COVID CORNER

Standards Board Moving to Adopt Non-Emergency COVID Regulation

I hear that the Cal/OSHA Standards Board will be presenting for public comment and future adoption a final version of the Emergency Temporary Standards (ETS) regarding the hazards related to COVID-19 on September 15, 2022. How are these new requirements going to affect my operations?

Unless the Standards Board adopts into Title 8 a regulation addressing COVID-19, all requirements contained in the ETS will fade into the twilight on December 31, 2022. After three iterations of the ETS, the emergency regulation process is no longer a viable option. The regulation must be formally adopted into Title 8. On November 19, 2020 the Standards Board adopted sections 3205 and 3205.1- 3205.4 of Title 8, the ETS, which went into effect on November 30, 2020. What is being presented for discussion and comment next month is a massive rewrite of sections 3205 through 3205.3. Section 3205.4 has been incorporated into the other sections where appropriate. To quote from the Standards Board memo: "The Board is proposing new sections 3205 through 3205.3 to provide clear and specific requirements to employers so that they may better protect employees from the harmful effects of COVID-19; avoid a potential increase in COVID-19- related fatalities, serious illnesses, and long-term disabilities; and reduce related financial costs to employees, employers, insurers, public benefit programs, and taxpayers. The proposed regulations will mitigate costs associated with COVID-19-related company shutdowns, employee absences, hospitalizations, death, responding to agency investigations, increased workers' compensation insurance rates, personnel replacement expenses, and lost production."

Brief Summary

The following is a brief summary of some of the revisions:

- The regulation will not be permanent as there is a two-year sunset provision. (This is based on the premise that COVID-19 is now endemic.)
- Exclusion pay is gone as related to COVID-19.
- The testing and notification after exposure remains in the requirements.
- Records will be maintained for three years.
- The proposed regulation will employee where no contact occurs; employees working from home; and employees teleworking from a location of the employee's choice, which is not under the control of the employer.

Visit Website to Review

This is just a small portion of the proposed revisions. I would highly recommend a visit to the Standards Board website to compare the proposal with the repealed ETS. The comparison draft can be found at www.dir.ca.gov/oshsb/documents/COVID-19-Prevention-Non-Emergency-txtcourtesy.pdf. There are 30-plus pages, a large percentage being deleted regulations. Many of the proposals are the existing ETS regulations, some with additional amendments that are being incorporated into the proposed new regulation. Some changes, such as the definition of "close contact," are the result of California Department of Public Health rewrites.

ANNUAL STATE OF THE NATION LUNCHEON

Norwalk Chamber and our partner Chambers hosted our Annual State of the Nation Luncheon featured Congresswoman Linda Sánchez on Friday, August 19th at the Doubletree Hotel in Norwalk. Scott Smith, Communications Officer for ABC Unified School District served as the MC for this annual event. John Allen, President of the Board for the Water Replenishment District introduced the Congresswoman, as the presenting Sponsor for the event. The Congresswoman shared information on recent legislature that was signed into law by the President, and also additional information on infrastructure, projects in her District that have been funded, immigration, helping our Veterans while they are serving overseas and the importance of safe communities. She also stated that this had been the most productive session for Congress in the history of our country. The Inflation Reduction Act was a victory for working class families and seniors stated the Congresswoman. It addresses climate change along with capping out of pocket Medicare costs for prescription drugs. She shared that the bill will be fully paid for by multinational corporations and billionaires who do not pay their fair share of taxes. Next the Congresswoman discussed the effect of the War in Ukraine on the cost of fuel here in the United States. The President released millions of barrels of oil from the strategic petroleum reserve to help with the shortage and to bring prices down for consumers. The Congresswoman has also been working with her colleagues to address the issues of supply chains by making investments in infrastructure. They have also been discussing the need to invest in manufacturing in the United States. One step in that direction was the recent "CHIPS" Act that was recently passed. Another bipartisan bill that was passed was the Infrastructure bill, which created the largest long-term investment in infrastructure in nearly a century here in America. Funds will be coming to California for local, county and state agencies to put into road repairs, bridge upgrades and notably the Whittier Narrows Dam. This has been the number one priority project for the Army Corp of Engineers and they were able to secure funding to finish the restoration of the Dam. If the Dam were to fail, all of the land below the Dam would potentially be under ten feet of water. She shared that flooding is the worst possible national disaster that can happen in California, not earthquakes or fires, so finishing the work on the Dam was a high priority. Next the Congresswoman spoke about the current labor shortage and the challenges for businesses to find and retain workers. Part of the solution to this is immigration reform. The need for workers is great and that the current birth rate in America is lower than the worker replacement rate. Our country will need immigrants to be able to sustain our workforce says Congresswoman Sánchez, which is why she introduce the US Citizenship Act in Congress in 2021.

Congresswoman Sánchez expressed that safe communities were one of her top priorities and she has been meeting with local law enforcement to work on common sense legislation on gun reform. She has also been involved with legislation that will help our military personal with credit score issues while serving our country overseas. She briefly touched on the COVID-19 endemic and the new monkey pox crisis, while in closing shared that all can reach out to her office for help with any federal issues including the IRS, Medicare and VA benefits.

We thank the Congresswoman for attending and speaking at our Annual State of the Nation Luncheon. We appreciate the work that she has done and continues to do for the residents and businesses of the 38th Congressional District. We also thank our Sponsors for supporting this very important event.
