurabi, for example, reportedly omitted a 13th law from its list of legal rules. Though this was probably a clerical error, superstitious people sometimes point to this as proof of 13's longstanding negative associations.

Fear of the number 13 has even earned a psychological term: triskaidekaphobia.

Why is Friday the 13th Unlucky?

According to biblical tradition, 13 guests attended the Last Supper, held on Maundy Thursday, including Jesus and his 12 apostles (one of whom, Judas, betrayed him). The next day, of course, was Good Friday, the day of Jesus' crucifixion.

The seating arrangement at the Last Supper is believed to have given rise to a longstanding Christian superstition that having 13 guests at a table was a bad omen—specifically, that it was courting death.

Though Friday's negative associations are weaker, some have suggested they also have roots in Christian tradition: Just as Jesus was crucified on a Friday, Friday was also said to be the day Eve gave Adam the fateful apple from the Tree of Knowledge, as well as the day Cain killed his brother, Abel.

The Thirteen Club

In the late-19th century, a New Yorker named Captain William Fowler (1827–1897) sought to remove the enduring stigma surrounding the number 13—and particularly the unwritten rule about not having 13 guests at a dinner table—by founding an exclusive society called the Thirteen Club.

The group dined regularly on the 13th day of the month in room 13 of the Knickerbocker Cottage, a popular watering hole Fowler owned from 1863 to 1883. Before sitting down for a 13-course dinner, members would pass beneath a ladder and a banner reading "Morituri te Salutamus," Latin for "Those of us who are about to die salute you."

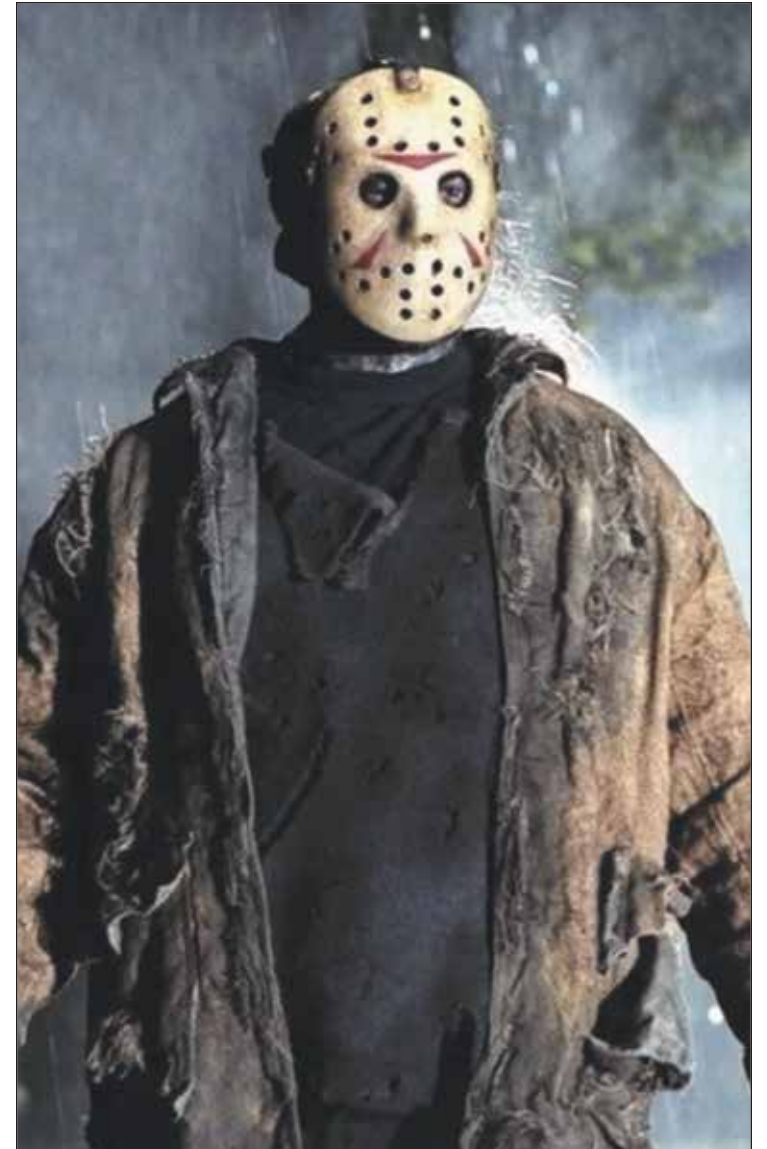
Four former U.S. presidents (Chester A. Arthur, Grover Cleveland, Benjamin Harrison and Theodore Roosevelt) would join the Thirteen Club's ranks at one time or another.

Friday the 13th in Pop Culture

An important milestone in the history of the Friday the 13th legend in particular (not just the number 13) occurred in 1907, with the publication of the novel Friday, the Thirteenth written by Thomas William Lawson.

The book told the story of a New York City stockbroker who plays on superstitions about the date to create chaos on Wall Street, and make a killing on the market.

The horror movie Friday the 13th, released in 1980, introduced the world to a hockey mask-wearing killer named Jason, and is



perhaps the best-known example of the famous superstition in pop culture history. The movie spawned multiple sequels, as well as comic books, novellas, video games, related merchandise and countless terrifying Halloween costumes.

What Bad Things Happened on Friday 13th?

On Friday, October 13, 1307, officers of King Philip IV of France arrested hundreds of the Knights Templar, a powerful religious and military order formed in the 12th century for the defense of the Holy Land.

Imprisoned on charges of various illegal behaviors (but really because the king wanted access to their financial resources), many Templars were later executed. Some cite the link with the Templars as the origin of the Friday the 13th superstition, but like many legends involving the Templars and their history, the truth remains murky.

In more recent times, a number of traumatic events have occurred on Friday the 13th, including the German bombing of Buckingham Palace (September 1940); the murder of Kitty Genovese in Queens, New York (March 1964); a cyclone that killed more than 300,000 people in Bangladesh (November 1970); the disappearance of a Chilean Air Force plane in the Andes (October 1972); the death of rapper Tupac Shakur (September 1996) and the crash of the Costa Concordia cruise ship off the coast of Italy, which killed 30 people (January 2012).

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Santa Fe begins new era with the hiring of Carl Agnew as football coach

SANTA FE SPRINGS — A new era in Santa Fe High School football has begun with the hiring of Carl Agnew as head coach this past June.

Agnew, 42, replaces Dave Pierson who was head coach for nine years for the Chiefs. Pierson took over for legendary coach Jack Mahlstedt in 2012.

"I was at Lakewood as the defensive coordinator for the last couple of seasons (2019-20) and saw the opening at Santa Fe," Agnew said. "It was closer to home. Luckily I got it and it all worked out well for me.

"The focus is to get back to the basics here at Santa Fe with football, then moving on and progressing from there. Hopefully, we can start with the fundamentals and get the program back to where it used to be."

The last league title was in 2017 and prior to that, Mahlstedt led the Chiefs to a Del Rio League (DRL) title in 2011. La Serna has won the DRL the last three years.

After the 2017 league title season, Santa Fe fell on hard times, winning only four games

in three seasons.

"The first order of business is just getting this team ready to play the scrimmage game and next Thursday (August 19 at Summit High in Fontana) for a full game," Agnew said. "We're doing everything we can to organize this to get everybody ready to play. We're excited that we're going to start the same time that school starts."

Agnew comes to Santa Fe with plenty of accolades, as he guided his teams to six CIF-Southern Section playoffs appearances, reaching the second round five times.

Agnew, who was head coach at Los Amigos High School in Fountain Valley for 11 years, took over in 2008 and stepped down in 2018 to be closer to home.

Agnew grew up in San Diego and attended St. Augustine High, graduating in 1997. He was a fullback and linebacker for the Saints.

Upon graduation, Agnew attended San Diego Mesa Community College. He played defensive end and was a linebacker for the Olympians.

He finished his college career at Chapman University in Orange (99-00), playing linebacker.

His first coaching stint came at Los Amigos as an assistant from 2001-05 and moved up to Golden West College the next two seasons (06-07). He received his first head coaching position back

at Los Amigos in 2008.

Agnew reflected on his two seasons at Lakewood. "With the COVID season being a loss season, it didn't seem like we gained anything," he said. "That's probably in a lot of places.

"This year we have Matt Amin-Picado, who is a top returner from last year. He played offense a lot and started as a freshman. We're expecting a lot out of him. He'll be a two-way player.

"Senior Romeo Zuniga is a lineman and will also be a two-way player and is a returning starter as well. We've got some good experience on the line, but we're really young at the skill positions."

Players to watch

Romeo Zuniga, defensive end/left tackle; senior Michael Gonzalez; Matt Amin-Picado, receiver and cornerback; Adrian Montes, linebacker/fullback; Victor Flores, receiver/defensive back; Chris Ledesma, receiver/defensive back; junior Pedro Debora, linebacker/fullback; junior Andrew Huguez, offensive/defensive lineman; junior Evan Melendrez, receiver/defensive back.

"We are very young at Santa Fe," Agnew added. "We only have 12 seniors and most of them will start on the offensive and defensive lines and bring a lot of experience and leadership to the team. The juniors are not as experienced, but bring a lot of

energy.

"The skill positions will be the youngest with sophomore quarterback Adrian Huguez and Amin-Picado.

"This season, the long term goal is to get them into the playoffs," Agnew added. "We've been talking about it since I showed up. Obviously competing for a league title is the second ultimate goal."

What they said

Romeo Zuniga, senior DE/Tackle: "It feels good and I really like the coach and I like everything just coming back after the COVID season.

"[Coach Agnew] brings everything. He brings a different intensity and a different feeling to just play again.

"Everything feels different this year with the five games we played (in the spring) and now we get an opportunity to play a whole 10.

"This is a new opportunity to be a senior and put it all up there for the last year. It feels great and I'm excited to show what I can do.

"I believe we can do anything we can put our minds to and being a team, and being together as a family."

Matthew Amin-Picado, sophomore receiver/cornerback: "I think [Coach Agnew] is really putting the effort in and he really wants to coach.

"I'm very excited, especially since we have 15 games (including spring '21). I'm looking forward to just being with the team and getting some wins and celebrating.

"I love to catch and run the ball and at the end of the season to be league champions."

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
